Marist 6A 49 def. St Patrick's College 12

Marist Blitz St Pat's with First-Half Masterclass ; Marist 6A produced a dominant display of running rugby to overpower St Patrick's College 49–12 in Round 3, setting the tone early and never looking back.

From the opening whistle, Marist's intent was clear—fast ball movement, support play, and attacking from anywhere on the park.
