Reflection

One of the differences between human beings is that between male and female. These distinctive ways of being human are meant to be integrated into a unity which does not abolish the difference.

Our Lord reminded his Jewish audience of this by going to the Jewish creation stories and alluding to the passage

in Genesis. He says: 'But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the *two* become *one* body. They are no longer *two*, therefore, but *one* body.'

So, Our Lord is saying that when a man and woman cleave to each other in marriage, that is 'a Paradise moment'. Gender difference is incorporated into a new unity which does not abolish, but paradoxically enhances the difference.

Same sex partners can, of course, bring many virtues and loving dimensions to their relationship: enduring friendship, care in troubled times, joy. But they cannot embody the celebration of difference in the way a heterosexual couple do when cleaving into a new unity.


We acknowledge and celebrate Brian's years of generous service by presenting him with his well-earned Emeritus Vincentian Award at Sunday's Mass.

The Boon Wurrung People

Melbourne was the shared country of the Boon Wurrung and the Woi Wurrung (today Wurundjeri) peoples. Both were part of the larger Kulin confederacy or nations of five peoples that shared similar languages or *wurrungs*. Kulin means 'the people'. These language groups were part of about 30 tribes in Victoria, numbering perhaps 60,000 people before the British arrived.

The six clans of the Boon Wurrung people, sometimes called the 'Coast' or 'Westernport' tribe, were associated with today's southern suburbs, Mornington Peninsula, Westernport and Wilson's Promontory. The Yalukit Willam was the northernmost clan of the Boon Wurrung. They were recorded occupying the coastal strip from St Kilda to the Werribee River, including Williamstown, Port Melbourne, South Melbourne and Prahran.

Today's City of Melbourne was a central location where the Kulin clans met regularly for social, ceremonial, trade, initiation, marriage and judicial purposes, often north of Emerald Hill near today's Queens Bridge. Here in Brighton, an Indigenous art trail along the foreshore records the activities of Aboriginals, gathering emu eggs, shell fish and yams. Dendy Beach is the site of several middens, or piles of shells, which mark places of feasting. Stone axe heads have been found on the foreshore and water wells are to be found at Ricketts Point.

First Reading: Gen 2:18-24

The Lord God said, 'It is not good that the man should be alone. I will make him a helpmate.' So from the soil the Lord God fashioned all the wild beasts and all the birds of heaven. These he brought to the man to see what he would call them, each one was to bear the name the man would give it. The man gave names to all the cattle, all the birds of heaven and all the wild beasts. But no helpmate suitable for man was found for him. So the Lord God made the man fall into a deep sleep. And while he slept, he took one of his ribs and enclosed it in flesh. The Lord God built the rib he had taken from the man into a woman, and brought her to the man. The man exclaimed:

'This at last is bone from my bones, and flesh from my flesh! This is to be called woman, for this was taken from man.'

This is why a man leaves his father and mother and joins himself to his wife, and they become one body.

Second Reading: Heb 2:9-11

We see in Jesus one who was for a short while made lower than the angels and is now crowned with glory and splendour because he submitted to death; by God's grace he had to experience death for all mankind.

As it was his purpose to bring a great many of his sons into glory, it was appropriate that God, for whom everything exists and through whom everything exists, should make perfect, through suffering, the leader who would take them to their salvation. For the one who sanctifies, and the ones who are sanctified, are of the same stock; that is why he openly calls them brothers.

Gospel: Mark 10:2-16

Some Pharisees approached Jesus and asked, 'Is it against the law for a man to divorce his wife?' They were testing him. He answered them, 'What did Moses command you?' 'Moses allowed us' they said 'to draw up a writ of dismissal and so to divorce.' Then Jesus said to them, 'It was because

you were so unteachable that he wrote this commandment for you. But from the beginning of creation God made them male and female. This is why a man must leave father and mother, and the two become one body. They are no longer two, therefore, but one body. So then, what God has united, man must not divide.' Back in the house the disciples questioned him again about this, and he said to them, 'The man who divorces his wife and marries another is guilty of adultery against her. And if a woman divorces her husband and marries another she is guilty of adultery too.'

People were bringing little children to him, for him to touch them. The disciples turned them away, but when Jesus saw this he was indignant and said to them, 'Let the little children come to me; do not stop them; for it is to such as these that the kingdom of God belongs. I tell you solemnly, anyone who does not welcome the kingdom of God like a little child will never enter it.' Then he put his arms round them, laid his hands on them and gave them his blessing.



Readings For Next Week
Wis 7:7-11 Heb 4:12-13 Mk 10:17-30

SCPIPTUPAL CONTECNIAL Discipleship

This section of Mark's Gospel explores what it means to be a disciple. While this particular passage may seem to be a bit out of place, Jesus seems to be stressing to the disciples that there are some bottom lines – some non-negotiables - when it comes to being a disciple. Unlike the Pharisees who are preoccupied with the letter of the Law, Jesus encourages his disciples to get beyond that and understand the spirit of the Law - God's dream for humankind. The shift in the passage to the focus on children seems a little disconnected but the whole passage is about living in the kingdom with the right attitude.
