Australian Federal Police | Directions Program

The AFP Directions Program recognises the valuable contributions First Nations people make to policing for a safer Australia. It also helps ensure the AFP's workforce is representative of the communities we serve.

The 12-month integrated employment and development program is located in Canberra and runs annually from February to February. It provides permanent, full-time employment in specialist and

support positions in the AFP and gives participants professional development opportunities to have a challenging and rewarding career.

Participants who successfully complete the program will be promoted to an ongoing position with the AFP. Previous program participants have experienced a variety of different career paths, including transitioning to police officer or protective service officer roles.

Are you eligible?

The AFP Directions Program is open to Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander Australians who are 18 years or older at time of applying. No formal qualifications are required.

You should apply if you:

- Are interested in working for the AFP
- Have good communication skills
- Can work well as part of a team
- Have personal drive, integrity and a strong work ethic
- Are creative and can think in different ways
- Have experience using basic IT
- Are willing to relocate to Canberra

Be a Ballkid at International Tennis Tournaments

Ball boys and ball girls are an important part of the professional tennis scene. Responsible for picking up used balls and providing new ones to the players out on the courts, they keep the game going safely and smoothly.

If you're thinking about a future career in Tennis or another sport, or you're just really passionate about the game and would like to get out on the court yourself, why not sign up for the <u>National</u> <u>BallKid Program</u>. You could get some amazing experience to add to your resume, gain insight into the world of professional sports, watch the matches close up, or even get to network with some elite tennis players and their crew.

How to become a ball boy or girl in Australia

- Be aged between 12 and 17 years old
- Register your interest in the National Ballkid Program by completing the <u>online application</u>
 <u>form</u>

If you're selected, you'll have to attend trials either in the state where the tournaments are happening or at the National Training Centre.

Making the cut at trials means you'll have to attend the training program, which *could* mean you'll be selected as one of the 360 ball boys and ball girls taking part in the Australian Open.

You won't get paid for your hours spend on court, but you'll be supplied with the official uniform designed by Ralph Lauren no doubt (which you'll be allowed to keep). You might also bag a bunch of other goodies like the Apple AirPods, gift cards and backpacks that the 2021 ballkids received. You'll also get a food and travel allowance to cover your costs.

Future opportunities for ballkids

Taking part in the Australian Open could open doors for you to attend international tournaments and matches.

After the age of 16 if you'd like to progress your career, there's always the option to train as a <u>linesperson</u>, <u>umpire</u>, or work in other <u>court services</u>.

How and why you might need to register for the SAT

Australian students who'd like to apply to study at universities overseas may well need to complete an SAT exam as part of the application process.

What is the SAT?

The SAT is a standardised, multiple-choice, pencil-and-paper entrance exam that's widely used for college admissions in the United States (and some other countries).

How do you want to spend your time?

Spending your time doing the things you love

Unfortunately, there is only so much time a week to fill in with all the things we enjoy. There are 168 hours in a week, and assuming you're asleep for around 56 of them, and spending around 12 eating/washing/getting out of bed, that leaves you with 100 hours left for everything else.

Most of us want to be spending our time doing the things that make us happy, right? But we also need to balance our time doing stuff we enjoy with things we *need* to do. Getting that balance right is key.

How do you spend your time now?

If you're still at school, a big chunk of your time is taken up by attending school. Then there's time for homework, assignments, study, and maybe more.

What are the other things you do in your spare time? Do you play a sport or an instrument? Do you set aside time for a hobby each day or week? How much time do you spend with friends and family? Write down all the things that are taking up your time right now. Once you've done that, take a guess at how many hours each activity takes up every week. Don't forget to include things like chores or work, travelling to and from school, and any downtime.

How do you want to spend your time in the future?

Once you've got a visual idea of how you spend your time, reflect on it. Are you happy with the way you spend your time?

Maybe you'd like to spend more time with friends and family. Maybe you'd like to dedicate a bit more time to your schoolwork. Think about ways you might be able to reallocate your time to fit in more of the things you love.

Then, start thinking even further ahead. Once you finish school, how will the way you spend your time change? What would it look like if you go to uni? What might it look like if you start working?

Getting the balance right

Make another chart or graph, and this time put in how many hours you *want* to spend doing each activity (not how many you're currently doing now).

Does it match up well with the way you're spending your time now? If not, are there any ways you can shuffle your time to make space for more things that you enjoy?

Striking the right balance between the things we want and the things we need to do is important. If you don't get any downtime or time to enjoy things, you'll probably get burnt out. On the flipside, not doing the important things (study, chores, etc.) will probably lead to some issues in the future. Remember, the way we spend our time looks different for each individual. Some people feel most productive filling up all their time doing "important" things like study and work. Some people need a bit more breathing time, and that's okay too.

The important thing to remember is to find a balance that works for you and makes you happy.

Looking for goal setting inspiration in 2022?

In our previous blogs, we've looked at why you'd want to set goals as well as how to go about it, but it's not always that easy.

Stuck for ideas

It may not be New Year's Eve but that's not the only time you can set goals and resolutions, but sometimes settling on your goals can be the hardest part and could stop you from getting started. If you're still undecided about what goals can look like, we've put together some goal setting ideas that might inspire you.

Short-term goals (weeks, months, 1 year)

These might be the easiest goals to decide on. If there's something you've always want to do, or try, or achieve why not make 2022 the year that you give it a go.

They don't have to be supercool or on trend either, they can be anything that's important to you.

- Get homework and assignments done on time
- Research options after high school universities, degrees, alternative pathways including TAFE, private colleges, apprenticeships and traineeships
- Study for driver's license, book lessons & schedule practise time
- Get healthy monitor sleep, make better food choices, exercise more (& consistently), spend more time outdoors
- Spend more quality time with family and friends
- Invest in relationships that make you feel good
- Get an "A" in your favourite subject at school
- Research resume writing or create your resume
- Improve your soft skills
- Get a part-time job
- Volunteer
- Contribute more at home

Medium- term goals (1-5 years)

These goals may be a little trickier because you might not really know yet what you want to be doing in 5 years time – that's ok. Set goals that make sense to you now or you could make one of your goals to explore your future options and set clear goals in 2023.

- Save up to buy a car
- Get work experience preferably in a field related to your chosen career
- Run a marathon
- Apply for University / Apprenticeships / Traineeships / find a job
- Graduate from University
- Write a resume, keep it updated and work on getting skills and experience that will enhance my resume
- Learn a new language
- Take a gap year and travel
- Raise money for a cause or charity close to your heart

Long-term goals (5-10 years)

Again, long term goals might feel tricky right now, but it's important to remember they're not set in stone. Visualise the life you'd like 5 to 10 years from now, set some goals from that. If you change your mind completely in 2023, no problem, simply adjust your goals.

- Embark on a career that will make me happy
- Compete in State / National sports
- Live and work overseas
- Continued learning in my field of interest even when I am working
- Complete a degree
- Get promoted at work
- Put a deposit on my own home

It's all about YOU

The ideas we've listed are pretty generic, they're just to inspire you to think about what your goals could be.

So have a think about what you love, what makes you happy and the kind of life you'd like to end up living and go from there. There is no right or wrong.

How to become an Accountant

Become a money management superstar

What do Accountants do?

Accountants help individuals and organisations manage their money. This can be in a variety of ways – with taxes, finances, record management, auditing, budgeting, and much more. You might work as an employee in an independent accounting firm, or as an in-house accountant for a company. If you're great with maths, are analytical and organised, and are a great communicator, becoming an Accountant could be perfect for you.

About you:

- Great with maths
- Analytical and thorough
- Great communicator
- Excellent problem solver
- Can work in teams and independently
- Organised and efficient
- Precise and deadline-oriented
- Fantastic attention to detail

The job:

- Examining the cash flow of businesses

Accountants are most in demand in these locations:

This is a very large sized occupation, with around 205,700 people working as Accountants in Australia in 2020 (source: joboutlook.com.au). Demand for Accountants is spread fairly evenly across Australia, with a large share of workers in New South Wales. Most Accountants work in the Professional, Scientific and Technical Services industry.

How to become an Accountant in Australia

Before you can practice as an Accountant, you will need to complete a relevant Bachelor's degree, and register with one of Australia's three peak accounting bodies.

Step 1 – Complete Year 12 with a focus on English and Maths.

Step 2 – Find work experience in an accounting or business setting.

Step 3 – Complete a relevant undergraduate qualification, such as a Bachelor of Accounting, or Bachelor of Business majoring in Accounting.

Step 4 – Apply to become a <u>Certified Practicing Accountant</u> (CPA), a <u>Chartered Accountant</u> (CA), or join the <u>Institute of Public Accountants</u> (IPA).

Step 5 – Start working as a fully qualified accountant.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What do Accountants do?

Accountants are responsible for managing and advising on a variety of finance- and money-related matters.

Which industries employ Accountants?

Accountants are mostly employed in the Professional, Scientific and Technical Services industry.

What options are there for career progression?

You might like to specialise in a particular type of accounting, such as tax, forensic, investment, management, and more. Once you have build up lots of experience, you might even like to start your own firm or work freelance.

Do I need to go to university to become an Accountant?

You will need an undergraduate degree in order to work as a fully qualified Accountant in Australia.

Where do Accountants work?

There is demand for Accountants across Australia, particularly in New South Wales.

What are 3 things I can do right now to help me become an Accountant?

If you're in high school and you'd like to find out if a career as an Accountant is right for you, here's a few things you could do right now:

- Start up a budget or financial plan for yourself or your home and see if you can manage your money effectively. If you have a casual or part-time job, see if you can file your own tax return.
- 2. See if you can find work experience in an accountancy or business-based setting. This will help you see if you might enjoy the work, and can help you start building important contacts for the future.
- 3. Talk to an Accountant to see what a day in their life is like. If you don't know anyone, see if you can watch videos or documentaries about a career in accounting.
