Looking at the Readings

Jeremiah, in his emblematic and prophetic way, proclaims God's curse and blessing: curse on the wicked and blessing on the faithful and fruitful. The four verses, two with the curse, two with the blessing are symmetrical and sounds like a saying from the Wisdom literature. It's sentiment is one that is often repeated in the prophets and the wisdom books, in prayer and psalms. Luke uses this customary literary device in his rendition of the Beatitudes in today's Gospel passage.

There are striking differences between Matthew's popular version and Luke's version. It is not difficult for the reader to compare and recognise the variations. But by the juxtaposition of Jeremiah's prophecy and Luke's "Sermon on the Plain" the lectionary highlights Luke's addition of the four opposing "Alas" expressions often called "maledictions" but they are not so much curses but warnings urging conversion. Each so-called malediction begin with good but worldly values: wealth, plenty, pleasure and honour. Jesus is introducing to his disciples that the way to God includes the cross and persecution.

This gospel does not call for suffering but reminds us that God is with us in the difficulties of life and Christ gives us an example of overcoming these difficulties with faith in the resurrection.

Liturgical Jottings

The Colour Green

The Prophet Jeremiah compares the trusting person with a tree planted by the flowing waters. "Come heat or drought its foliage remains green" (Jer 17:8). Again in the Responsorial Psalm we see this tree's leaves shall never fade. Green symbolises life, growth and hope (Today's response Ps 39:5). Green vestments are worn at the Masses in Ordinary Time (except feasts and funerals). Green plants, banners and candles may also decorate the sanctuary. Green is descriptive of good ecology, clean environment and sustainable energy. This year the green season started the day after the feast of the Baptism of the Lord and goes until Shrove Tuesday. After Lent and Easter it resumes on the Monday after Pentecost and goes through to the eve of Advent.

REFLECTION FROM FR PETER

One of the great prayers coming to our lives over past years has been the 'Footsteps in the Sand' prayer. It's image is one where a set of footsteps recognizes another following behind. So the heart of story suggests, we don't walk alone!. In it's message in describing a dream of walking with the Lord across the sand, the one who describes this says, at the most difficult of times there is only one set of footprints,,,"I don't understand why in times when I needed you most, you should leave me"is the cry!

The Lord replies ... 'My child I love you, I would never leave you during your times of trial and suffering, for when you saw only one set of footprints, it was then that I carried you".

This call to trust in the lord's love and support is powerful for our reflection this Sunday. Happy are those who place their trust in the Lord is at the heart of the Psalm. Through the choices we make we seek the footprints guiding us along life's ways. From the Gospel reading of the Beatitudes there are no more challenging statements we take upon ourselves and our living. Sr Joan Chittister is a well renowned writer on contemporary issues facing the Church and how the Church can find a new relevance of connection with the Gospel.

Sr Joan writes ... "Instead of a common good, we seem more inclined to talk about the general good, as if we were willing to let some people right out of it". Sr Joan doesn't hold back in her feelings where injustices happen and the response we make either individually or as a community. The Beatitudes are a path to living with a common good of faith and life. As the final beatitude relates "Blessed are they who suffer persecution for justice's sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven".

In light of Sr Joan Chittister's thought for us and our living this week we could do well to ask ... 'What kind of common good do I desire and want to hear this week?" Happiness in the spirit of the footprints recognizes a continuing call God has for our living and the hopes we carry for this time of discerning the life we have in God and for God's communication to us.

<u>LENT 2022</u>.... This important season of our Church year is nearly upon us. Over the years doing something for Lent is a sound thought. Some have organized themselves to reflect upon the Sunday Mass readings, interest on this is happening. Others have suggested something on the lines of Could one person during the weeks of Lent be prepared to speak publically for say 10 minutes on their lives, whatever this may seem to be, or on a topic important to them. Then to have time to engage with a brief Q and A.

First Reading

A reading from the first book of Samuel

The Lord has put you in my power, but I will not raise my hand against you.

Saul set off and went down to the wilderness of Ziph, accompanied by three thousand men chosen from Israel to search for David in the wilderness of Ziph.

So in the dark David and Abishai made their way towards the force, where they found Saul asleep inside the camp, his spear stuck in the ground beside his head, with Abner and the troops lying round him.

Then Abishai said to David, 'Today God has put your enemy in your power; so now let me pin him to the ground with his own spear. Just one stroke! I will not need to strike him twice. David answered Abishai, Do not kill him, for who can lift his hand against the Lord's anointed and be without guilt?' David took the spear and the pitcher of water from beside Saul's head, and they made off. No one saw, no one knew, no one woke up; they were all asleep, for a deep sleep from the Lord had fallen on them.

David crossed to the other side and halted on the top of the mountain a long way off; there was a wide space between them. David then called out, 'Here is the king's spear. A reading from the holy Gospel according to Luke

Be merciful as your Father is merciful.

Jesus said to his disciples: 'I say this to you who are listening: Love your enemies, do good to those who hate you, bless those who curse you, pray for those who treat you badly. To the man who slaps you on one cheek, present the other cheek too; to the man who takes your cloak from you, do not refuse your tunic. Give to everyone who asks you, and do not ask for your property back from the man who robs you. Treat others as you would like them to treat you. If you love those who love you, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what thanks can you expect? For even sinners do that much. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners lend to sinners to get back the same amount. Instead, love your enemies and do good, and lend without any hope of return. You will have a great reward, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. 'Be compassionate as your Father is compassionate. Do not judge, and you will not be judged yourselves; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned yourselves; grant pardon, and you will be pardoned. Give, and there will be gifts for you: a full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap; because the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back.'
