



# The Parish of St Fidelis

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## *Reflection 28<sup>th</sup> Sunday Ordinary Time 2020.*

In Assisi, outside the walls of the town, there is a church called St Damiano. Above the altar hangs a crucifix in the style of a Byzantine icon. Historically Francis prayed there before the crucifix and in prayer asked Jesus 'What do you want me to do with my life?' A clear message came; "Rebuild my Church" Francis saw that St Damiano, was in need of urgent repair and maintenance, so being a practical man, he got together ladders, hammer and nails and made the St Damiano church look like new. Then he repaired other churches in the area. Parish Priests were delighted but it dawned on Francis that Jesus was not talking about buildings but about His Body, the People of God and not about repairing and maintenance but about rebuilding according to it's foundations. In fact, nearby to the St. Damiano church is a tiny church building, Francis nicknamed *Portiuncula* (the small plot of land). It was from this the small church and not the huge beautiful basilica that Francis began the Franciscan Movement. An appealing spirituality that went back to the source of the Gospel emphasising simplicity, poverty and the graciousness of the present moment

Last Sunday, on the feast of St Francis, another Francis, our present Pope who chose the name because he admires so much the saint who rebuilt the Church of his era, through poverty, simplicity and radical love, published a new Encyclical on fraternity and social friendship entitled *Fratelli Tutti*. This spirit of rebuilding which is more than repairing and certainly not sweeping things under the carpet is well described by the French word, *resourcement* meaning 'to go back to the sources' which are the Gospels and our living Tradition. Pope Francis in his simple but challenging way encourages us to conversion not, as it were, repairing Santo Damiano but rather beginning from the inside of the *Portiuncula*; a beginning of emergence and expansion of vision to the wider church and world that is, in fact, beyond our imagining, in Jesus Christ.

Pope Francis begins...

"FRATELLI TUTTI".[1] With these words, Saint Francis of Assisi addressed his brothers and sisters and proposed to them a way of life marked by the flavour of the Gospel. Of the counsels Francis offered, I would like to select the one in which he calls for a love that transcends the barriers of geography and distance, and declares blessed all those who love their brother "as much when he is far away from him as when he is with him" [2]

This saint of fraternal love, simplicity and joy, who inspired me to write the Encyclical Laudato Si', prompts me once more to devote this new Encyclical to fraternity and social friendship. Francis felt himself a brother to the sun, the sea and the wind, yet he knew that he was even closer to those of his own flesh. Wherever he went, he sowed seeds of peace and walked alongside the poor, the abandoned, the infirm and the outcast, the least of his brothers and sisters.

Pope Francis, in a similar fashion by composing encyclicals encourages Catholics to develop empathy for people who are beyond their friends and family. He wants us to move outwards beyond the *Portiuncula* and to discover the Joy of the Gospel (*Evangelii Gaudium*) and to show care for our common home, the earth (*Laudato Si*) and to embrace all our sisters and brothers (*Fratelli Tutti*).

### *In Italian*

Ad Assisi, fuori dalle mura del paese, c'è una chiesetta chiamata San Damiano. Sopra l'altare è appeso un crocifisso nello stile di un'icona bizantina. Storicamente Francesco pregò davanti al crocifisso e in preghiera chiese a Gesù "Cosa vuoi che faccia della mia vita?". Arrivò un messaggio chiaro: "Ricostruisci la mia Chiesa". Francesco vide che la chiesetta di San Damiano aveva bisogno di urgenti riparazioni e manutenzioni, quindi essendo un uomo pratico, prese scala, martello e chiodi e la rimise a nuovo. Poi riparò altre chiese della zona e i parroci ne furono felicissimi, ma Francesco capì che Gesù non stava parlando di edifici ma del Suo corpo, il popolo di Dio, e non di riparazioni e manutenzione, bensì di ricostruzione secondo le sue fondamenta. Ed è proprio da una piccola chiesetta chiamata *Porziuncola* (piccolo pezzo di terra) situata appena fuori le mura di Assisi, e non da una grande basilica, che Francesco iniziò il movimento francescano. Una spiritualità affascinante che richiama il Vangelo con enfasi su semplicità, povertà e compassione del momento presente.

Domenica scorsa, nella festa di San Francesco, un altro Francesco, il nostro attuale Papa -che ha scelto questo nome proprio perché ammira tanto il santo che ha ricostruito la Chiesa del suo tempo attraverso povertà, semplicità e amore radicale - ha pubblicato una nuova Enciclica sulla fraternità e amicizia sociale dal titolo *Fratelli Tutti*. Questo spirito di ricostruzione che è ben più che riparare e certamente non è nascondere le cose sotto il tappeto, è ben descritto dalla parola francese *resourcement* che significa "tornare alle fonti" che sono i Vangeli e la nostra Tradizione vivente. Papa Francesco nel suo modo semplice ma stimolante ci incoraggia alla conversione non, per così dire, stando all'interno della Porziuncola (chiesetta) di San Damiano, bensì uscendo ed espandendo la nostra visione alla Chiesa più ampia oltre la nostra immaginazione, in Gesù Cristo. Papa Francesco inizia così...

1. «*Fratelli tutti*», scriveva *San Francesco d'Assisi* per rivolgersi a tutti i fratelli e le sorelle e proporre loro una forma di vita dal sapore di Vangelo. Tra i suoi consigli voglio evidenziarne uno, nel quale invita a un amore che va al di là delle barriere della geografia e dello spazio. Qui egli dichiara beato colui che ama l'altro «quando fosse lontano da lui, quanto se fosse accanto a lui». [2] Con queste poche e semplici parole ha spiegato l'essenziale di una fraternità aperta, che permette di riconoscere, apprezzare e amare ogni persona al di là della vicinanza fisica, al di là del luogo del mondo dove è nata o dove abita.

Questo Santo dell'amore fraterno, della semplicità e della gioia, che mi ha ispirato a scrivere l'Enciclica *Laudato si'*, nuovamente mi motiva a dedicare questa nuova Enciclica alla fraternità e all'amicizia sociale. Infatti *San Francesco*, che si sentiva fratello del sole, del mare e del vento, sapeva di essere ancora più unito a quelli che erano della sua stessa carne. Dappertutto seminò pace e camminò accanto ai poveri, agli abbandonati, ai malati, agli scartati, agli ultimi.

Papa Francesco, allo stesso modo, componendo encicliche incoraggia i cattolici a sviluppare empatia per le persone che sono al di là dei loro amici e familiari. Vuole che andiamo oltre la Porziuncola e scopriamo la gioia del Vangelo (*Evangelii gaudium*), mostriamo cura per la nostra casa comune, la Terra (*Laudato Si'*), e abbracciamo tutte le nostre sorelle e i nostri fratelli (*Fratelli Tutti*).
