REFLECTION BY REV MARK O'BRIEN OP

We all love peak or privileged experiences. We believe they have a profound impact on us and can radically change the way we live. But there are two issues that we need to reflect on peak experiences – especially when they concern our relationship with God. The first is what constitutes a peak or privileged experience of God? The second is how do we know that it has really, radically changed us?

The reading from Exodus provides some food for thought. The people have experienced liberation from slavery in Egypt and now they are invited into an intimate and privileged covenant with God who delivered them, who speaks to them from the mountain via Moses the chosen mediator. They are, as a nation, to be consecrated as God's priestly ministers to the world. Israel readily agrees to the terms of the covenant and the deal is sealed at the foot of the mountain in Exodus 24. But then Moses is summoned up the mountain and things go quiet. Same God, just as present on the mountain as before, but now for those below there is silence and waiting. The people judge that this is an absence of God and set out to make gods whose 'presence' they can control. This text invites us to reflect that God is as present in the silence and waiting as in the intensity of the theophany on the mountain. It also invites us to reflect that what Israelites see as a privileged experience of God does not change them at all. They remain fickle as they were when confronted by the Egyptian forces at the sea.

The gospel reading invites reflection on our perceived experiences of God by focusing on the exercise of divine power. As in the Exodus story, Jesus has invited the twelve into an intimate relationship and now sends them out on a mission with power over unclean spirits and diseases. We all thrill to the exercise of power; to exercise the kind of power the disciples enjoyed must have been heady stuff One would think that this experience would secure their undying indeed. commitment to Jesus. But what happens? At the first major crisis, they abandon him. Yet, as Paul takes pains to point out to his Roman readers, the experience of the suffering, reviled and crucified Jesus was as much a presence of the God of infinite power as the disciples' experience of casting out demons and curing the sick. Why so? Because it brought our reconciliation with God. from whom we were estranged because of our sins. The passion of Christ completely rewrites our understanding of power and how it is exercised. In our modern world we find it difficult to equate power with biblical notion of love as loyalty, particularly to the helpless and powerless. If we think of love in relation to power, it tends to be romantic love and sex. Our understanding of both words is warped. Only God can show us, through the experience of Jesus and his disciples that the ultimate power, divine power, is love and it is a transforming power.

I remember once being at a lecture by the great Pauline scholar Ernst Kasemann, at which he said, 'thank God for the canon(of the Bible), otherwise we would all have our own canons'. As devoted believers, we all hunger for the experience of God and rightly so. God entrusts to us the freedom and responsibility of judging whether this or that experience is of God. We all have our own ideas what an experience of God should be like. But there is the danger that we will have our favourite ideas, as we have our favourite biblical passages, and that we will forget those other ones that the Bible holds up for our consideration, above all of course that of the suffering and crucified Christ.

We were still helpless when at his appointed moment Christ died for sinful men. It is not easy to die even for a good man – though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die – but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners. Having died to make us righteous, is it likely that he would now fail to save us from God's anger? When we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, we were still enemies; now that we have been reconciled, surely we may count on being saved by the life of his Son? Not merely because we have been reconciled but because we are filled with joyful trust in God, through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have already gained our reconciliation.

Gospel

Matthew 9:36-10:8

When Jesus saw the crowds he felt sorry for them because they were harassed and dejected, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest.'

He summoned his twelve disciples, and gave them authority over unclean spirits with power to cast them out and to cure all kinds of diseases and sickness.

These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon who is called Peter, and his brother Andrew; James the son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas, and Matthew the tax collector; James the son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Zealot and Judas Iscariot, the one who was to betray him. These twelve Jesus sent out, instructing them as follows:

'Do not turn your steps to pagan territory, and do not enter any Samaritan town; go rather to the lost sheep of the House of Israel. And as you go, proclaim that the kingdom of heaven is close at hand. Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out devils. You received without charge, give without charge.'

THE SACRED HEART OF JESUS AND HUMAN INTIMACY

On Friday, June 16th we celebrated the solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus.



The feast of the Sacred Heart is about the heart of Jesus filled with love for humanity that always seeks to reach out in solidarity and love. This is where we begin and the truth that gives us hope – 'God loved us first'. Here is the great love that we proclaim first, at all times and in all circumstances that God has a place in his heart for people like you and me and a place in his plans for all of us. On the

cross, the loving heart of Jesus was pierced and wounded to show how much God's love was prepared to endure. God's heart suffers for the ones he loves. The gushing forth of blood and water from his heart represents the sacraments of Eucharist in baptism where God comes to meet us and renews us in his love time and time again. As water and blood poured out of his heart so his love and mercy pours out from the sacraments to offer us his divine life and healing.

But this feast is also about our hearts. It is about the love of God's heart reaching and moving ours. What does that mean? The late Blessed Cardinal Henry Newman's motto

was 'heart speaks to heart': the human love of Christ speaks to or engages with the human heart and every aspect of our humanity: our past, present and future; our emotions, our memory, anxiety, hopes, imagination, sins. wounds. sexuality, need to love and be creativity, loved. talents, physical health and finally our deaths (the full list of the



components of our humanity is much longer). Christianity is a religion of the heart. It speaks to the heart and lifts up the heart to new heights and horizons. As the philosopher Aristotle once said 'educating the mind without educating the heart is no education at all'. This is why St Paul could pray for fellow believers that 'the eyes of your heart may be enlightened in order that you might know the hope to which he has called you' (Eph. 1:18).

On the Feast of the Sacred Heart, may the merciful love of the heart of Jesus warm our hearts so that we may have a heart ever more like His.

RECENTLY DECEASED

DRAWING US TO THE HEART OF CHRIST: THE SACRED HEART CHAPEL AT ST PATRICK'S CATHEDRAL

When the second archbishop of Melbourne, Thomas Joseph Carr, died on 6 May 1917, he was laid to rest beneath the floor of Sacred Heart Chapel in St Patrick's Cathedral. At the



time, there was no crypt for his body to go to, but this final resting place was fitting for other reasons.

Not only had Archbishop Carr overseen the completion of St Patrick's Cathedral, but the completion of the Sacred Heart Chapel was one of the final phases, and much of its décor was donated or paid for by Carr himself. The stained-glass windows were paid for exclusively from Carr's own pocket.

The Sacred Heart Chapel is one of seven chapels surrounding the sanctuary, forming the semi-circular 'apse' at the eastern end of the cathedral. That St Patrick's has an apse is surprising, since it was modelled primarily on English Gothic cathedrals, and they tended to be built with a square end. By including an apse, the architect of the cathedral, William Wardell, created a unique blend of the English and French Gothic traditions.
