It was great to chair the recent Bellarine Community Safety (bSafe) meeting, a community group that provides a direct line from Bellarine organisations and community groups to law enforcement. Through partnerships with bSafe and Neighbourhood Watch, we focus on prevention and education, including:

- SCAM WATCH awareness sessions
- Licence plate anti-theft screw days
- School programs on online safety & road rules

• "Coffee with a Cop" community sessions

At the recent meeting, we discussed local police operational services. It is important to highlight that all operational decisions, including where police officers are stationed, or when and where police stations are open are made independently by the Chief Commissioner of Victoria Police.

In the Bellarine, it is important to note that the Water Police are now permanently based in Queenscliff, and the Drysdale Station is currently not operational. Across the Bellarine, police officers remain on patrol around the clock, and vans and highway patrols are actively present throughout the peninsula. Last year, both the Bellarine (Ocean Grove) and Portarlington Stations received additional police members, and further officers will be deployed for the summer period.

In addition, Victorian Police Chief Commissioner Mike Bush has recently announced state-wide organisational restructure aimed at putting more police officers back on the streets and into frontline roles, and I welcome this shift toward more visible community policing.

I will continue to advocate for, and support, our local police, while our government strengthens the laws they rely on. Last year, we introduced tougher penalties for serious repeat offenders, and these reforms are already having an impact, but we know there is more to do.

With the summer season upon us, please remember to stay safe around our waterways and drive carefully on our roads. Our region welcomes many visitors eager to enjoy our beautiful coastlines and local businesses, and together we can help ensure everyone gets home safely.

As the weather warms up, it's also important to be prepared for fire. If you don't have a fire plan, visit www.fireplanner.vic.gov.au to create one in less than 10 minutes.

To stay up to date with incidents and warnings, download the VicEmergency app. It provides up-to-date information and clear advice on what actions to take in different situations.


E-Scooter and E-bike update:

Fuzzy marketing by importers and dodgy retailers continue to lead people to believe that their E-Scooters, E-bikes and petrol powered bicycles can be legally ridden on Victorian roads.

The start of October has seen police on the Bellarine step up their enforcement of the rules around E-Scooters and non-compliant bicycles. 5 Caution notices were issued for riding an unregistered motorcycle (petrol powered bicycles) and 3 were seized for destruction (much to the horror of their owners!). 8 tickets were issued for failing to wear a properly fitted and adjusted helmet whist riding an e-scooter at the cost of \$411 each.

8 warnings were given out for various offences including riding on the footpath, riding on a roadway with a posted speed limit in excess of 60 km/h and carrying a pillion passenger.

2 teenagers were detected travelling on the same e-scooter at night along Thacker Street, Ocean Grove at 74km/h with no lights and no helmets. Another teenager on an converted e-bike stunned police as he blew by them at 66km/h on Shell Road. All riders will be looking for well paying jobs over the school holidays to pay off their fines.

Park Wisely

Out for a ride with your mates, or alone – when you park your bike or scooter and leave it unattended, ensure you have locked it securely.

Lock your bike to a bike hoop or a secure pole or railing. If you don't have a locking device with you, have a mate watch out for your ride.

For added security, consider fitting an Air Tag or similar to your ride.

And at home, store your bike in a locked shed, garage or in the house to keep them secure.

With Spring and sunny weather comes visitors to the Bellarine. Impaired driving under the influence of alcohol and drugs is one of the biggest killers on Victorian roads. Bellarine and Portarlington Police are committed to keeping the community safe and taking impaired drivers off our roads. Random breath testing stations are being set up anywhere, anytime across the Bellarine to help ensure the safety of all road users on the Bellarine.

Why drinking, then driving is dangerous

- 1 in 5 drivers killed on our roads have a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) .05 or higher.
- Driving while under the influence of alcohol affects perception, vision, concentration, reaction time and causes drowsiness all of which increase the risk of a crash.
- Alcohol can affect us in different ways from one day to the next that's why there's never a 'safe' amount to drink when you're planning to drive.
- If everyone avoided driving after drinking, the number of road fatalities could be reduced by up to 20%. That's around 50 lives that could be saved every year.
