# **Looking at the Readings**

The painting Rephidim by John Dubrow depicts the scene in the first reading about Moses whose arms were supported by Aaron and Hur while he prayed to God for victory against Amalek. Dubrow notes: "The battle confronts us with difficult questions that defy easy answers." The Amalekites were cut down. Does God condone such hostility? What is the message of this reading? One noted writer, Fr Ronald Rolheiser OMI, explained it this way: "when we read passages in the Old Testament of much slaughter, we need to read the fine print at the foot of the page: 'no person was harmed in the production of this story'." While often the stories are embellished, and numbers exaggerated to convey God's power and protection, we do wonder what really happened. This passage, like many others, have quite a different angle on the events — or rather about the relationship between God and the people. God is the protector of his people; he answers their pleas. While the people may forget his promises and fail to trust, God does not forget his people, his ways are not our ways. The responsorial psalm sums up this relationship well. Today's Gospel adds another light on the necessity for perseverance in prayer.

# **Liturgical Jottings**Mass for Various Intentions

Last week we looked at Masses and prayers for various needs and occasions, section 2 for Civil or Public Needs in the Roman Missal "These provide Mass formularies that may be used in the various times of Christian life." GIRM 368. Section 3 is titled: "For Various Intentions or for personal needs. The Masses include intentions for: Forgiveness of Sins, Chastity, Charity, Relatives and Friends, Our Oppressors, Those Held in Captivity, Those in Prison, the Sick, the Dying, the Grace of a Happy Death, In Any Need, Giving Thanks to God, The Roman Missal in USA adds: Giving Thanks to God for the Gift of Human Life. The Ambrosian Missal (in Italy) adds: for Concord and one for the Family. Since the missals had been printed new Masses and prayers have been approved: In Time of Pandemic (2021) and Mass of Care for Creation (2025).

# **Weekly Reflection**

THE NEED TO PRAY AND NOT TO GIVE UP - Let's reflect and learn.

Prayer is important in Luke's Gospel. Jesus prays (3:21; 5:16; 6:12; 9:18, 28; 22:41), and sweats drops of blood in the agony of prayer on the Mount of Olives (22:44). He also teaches the disciples about prayer (6:28; 11:1-13; 18:9-14; 19:46; 20:47; 22:40, 46). The parable that follows tells of the persistent prayer of the widow. More importantly, it tells us of the character of God. There is no question that persistent prayer – continuing communion with God – reshapes our hearts to God's original design. Once this happens, clogged channels are cleared to receive God's mercies.

"There was a judge in a certain city who didn't fear God, and didn't respect (entrepomenos) man" (v. 2). Moses charged judges to render fair and honest decisions irrespective of the wealth or social standing of the petitioner (Deuteronomy 1:16-17) — but we cannot expect justice from this judge, who does not fear God or respect people. Fearing God is a positive attribute in both Old and New Testaments. When Jehoshaphat appointed judges over Judah, he counselled them, "Now therefore let the fear of Yahweh be on you. Take heed and do it: for there is no iniquity with Yahweh our God, nor respect of persons, nor taking of bribes" (2 Chronicles 19:7). Luke has mentioned that God's "mercy is for generations of generations on those who fear him (1:50). When Jesus tells us that this judge does not fear God, we know that the judge is not to be trusted.

"A widow was in that city, and she often came to him, saying, 'Defend me from my adversary!" (v. 3). Widows are symbols of vulnerability in both Testaments. With no means of support, they were dependent their grown children or on. Because of their vulnerability, the scriptures demand protection for widows: God has a special affection for widows, orphans and aliens (Deuteronomy 10:18-19); just as God provided relief for the Israelites from their Egyptian captivity, God requires Israel to provide relief for other vulnerable people (Deuteronomy 24:17-21); Jesus condemns those "who devour widow's houses" (20:47); the early church provides food for widows (Acts 6:1-6); widows are honoured, because of their dependence on God (1 Timothy 5:3-5).

This widow, like the man who demanded bread from his neighbor in the middle of the night (11:5-8), persists in asking. Her feisty character is unusual for a woman in that patriarchal society, but she has the weight of scripture and justice on her side. She dwells on high moral ground, and everyone knows it. This judge would not tolerate this nagging behavior by a man, but even a judge who knows no shame must exercise forbearance in the presence of a woman who enjoys the protection of scripture and the sympathy of the community.

"He wouldn't for a while" (v. 4a). Perhaps the judge is waiting for a bribe. Perhaps he reserves favourable treatment for wealthier or more influential people. Perhaps he just doesn't want to be bothered.

"but afterward he said to himself, 'Though I neither fear God, nor respect man, yet because this widow bothers me, I will defend her, or else she will wear me out by her continual coming" (vv. 4b-5). The word translated "wear me out" is hypopiaze – literally "hit under the eye." While the judge cares nothing for God or man, he recognizes that this woman can create problems for him. But it makes no difference to our understanding of this parable why this judge gives the woman what she wants. This judge is not a "stand-in" for God. Instead, this parable contrasts this evil judge with our loving God.

"Won't God avenge his chosen ones" (eklekton) (v. 7a). Jesus argues from the lesser to the greater. If the unjust judge will do the right thing for this widow, even if for the wrong reasons, can't we expect God to do the right thing for us? Can't we expect a loving God vindicate "his chosen ones"?

"who are crying out to him day and night" (v. 7). This story suggests "that every word of prayer must penetrate to a depth of the heart that can be reached only by unceasing iteration" (Bonhoeffer, Life Together). The passion of those who cry to God day and night reminds us of Jesus' prayer just before his death. "Being in agony he prayed more earnestly. His sweat became like great drops of blood falling down on the ground" (22:44). The Father did not respond by removing the cup of suffering, but by redeeming it.

# The Holy Rosary at St Mel's Parish - October


Prior to each Sunday Mass in October the Rosary will be recited in St Mel's Church, commencing at 9am and again at 4:30pm.

# St Mel's Parish Sacramental Program


This year we have 14 Candidates journeying towards the Sacraments of Initiation: Reconciliation - Confirmation - First Eucharist
