Arrival in Cairns, Orientation and Transfer to Accommodation



Flight to Cairns: Welcome to the tropics! You are met at the airport by a Small World Journeys staff member who gives you an orientation & safety briefing. You are then transferred to your accommodation.

Accommodation: You stay at a 3-star hotel in the centre of Cairns' restaurant and shopping district, and only two blocks from the waterfront. The hotel features an outdoor pool, 24 hour reception, BBQ facilities, guest

laundry and free Wi-Fi. Student rooms are 4-share with ensuites while teachers stay in separate ensuite rooms.

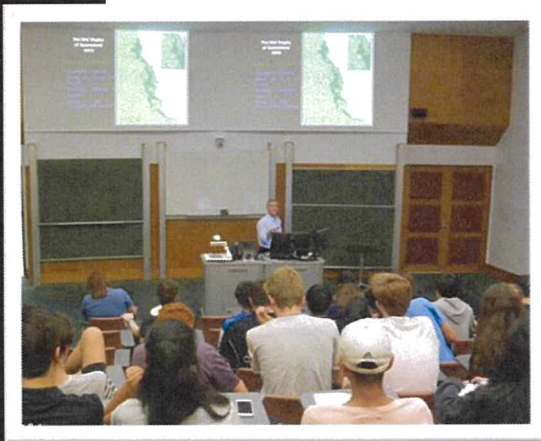

Biodiversity Presentation, Environmental Debate and Geography Presentation

Intro to The UNESCO World Heritage Wet Tropics: Before you encounter the rainforest, you first learn from an expert at the Wet Tropics Management Authority (WETMA) just what makes this region so special. Researchers, scientists and tourists alike come from all over the world to discover the supreme biodiversity in this World Heritage area, a region that came to be against all odds. You learn why this corner of Australia—with its jade mountains and lush emerald rainforests—is a geographical anomaly. By luck of shifting tectonic plates, the Wet



Tropics earned the longest continually growing rainforest in the world. Plants that ruled alongside dinosaurs still stand today. More than 100 animals are rare or threatened here and dozens of species live nowhere else in the world. Your expert discusses climate change protected area management and how different methods are used in the Wet Tropics. You leave with insight about and appreciation of this globally significant area you are

about to visit.

Environmental Debate: Students are then invited to participate in a debate which centers around issues of management and planning of Australia’s urban future. Students are given background information about a major development proposed for Cairns and then given different roles to play of community members. They then argue for or against the development to convince “council” (teachers). This requires evaluating current and



proposed future land use as well as human alteration of biomes, taking into consideration biotic and abiotic factors. This is a fun way to get involved with all sides of an environmental debate with a real-life example that has gained significant national media attention.

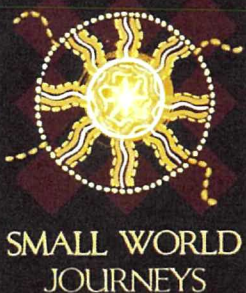


Future of The Reef Talk: In the evening you attend a unique presentation on the future of the Great Barrier Reef. Your marine naturalist teaches you the facts about the state of the reef, dispelling myths about bleaching and climate change, and relays the good, the bad and the ugly about reef tourism.

During this talk, you learn the four key threats to the reef and how scientists are trying “assisted evolution” by breeding corals that are resistant to bleaching under higher temperatures. Perhaps most importantly, you gain ten tips on how you yourselves can help save the reef and continue campaigning when you return home.

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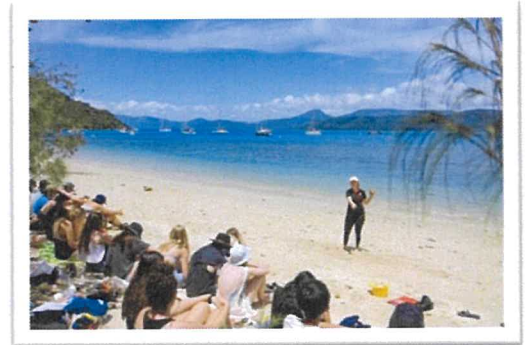
Fitzroy Island/Great Barrier Reef & Data Collection



Ferry Ride: This morning you are ferried to the pristine Fitzroy Island. A fringing coral reef surrounds the island, part of the inner Great Barrier Reef, providing a sheltered home for a kaleidoscope of marine life: colourful corals, parrot and lionfish, turtles, cuttle fish, rays and giant clams.

Guided Snorkelling: With full use of snorkel gear for the day, you can walk right into the water to explore the magnificent reef system that surrounds the island. Your marine naturalist leads you to underwater examples of biodiversity, parasitism, and commensalism as well as examples of the reef's most interesting features.

Activity Addressing Contemporary & Traditional Protected Area Management: A lunchtime mapping activity also helps students with their geography skills and to understand management strategies for the reef, both present and past. Students are led into a discussion about how the area has been traditionally managed by the Aboriginal and Torres Strait islander people for



over 60,000 years, addressing topics such as sustainable fishing, use of totems and Traditional Owner stewardship. Students are encouraged to consider and discuss what challenges there might be in using only traditional management



practices today, considering the present day uses of the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park. Contemporary management of the area is also looked at in detail, as well as the zoning plan released in 2003 by the Australian Government.



CoralWatch Data Collection: In the afternoon you engage in an activity that addresses concerns over climate change and coral bleaching. During

this exercise you find out more about how and why coral bleaches. You learn how to identify different kinds of coral, match its colours to a waterproof chart, and then record what you observe in teams of two. The data then goes back to the University of Queensland's Coral Watch scientists, where they analyse the results over time and look for any long term trends. Your results also go into a database to track bleaching around the world, and your group receives a graph of your results.



Beach Walk: In the afternoon, you traverse the island's tropical forest, keeping an eye out for reptilian skins and yellow-spotted monitors, to emerge at the fantastic Nudey Beach (not for nudists!). Nudey Beach was rated "Australia's Best Beach" by Australia's beach ambassador Brad Farmer.

Camping at Water's Edge: Your campground is beautifully situated only steps from the water where you set up your tents. There is a BBQ and covered pergola area for eating an ablutions block with toilets and cold showers. There is also a small store and Foxy's Café which offers a games area and nightly music.

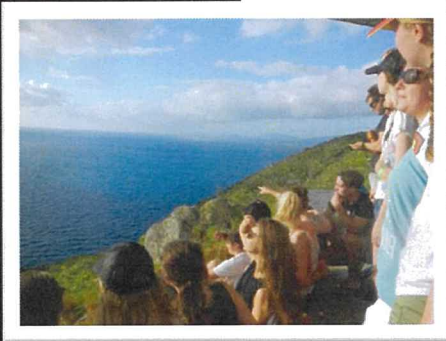

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Fitzroy Island Activities & Turtle Rehabilitation Centre



Lighthouse Hike: This morning if you rise early and are up for a challenge you can choose to walk a gorgeous but steep rainforest track that gives way to dry open forest and scenic vistas. At trail's end stands a historic lighthouse where views of the sparkling Coral Sea stretch to the horizon. For an extra challenge, push on to the summit of the island for 360-degree views.



Turtle Rehabilitation Centre: During your visit you also visit the island's Turtle Rehabilitation Centre where a collection of volunteers help save sick and injured sea turtles by looking after them until they are ready to be released back into the ocean.



Human Impacts & Water Quality Testing: Students are introduced to an activity that has them evaluating the island's human impacts throughout these two days, and are asked to fill in a "report card". Students also learn to measure water quality using chemical tests. Small World Journeys collects these tallies from each group that visits Fitzroy Island so we can log this data, analyse the results over time, and look for any long term trends.

Field Guide: *101 Animals of The Great Barrier Reef*, written by Dr. Martin Cohen, helps you to better understand the underwater world and is yours to keep.

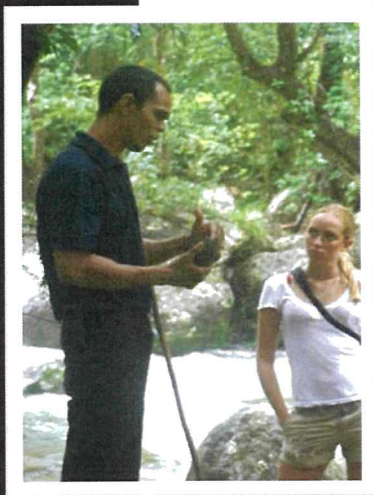




River Kayaking, Dot Painting with Indigenous Artist and Rainforest Walk with Indigenous Guide

Today your group will be split into three for the following activities:

River Kayaking: Today the river's pristine wilderness and gentle grade treat both first timers and experienced paddlers alike. First you are fitted with safety equipment and after a safety briefing you are given instruction on paddling skills. Holding the paddle and maneuvering through the water is basically the same both in a kayak or on top of a board. You then wind your way down the river, its banks cloaked in lush green rainforest, and you learn about this special place from your guide.

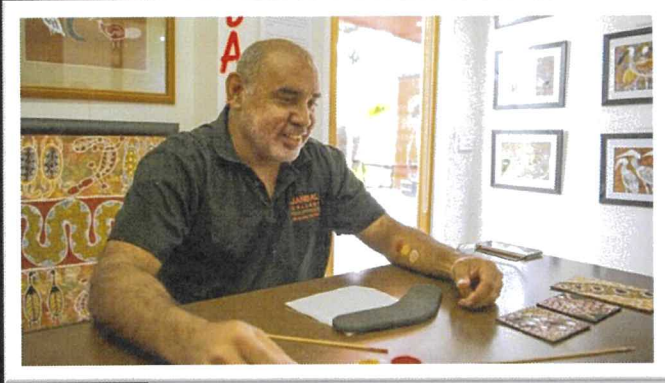


Aboriginal Guided Rainforest Walk: At the same time, one of the group visits Daintree National Park where emerald jungle drapes Mossman Gorge, an area sacred to the *Kuku Yalanji*. Beginning with a traditional smoking ceremony, you wander rainforest paths, discovering with your guide how these Aboriginal people found their way through dense rainforest, made shelter and learned which native plants were tasty to eat and those that served as weapons and

medicine. As your guide shares his stories, you learn how the seasons



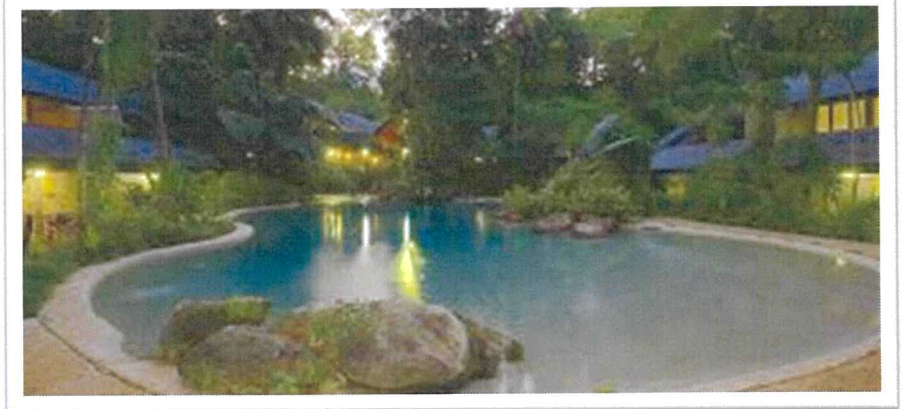
dictated life, what falls under men's and women's "business", how to make fire in the rainforest and how to make fish very easy to catch. You then sample billy tea and wattle seed damper (bread) made on the fire topped with jam from rainforest berries.



Dot Painting with Indigenous Artist: At an art gallery artist-in-residence Binna teaches you how to re-create the dot paintings that are a typical aboriginal style and symbolic of Australian art. He explains the meaning behind his paintings and what this art means to his people. You will be able to take your

canvas painting home with you - a perfect souvenir for your time in Cairns! Binna has an extra special story to tell students, Binna has lived since early childhood being profoundly deaf, he has at many stages of life, and in business; relied more on lip reading than hearing aids.

Daintree Rainforest Eco-Lodge: Your Daintree lodge boasts two attractive swimming pools, games lounge, guest laundry, BBQ area, and a superb location in the rainforest.

Rainforest Swimming and Tree Planting

Cape Tribulation and Swimming Hole: After a night of immersion in the rainforest, you wake to birdcalls and the chatter of the jungle. Nearby is a crystal-clear



rainforest swimming hole used by locals and a perfect place to cool off.

Native Tree Planting Service Work: Later with your guide you discuss loss of biodiversity and habitats for a range of species due to agriculture or development. Then with shovels and gloves, you plant native trees to moderate temperature and humidity and to create niches for other plants and animals. This area is a 'hotspot' for biodiversity so your service work here is helping to protect a buffer zone to a World

Heritage area. By working with seedlings, digging, planting, and watering today, you get to meet some local volunteers, help the environment and contribute to the community.

You return to Cairns at the end of the day.

James Cook University Marine Labs and Speaker

James Cook University Visit: JCU is Australia's highest-ranked university in environmental science and offers marine biology studies not found anywhere else.



Marine Labs & Aquarium: Popular with film crews, the marine labs here boast one of the world's best sites for capturing marine creatures on camera. Sophisticated equipment in the tanks allows for observing and filming animal behaviour up close. JCU's unique circular tank allows for a simulated current and the careful study of jellyfish. You meet staff who are on the cutting edge of marine science research, learn how they "milk" fish for venom, and about the latest findings in anti-venoms.

Venomous Creatures & Mangrove Biome: Here you meet unusual and deadly creatures such as sea horses, baby crocodiles, cone shells, the lethal *chironex* jellyfish, and the extremely rare lung fish, found in captivity only at JCU. The cast members of *Finding Nemo* live here too. You also investigate a working model of a mangrove biome, an important tool for studying effects on water quality and salinity as well as climate change mitigation.

Expert Speaker: Speakers may include famous venomologist Dr. Jamie Seymour, whose recent discovery that vinegar is not the best treatment for jellyfish stings has turned science on its head or Richard Fitzpatrick – "the shark wrangler" – a marine biologist and Emmy Award-winning cinematographer with more than 50 films for the BBC, National Geographic and Discovery Channel.

The Outer Great Barrier Reef

Snorkelling The Outer Great Barrier Reef with Marine Biologist and Data Collection



Boat Ride to Reef: Your day begins with an air-conditioned catamaran ride to the outer Great Barrier Reef. Your marine biologist presents what you are likely to see at the reef and introduces the *Eye on the Reef* program, which involves instruction on how to complete the Rapid Monitoring Survey.

Snorkeling and Data Collection:

Upon arrival, you dock at a floating pontoon, and an underwater universe greets you. During a guided snorkel tour with your marine biologist, you can expect to see a rainbow of hard and soft corals, turtles, and a variety of fish species including butterfly fish, giant Maori Wrasse, parrot fish, and the ever-popular clown fish, also known as “Nemo”.



Data Collection & Service: Next you receive in-water training on how to conduct the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority’s Rapid Monitoring Survey. Your marine guide will point out key features of the reef ecosystem, answer any questions, and conduct a practice survey with group. Then during a timed snorkel session, you record your underwater findings. Your guide and waterproof slates



help you identify a host of marine life and calculate benthic zone coverage. Most importantly, you look for signs of coral bleaching and coral predators which greatly affect the health of the reef. Your data is then collected and contributes to the central reporting system used by the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority (GBRMPA) to manage the long term sustainability of this UNESCO World Heritage area.



Other Activities: Semi-submarine and glass bottom boat tours, underwater observatory, and marine life touch tank are all available for you to enjoy. The double-storey pontoon also has something that no one else does..... a long and fun slide that finishes in the waters of the reef. Lunch today is a tropical buffet served on the boat.

Each student receives a certificate of participation at the end of the day.

Sightings App: Before the trip, we'll also give you information about downloading an app with which you can log in sightings of reef fauna and flora and your data is then sent to the Great Barrier Reef Marine Park Authority (GBRMPA)

Waterfalls, National Park and Outback Cattle Station

Today you enter Wooroonooran National Park—a diverse part of the UNESCO Wet Tropics World Heritage Area which hosts some of the oldest continually surviving rainforest in the world.

Josephine Falls: One of the most picturesque places in the entire Wet Tropics! You take an easy walk through the jungle, listening for the call of the king parrot and the bowerbird and emerge at

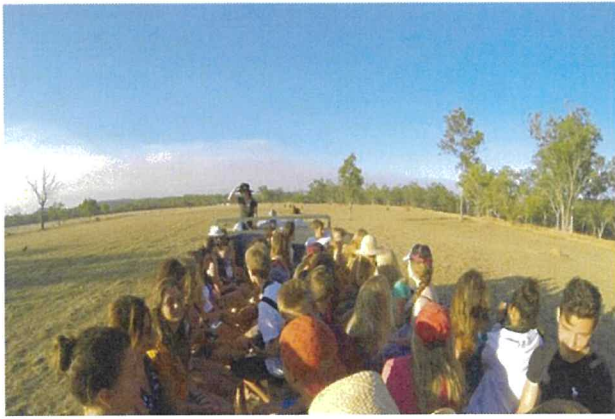


Josephine Falls, where Josephine Creek plunges down a gorgeous set of cascades. Below the falls, boulders surround a fun swimming hole and a natural water slide down a smooth sloping rock face.



Millaa Millaa Falls: Millaa Millaa (meaning “plenty of water” in the local Aboriginal language) is the icon of tropical north Queensland and one of the most photographed natural sites in the region. The waterfall flows over pure basalt rock thousands of years old in a dramatic burst. There is a fantastic swimming hole at the base of the falls, where it is possible to swim under and behind the falls.

Outback Cattle Station and Wildlife: As you cross the Great Dividing Range, you enter outback country, where the dirt turns red and gum trees prevail. Here you are welcome guests at a traditional working cattle station and homestead, opened to your group. On arrival, you hop in the hay truck to trace a route through the



station--much of which has been set aside for as a sanctuary for wildlife—and look for the kangaroos and crocodiles that roam the property.

Aussie BBQ and Stargazing: After a classic BBQ, you have a fire under starry outback skies. From this remote outback station, views of the stars are phenomenal. Students sleep in single-gender dorm-style bunk houses, while teachers sleep in separate cabins tonight.

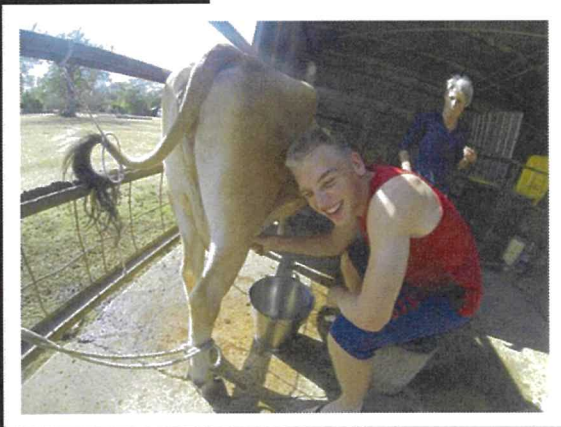

Outback Cattle Station and Skyrail Rainforest Cableway



Cattle Station Life: This morning you get a sample of true outback life on a cattle station. You visit the cattle yards to learn about the cattle musters and branding, and efforts made for humane animal treatment. You also learn what this robust rural family does to survive flooding, drought and economic hardships.

Cow Milking, Animals and Whip Cracking:

Breaking into small groups, you can visit

the goats and chickens, learn how to milk the cows and crack a whip properly in true cowboy style. You also take a walk back through time on the homestead to the age of the early Australian pioneers, and you can touch the old furniture, trinkets and memorabilia all well-preserved by the family.



Boomerang Throwing: Yes, they actually come back to you! Your guide teaches you the significance of the boomerang and how they were cleverly used for hunting. You learn proper throwing technique and what makes them return.

Skyrail Rainforest Cableway: Before returning to Cairns you experience Cairns premier eco-attraction and winner of numerous ecotourism awards – the Skyrail. You are transferred to this unique rainforest cableway for a fantastic journey over Australia's World Heritage listed tropical rainforest canopy and deep into the forest. Spanning 7.5 kilometres over Barron Gorge National Park, the Skyrail experience includes a scenic cableway ride and stops at two rainforest mid-stations. You can descend from the cableway

onto rainforest boardwalks, where interpretive information is provided through guided boardwalk tours, signage and an interpretive centre.

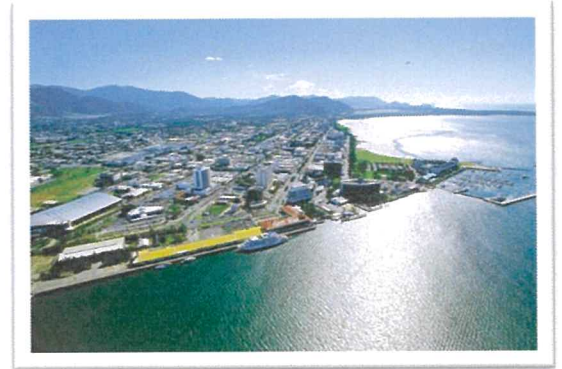

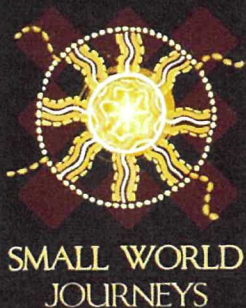
This morning after breakfast you have some time to do some last-minute shopping. Then eventually all good things must come to an end and you are transferred back to the Cairns Airport for your flight home.

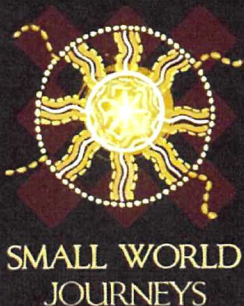

FAQs

What is Small World Journeys?

Small World Journeys is an educational tour operator. We have been operating since 2008. We offer multi-day adventures that include expert instruction by our guides, meals, accommodation, ground transport and lots of goodies.



What is your safety record?

We have had hundreds of students travel with us, and our safety record is excellent. Ask us for teacher references specifically regarding safety.

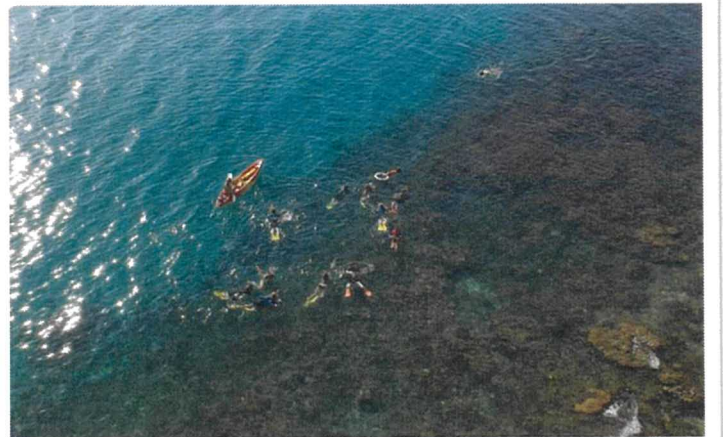
Safety is absolutely our number one concern at all times. We carry a first aid kit in our vehicles, as well as on the guide's person when in remote areas. We do everything in our power to make sure each trip is as safe as it can possibly be.

Do you do risk assessments?

Yes. We evaluate and re-evaluate the safety of each of our destinations and activities, and we always reserve the right to modify or cancel an itinerary if the guide feels that conditions are unsafe. We will gladly provide a risk management assessment specific to your trip on request. Small World Journeys' staff also adhere to a comprehensive Risk Management Strategy.

What kind of food will we have?

We understand how important food is to young people – and heaps of it!



A typical breakfast will be a continental breakfast including juices, cereals, toast & jams (and optional vegemite!) and a typical packed lunch will be a meat and salad sandwich, drink, chips, biscuits and a piece of fresh fruit. Café lunches and dinners will vary, but we place a big emphasis on variety and healthful options.

Best of all, we carry our snack box when we travel to ensure that no one is ever hungry. Self-catering options are available for those who would like to prepare group meals. Most student groups request all meals be included in their trip.

Where will we sleep?

We choose accommodation for our educational groups that is safe and clean. Options range from sleeping in tents at well-appointed campgrounds to budget hotels and youth hostels – selected according to your budget and itinerary. At some accommodation it is possible to cook group meals yourselves.



Whenever possible, we use locally-owned accommodation options to keep income in the community.

We have a 24-hour mobile number that parents may ring at any time during their child's trip if there is an emergency, and we will also provide the group coordinator with contact details of where the group is staying each night.

What about sharks or jellyfish?

The ocean is home to sharks, but the ones you may encounter at the Great Barrier Reef are small and pose little threat to swimmers. In fact, divers and snorkelers often consider themselves lucky to spot one of these shy, magnificent creatures. Australia's famed Great White sharks prefer cold water, and therefore are not found at the Great Barrier Reef.

Stingers, also known as box jellyfish, breed in estuaries and are rare at The Great Barrier Reef. Therefore, they do not pose a big threat to snorkelers or divers.

Stingers are only a consideration on the beaches between November and April, and most of the local beaches have stinger nets so that people may still swim.



How do we travel?

You travel in comfortable well-maintained air-conditioned vehicles with a seat belt for every passenger. We have a 13-seat mini bus for small groups and a Toyota Coaster bus for groups larger than 13 participants. If the group is larger than

24, we hire additional vehicles. Our guides all have a state-issued Driver's Authority (DA) and must have a special bus license to drive our vehicles.

What do we need to pack?

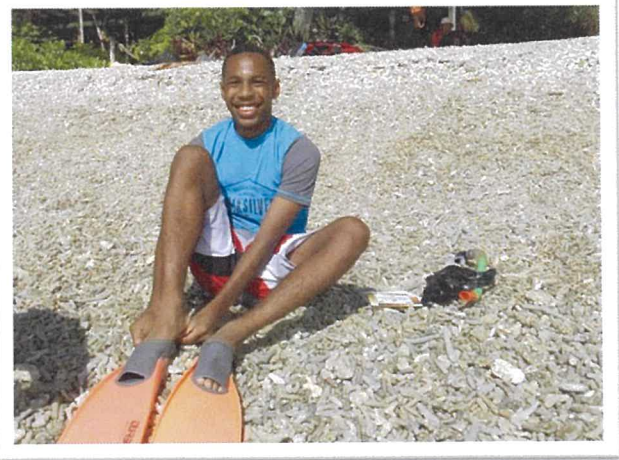
A Suggested Packing List will be sent to every group organiser so students will be able to adequately prepare for their trip.



When is the best time to visit Cairns - What is the weather like?

Cairns is a tropical place, and outdoor activities can be enjoyed year-round. In our summer (December-February), the weather is at its warmest and wettest. You can expect hot days with occasional tropical storms, producing lush green hillsides and plenty of waterfalls. Average temperatures are 23-31 degrees Celsius/73-87 Fahrenheit.

In our winter (June-August), the climate is at its most mild, with warm days, cool nights, and little rainfall. Average temperatures are 18-26 degrees Celsius/64-78 degrees Fahrenheit.



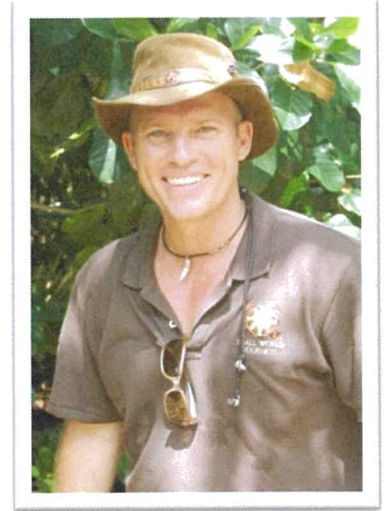
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What qualifications do your guides have?

Our Cairns guides have a government-issued "Blue Card" that is only given after an extensive background check, and allows them the ability to work with children. Each guide also has a Senior First Aid and CPR certification and government-issued Driver's Authority.

Many of our educational adventures guides have higher degrees in environmental science, marine biology or experiential education, and there is one thing which unites them: a love for teaching young people about the outdoors.

We choose guides with extensive experience having worked with young people. We will take into consideration your educational objectives and assign one of our guides who will be the best match for your group.



What kind of insurance do you have in place?

Small World Journeys has public liability insurance up to \$20,000,000 and is required for us to maintain our commercial permits for the national parks.

What happens if a student cancels?

If an individual student cancels from a trip within 30 days of the trip departure, no refunds are given. For this reason, we strongly encourage all parents to purchase trip cancellation insurance in order to protect against unforeseen circumstances which are the main cause for student cancellations.

How does Small World Journeys incorporate our educational objectives?

We work directly with the teacher organiser or group leader to understand the goals of the trip. Then we suggest activities and learning opportunities to match these objectives.

For example, a group may be interested in learning more about marine biology. In this case we will facilitate some fun classroom time dedicated to marine science in Cairns, then a couple of days at the Great Barrier Reef with our marine biologist guide. We can include such things as reef field guides for each student, and mini-

lectures after snorkel time. A SCUBA certification course may also be appropriate. Alternatively, we might suggest a few days at an island research station, during which students have classroom and snorkel time, as well as a service project monitoring coral bleaching on the reef.



Whether it is marine science, aboriginal culture, rainforest ecology or another topic, we will work with each group to ensure an educational yet fun experience for all.

What makes us "eco-friendly"?

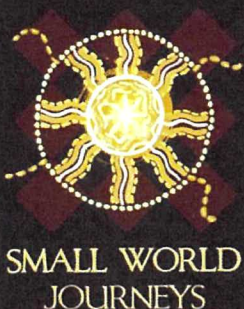

BOOKING

IF YOU ARE A TEACHER BOOKING A GROUP TRIP (or an individual on that trip)

The booking of any trip requires a **\$150 AUD per person non-refundable deposit**. This amount is based on estimated participant numbers and comes off the total balance due. Until this deposit is received, no trip is confirmed. We advise you not to make any travel plans or book flights until you have received our confirmation.

For student groups, we must then receive the following:

- 1) **BOOKING FORM** (accessed on our website) **NO LATER THAN 60 DAYS PRIOR TO THE TRIP**

We urge you to check the details we send you carefully and to contact us immediately if there is any incorrect information.

Please note that before we can accept your booking it is a mandatory requirement that you accept these terms and conditions.

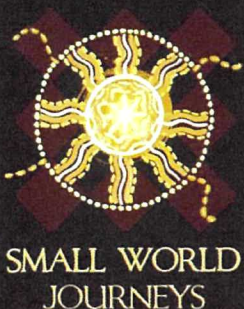
If you are the parent/guardian of a minor student, you will need to e-sign the **Release, Discharge and Indemnity Form BEFORE remitting any payment to Small World Journeys**. You are agreeing to the terms and conditions of this agreement and that it is a legally binding agreement between Small World Journeys and you.

If you are an adult participant, you understand that you are entering into this agreement electronically and that by clicking "Submit Form", you are agreeing to the terms and conditions of this agreement and that it is a legally binding agreement between Small World Journeys and you. You must agree to these terms and conditions **BEFORE remitting any payment to Small World Journeys**.

PAYMENT

At time of booking.....\$150 per person non-refundable deposit

60 days prior to departure..... Balance is due



If you sign up for a trip within 60 days of trip departure, full payment is due at the time of booking. If your payment is not received when due, Small World Journeys reserves the right to consider the reservation cancelled and you will be forfeiting your deposit.

We accept direct deposits, Australian bank cheques, and international cheques in Australian dollars or international wire transfers in Australian dollars. Our bank details are listed on your invoice. We also take payments on line with **MasterCard and Visa** but please note group payments by these credit cards will attract a **1.5% surcharge**.

CANCELLATIONS

IF YOU CANCEL

Accidents happen; emergencies occur. For this reason we strongly recommend travel insurance. Travel insurance will protect you should an emergency happen that prevents you from participating on your Small World Journeys trip.

If it is necessary for you to cancel your trip, you must notify us in writing by email or letter immediately. If we are unable to find a suitable alternative trip or trip date, we will refund you the cost of your trip less the following, per person charges:

61 days or more prior to departure.....\$150 per person

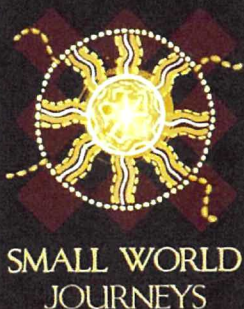
60-31 days prior to departure.....50% of total price

30 days or less prior to departure.....No Refund

Your refund will be calculated on the day we receive your written cancellation.

COVID-19 special policy:

If an individual on a group trip must cancel his or her trip up to the date of departure due to a positive COVID-19 diagnosis (or having been required to quarantine because of exposure to someone who has tested positive to COVID-19), then Small World Journeys shall refund the trip cost to that individual, less the \$150 per person deposit. A letter from a doctor or clinic will be requested, and refund will be issued once the letter has been emailed to Small World Journeys. If an individual discovers s/he has COVID-19 during the course of the Small World Journeys trip, then we will attempt to refund any unused portion, keeping in mind most payments are made to suppliers in advance so we therefore cannot *guarantee* any refund once the trip has begun.



TRANSFERS

- If you postpone your trip more than 60 days prior to trip departure date we will be happy to transfer 100% of your monies paid to another Small World Journeys trip or different departure date within 12 months of the original trip start date. If canceling, the cancellation fees above apply.
- From 31 to 60 days prior to departure—50% of the cost of Small World Journeys scheduled trip is non-transferable and non-refundable.
- Less than 30 days prior to departure – all amounts paid to Small World Journeys scheduled trip are non-transferable and non-refundable.

COVID-19 special policy:

If you postpone your trip more than **48 hours prior to trip departure date** because Queensland and or/your home state impose state border or regional border restrictions that make it not feasible to travel, we will be happy to transfer your monies paid to another Small World Journeys trip or different departure date within 12 months of the original trip start date. Please note that if the postponed trip occurs in the new tourism year (April-March), a requote may be necessary to account for suppliers price increases. If cancelling completely, the cancellation fees above will apply.

FOR ALL PARTICIPANTS:

IF WE CANCEL YOUR TRIP

Small World Journeys may cancel a trip due to logistical or operational issues, insufficient sign-ups or any other cause that makes the trip unfeasible for us to operate. If we do not find an alternative for you that is acceptable, you are entitled to a full refund and that will constitute full settlement.

We may also cancel departures if forced to do so by circumstances such as war, civil or political unrest or what is commonly referred to as **FORCE MAJEURE**.

Force Majeure

In the case of Force Majeure (meaning a circumstance beyond Small World Journeys' reasonable control including, but not limited to, war or threat of war, riot, civil strife, terrorist activity, industrial dispute, disease, industrial or nuclear disaster, adverse weather conditions, fire and strikes), Small World Journeys will not be liable for any delay, change or cancellation of trips.

Small World Journeys normally makes significant payments to its suppliers (hotels, outfitters, etc.) far in advance of the scheduled departure date. If a trip is cancelled



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due to force majeure, Small World Journeys will promptly refund the portion of the trip cost not already advanced to suppliers. Small World Journeys may, in its discretion, recover from its suppliers a refund of money paid in respect of any trip cancelled due to Force Majeure. Where this occurs, a refund will be given. Otherwise, Small World Journeys will not be liable to refund money paid in respect of a cancelled trip.

Please note Small World Journeys is also not responsible for expenses incurred while preparing for a cancelled trip (e.g., nonrefundable advance purchase air tickets, special equipment, visa fees, loss of enjoyment, etc.) or for any additional arrangements made before or after the cancelled trip.

REFUNDS

Prices are quoted as a package, and in many cases are based on group participation. Therefore, Small World Journeys does not give refunds for unused services, activities or meals. Additionally, no refund will be given if you voluntarily leave a trip for any reason after the trip has begun. Refunds will be at the discretion of Small World Journeys should you be forced to leave a trip for any reason. No refunds will be given to a participant in a group who cancels less than 30 days prior to the trip (please consider travel insurance for this reason)

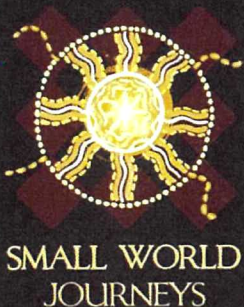
CHANGES TO ITINERARY

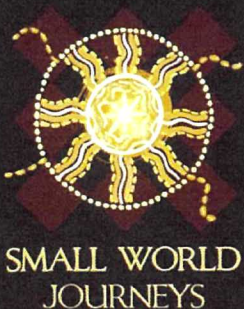
COMPLAINTS

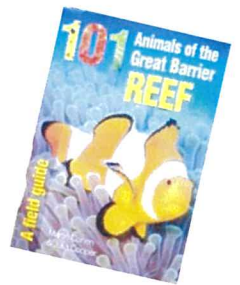
