As we reflect on these readings, let us remember God's love and mercy. Despite our failures, He offers us hope. By staying strong in our faith and doing His will, we become part of His true family.


Let us face our challenges with courage, knowing that God is with us. We look forward to the eternal glory He has promised. Our faith in God sustains us through all difficulties.

GOSPEL

Mark 3:20-35

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark *It is the end of Satan.*

Jesus went home with his disciples, and such a crowd collected that they could not even have a meal. When his relatives heard of this, they set out to take charge of him, convinced he was out of his mind.

The scribes who had come down from Jerusalem were saying, 'Beelzebul is in him,' and, 'It is through the prince of devils that he casts devils out.' So he called them to him and spoke to them in parables, 'How can Satan cast out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot last. And if a household is divided against itself, that household can never stand. Now if Satan has rebelled against himself and is divided, he cannot stand either - it is the end of him. But no one can make his way into a strong man's house and burgle his property unless he has tied up the strong man first. Only then can he burgle his house.

'I tell you solemnly, all men's sins will be forgiven, and all their blasphemies; but let anyone blaspheme against the Holy Spirit and he will never have forgiveness: he is guilty of an eternal sin.' This was because they were saying, 'An unclean spirit is in him.'

His mother and brothers now arrived and, standing outside, sent in a message asking for him. A crowd was sitting round him at the time the message was passed to him, 'Your mother and brothers and sisters are outside asking for you.' He replied, 'Who are my mother and my brothers?' And looking round at those sitting in a circle about him, he said, 'Here are my mother and my brothers. Anyone who does the will of God, that person is my brother and sister and mother.'

VINNIES WINTER APPEAL

BUILDING A RELATIONSHIP WITH MELBOURNE TRANSITION INDIGNEOUS SCHOOL (MITS)

About twelve months ago, all Jesuit parishes in Australia were asked to try and develop some outreach initiative to local indigenous



communities. A small group was formed at Saint Ignatius to respond to this, and decided that for us the greatest opportunity was to begin a conversation of friendship with the Melbourne Indigenous Transition School, which is not just a neighbour but is almost literally all around us on Richmond Hill. The school attracts indigenous children, mainly from western Victoria and the north of the Northern Territory for a two -year programme (school years 7 and 8) to prepare them ready to take up scholarships at a number of Melbourne High Schools in both the private and public sectors. Throughout this time, until they leave at the end of year 12 (mostly) they remain resident in MITS local accommodation. Currently MITS has almost 100 students in residence.

Approximately 25% of MITS students come from strong Catholic families, and for the moment that is the group with which we have focussed on. With a great deal of help from the staff of MITS, our group has been meeting with varying numbers of the Catholic students on a monthly basis during the school terms, for a mix of storytelling (mainly from the Bible but also included Stations of the Cross during Lent), prayer, reflection and meditation. This is usually followed by a chat over some ice cream, which is particularly good because the students get more relaxed and a lot "more chatty"!

Our initiative is still in its relatively early days, but we are full of optimism about progress so far. If anyone else in the parish either is interested in our group, or in involvement as a volunteer at MITS for help with craftwork or homework, then please contact us. - *Haydn Walters, Group Facilitator*

POPE FRANCIS' PRAYER INTENTION FOR JUNE: FOR MIGRANTS FLEEING THEIR HOMES By Fr Andy Hamilton SJ

Pope Francis invites us also to let the eyes of our heart dwell on Myanmar, where so many people are homeless in civil war, and on Sudan. We have given shelter to so many people from Sudan, and their children delight us with their skills in football games and in athletics. Now up to nine million Sudanese people have been displaced by civil war, relying on the hospitality of people equally stressed and fearing starvation and violence. It is impossible to imagine such a large number of people made homeless. To dwell in prayer on the images that we see in the news, however, may help us enter their experience and long to change it.

We might dream that the dusty and ill-fed children whose pictures we see will grow up after being given opportunities to follow their dreams. Those of us fortunate enough to be friends of people who have had to flee will be familiar with the horrors of violence, hunger and fear that they have known. We will also have wondered at the extraordinary generosity of so many people whom they have met on their way, and how they have nurtured resilience and hope in the most difficult of times. We cannot but hope that their brothers and sisters fleeing from their homes in their own land will also find hospitality in our nation.

Refugees are commonly seen as a problem. They are not a problem, but persons who have great problems. To live fully human lives they call for our attention, our understanding, our compassion and our generosity. For Christians these responses flow out of and into prayer.
