Introduction:

A Dingo is a native animal that lives in the desert regions in Australia. They hunt wildy in packs of ten. Dingo's have a coat of sesame orange fur on top so in the desert it can be hard to find one. Lots of Dingos have adapted to the food diet in the Desert.

What Dingoes Look Like?

The dingo can stand more than 60cm high and weigh between 13-18kg, depending on its geographic location. Although mainly sandy-yellow in colour, some dingoes may also be black and tan.

Food Habits.

Dingo hunting is very adaptable. Animals hunt alone or in cooperative packs. They pursue small game such as rabbits, rodents, birds, and lizards. These dogs will eat fruits and plants as well.

Habitats.

From harsh deserts to lush rainforests, the highly adaptable dingo is found in every habitat and state of Australia except

Tasmania. In deserts, they live close to water to access drinking water. This determines where the animal can live.

Adaptations.

The colour of the Dingoes fur helps camouflaging in its surroundings. Behavioural adaptations: - Dingoes use howling to defend their territory and to send warning signals to their pack. These howls are also used to call back lost puppies.
