Clay, Concrete, Glass and Stone Processing Machine Operators

Clay, Concrete, Glass and Stone Processing Machine Operators operate machines to manufacture and finish a variety of clay, concrete, glassware and stone products by extruding, shaping, mixing, grinding, cutting and other processes. General tasks include:

- Monitoring the flow of clay and other raw materials and products into machines, and adjusting valves and controls to specifications
- Positioning clay and stone on machines to be cut and worked
- Operating concrete mixing, stacking and splitting machines
- Setting up and installing moulds and other machine fixtures
- Setting up and operating glass-making machines to produce molten glass, and regulating temperature of molten glass
- Pressing and blowing glass into moulds to form glassware products
- Collecting and examining samples for conformity to specifications and adjusting machine settings accordingly

<u>Student Start-Up Loan</u> – Available to eligible full-time students in higher education who receive Youth Allowance, Austudy or ABSTUDY Living Allowance and you must apply.

Relocation Scholarship – This is an annual payment to help eligible ABSTUDY or Youth Allowance students with their higher education if they have relocated to, or from, a regional or remote area to study.

<u>Payments and support for Indigenous Australians</u> - You may be eligible if you're studying or training. <u>ABSTUDY</u> is a group of payments for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students or apprentices.

30 September is the QTAC Early BIrd application closing date. When you register by this date, your application will cost \$70. If you miss this date, your application will cost you \$150! If you are paying with a Debit card it is best to pay before 25 September to make sure that QTAC receives your payment by 30 September.

If you are still uncertain about your course preferences, it is best to put in an application even if it is only one preference so you get the Early Bird discount. Your application fee comes with 3 free change sessions so you can always go back into your application and update your preferences. Click <u>here</u> for more information.

Educational Access Scheme (EAS)

EAS can assist if you have faced challenging circumstances that have affected your most recent schooling or study experience. It supports you by levelling the playing field to give you a better chance to compete for tertiary study. All applicant information is treated with strict confidentiality and care. EAS can assist you with:

If your EAS application is successful, you may receive adjustments to your QTAC selection rank. This can help you compete for tertiary study on a more equal basis. International Baccalaureate (IB) Studies

QTAC Institutions can accept the International Baccalaureate (IB) Diploma as equivalent to an Australian Year 12 qualification. To facilitate comparisons for selection purposes, QTAC converts the IB Diploma score to a QTAC Selection Rank, similar to an ATAR. IB Diploma results range between 24 and 45 and are mapped to an IB Admissions Score (IBAS) to allow IB Diploma students to be considered for tertiary places alongside their QCE counterparts. This ATAR-like rank is known as the National ATAR because it is a national

conversion which combines student data gathered from across all states in Australia. This means that IB students can apply in any Australian state or territory with confidence about how their results compare to their peers who have completed state-based programs and received an ATAR. <u>Click</u> here for more information.

Pros and cons of mid-year entry

Many tertiary courses have Semester 1 and Semester 2 entry. This means you can commence your course at the beginning of the year or mid-year. The following is a list of some of the advantages and disadvantages of applying mid-year.

Advantages

- You can have a longer break from study between finishing Year 12 and starting tertiary study halfway through the following year (like a mini Gap year).
- Mid-year entry allows you to apply again if you don't get a course for Semester 1.
- Starting mid-year gives you a chance to improve your skills by doing a study preparation course or short-lower level course during Semester 1.
- Starting mid-year does not necessarily mean you take longer to graduate as many courses offer catch-up options such as summer schools and Trimester 3 study options.

Disadvantages

- Not all courses offer mid-year entry.
- ATAR/tertiary rank minimum thresholds can be more competitive mid-year because there are usually fewer places available.
- You could regret not starting your study earlier when you see your friends starting their courses in Semester 1.
- You might get out of the study habit.
- You could become bored and end up wasting your time.

A sensible strategy is to apply for Semester 1 courses and defer your study. Also, you could contact the admissions office of the institution to find out the process to defer for six months instead of a year, which is the usual deferment period.

QTAC website has the most up to date course information

It is important to remember that the 2026 QTAC course guide was accurate on the day of publishing. Some courses have been approved since publication and/or were not included in the book at time of publication. The QTAC and university websites are the most accurate source of course information so check, check and double check your facts!

To get your ATAR you HAVE TO register with QTAC

If you are in Year 12 and are ATAR eligible, to receive your ATAR in December, you must register now on the ATAR Portal to have QTAC calculate your ATAR. Year 12 Queensland 2025 ATARs will be released into the portal from 8am - 9am on 18 December. If you are planning on applying for courses in 2026, you will also need to submit a separate QTAC application.

If you are wanting to apply interstate, you will also be required to register on the ATAR portal providing QTAC with the necessary consent to share your ATAR with interstate Tertiary Admissions Centres. Before registering on the portal, you will need the following information:

- Full name (as shown on QCAA Learning Account/official school enrolment)
- Date of Birth (DD, MM, YYYY)
- LUI number
- Personal email address

- Senior Statement this is a transcript of your learning account. The Senior Statement shows all QCE contributing studies and the results achieved that may contribute to the award of a Queensland Certificate of Education. If you receive a Senior Statement, then you have satisfied the completion requirements for Year 12 in Queensland.
- Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) The QCE is Queensland's senior school qualification and is awarded to eligible students, usually at the end of Year 12.
- Queensland Certificate of Individual Achievement (QCIA) The Queensland Certificate of Individual
 Achievement (QCIA) recognises the achievements of students who are on individualised learning
 programs.



How to retain information

Ebbinghaus was a German psychologist who studied memory. He discovered the forgetting curve which looks at the decline of memory retention. It showed that forgetting occurs most rapidly shortly after you stop learning a subject. The greatest loss is within a few hours. The speed you forget gradually slows down as time goes on. Visit The Ebbinghaus Forgetting Curve-And How To Overcome It for more information about the forgetting curve. Two strategies for memory retention are:

- Better memory representation (e.g. mnemonic techniques) Coming up with a song is a commonly used mnemonic technique. An example is how children remember their ABCs. Other types include names, expressions, models, odes, note organisation, images, connections and spellings. An example of using a name as a mnemonic is Roy G Biv (red, orange, yellow, green, blue, indigo, violet) to remember the colours of the rainbow.
- Repetition based on active recall (especially spaced repetition) When learning new information, spacing out revision sessions over time makes items easier to remember. It is more effective to do your revision over many weeks, rather than the night before the exam. Plan your review of material to start the first day after it is acquired, a second time about a week after that and finally a few weeks later. This is what you do in the revision part of homework. Active recall means that you test yourself following each revision session.
