

The Word of the Lord The sacramentality of the word can thus be understood by analogy with the real presence of Christ under the appearances of the consecrated bread and wine. By approaching the and par-taking in altar the Eucharistic banquet we truly share in the body and blood of Christ. The proclamation of God's word at the celebration entails an acknowledgment that Christ himself is present, that he speaks to us, and that he wishes to be heard. Saint Jerome speaks of the way we ought to approach both the Eucharist and the word of God: "We are reading the sacred Scriptures. For me, the Gospel is the Body of Christ; for me, the holy Scriptures are his teaching. ...

next week:

Today we are reminded of God's providence. We live in a world that feeds us and shelters us and supplies us with everything that we need to grow and to thrive, and all of this comes to us from the hand of God. It is usually when we are in desperate straits that we become painfully conscious of our dependence on God, but this dependence is always there. God does not merely intervene when we are helpless; God's providence operates in our lives at all times.

Living in a society that promotes individualism, we sometimes undervalue the communal dimension of life. God certainly cares passionately for each of us (not even a sparrow falls without God knowing it), but God's concern is for the whole people. We are first and foremost members of a people. We would never have seen the light of day, we would not endure or develop, without others. As unique as we may be, we are a unique expression of a communal reality. God created a race; God formed a people; Jesus died for the world. By the grace of God, we belong to the community.

As members of the people of God, we are called to a way of life that is noble, not selfish. We are to live with each other in humility and gentleness, with patience. We are to bear with one another in love. Through baptism we all live by the same Spirit of Jesus; we are all united through the bond of God's love. 
A woman texted her husband, who is a computer programmer: "On your way home get two loaves of bread and, if they have any fresh eggs, get a dozen."

<u>REFLECTION FROM FR PETER</u>



Through a direction from Pope Francis this Sunday in our Church calendar is World Day for Grandparents and the elderly. As people of faith we know the importance of the Grandparent person to us in the paths of life we follow. From the elder rather than elderly we look to the senior's of our community for the continuing light and example they give for us to follow and to be inspired by.

In his message for this important recognition of grandparents and the elderly, Pope Francis remarks ... "The whole Church is close to you, to us, and cares about you, loves you, and does not want to leave you alone!" This day comes at a challenging time for the world, in light of the pandemic where many of our senior people have fallen ill, died, and where many live with

isolation for long period of times. Our Church community of St. Mel's takes this to heart and we seek God's loving intercession on those from our families who have died and experience the isolation caused by the lockdown and on going difficulties the virus is causing.

Further into the themes of grandparents and the elderly, Pope Francis speaks of the angel coming into our presence. This may be in the form of our loved ones, namely our own parents who in their passing from this life still gives a face we hold in their memory and spirit. It makes no difference as to how old you are, as a grandfather and grand mother, for their is no retirement age from the work of proclaiming the gospel and handing on traditions to the grandchild / children in our relationships.

It was the prophet Joel who once promised: "Your old ones shall dream dreams, and your young ones will have visions" (3:1). There is hope as we live through these very changing times, a future depends on this covenant between the young and the elderly. So we do dream for a positive and renewed times where our personal visions offer ways for us to build in harmony from the grandparents who have given foundation and where the elder is a continuing influence of our participation in family and community. 


WORLD DAY OF PRAYER FOR GRANDPARENTS AND THE ELDERLY.

READINGS FOR THIS SUNDAY 25th July

First Reading

A reading from the second book of the Kings - 2 Kings 4:42-44 *They will eat and have some left over.*

A man came from Baal-shalishah, bringing Elisha, the man of God, bread from the first-fruits, twenty barley loaves and fresh grain in the ear. 'Give it to the people to eat,' Elisha said. But his servant replied, 'How can I serve this to a hundred men?' 'Give it to the people to eat' he insisted 'for the Lord says this, "They will eat and have some left over."' He served them; they ate and had some over, as the Lord had said. **The Word of the Lord.**

Second Reading.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Ephesians - Ephesians 4:1-6 *There is one body, one Lord, one faith, one baptism.*

I, the prisoner in the Lord, implore you to lead a life worthy of your vocation. Bear with one another charitably, in complete selflessness, gentleness and patience. Do all you can to preserve the unity of the Spirit by the peace that binds you together. There is one Body, one Spirit, just as you were all called into one and the same hope when you were called. There is one Lord, one faith, one baptism, and one God who is Father of all, through all and within all. **The Word of the Lord.**

Gospel

A reading from the holy Gospel according to John - John 6:1-15 *He distributed to those who were seated as much as they wanted.*

Jesus went off to the other side of the Sea of Galilee – or of Tiberias – and a large crowd followed him, impressed by the signs he gave by curing the sick. Jesus climbed the hillside, and sat down there with his disciples. It was shortly before the Jewish feast of Passover.

Looking up, Jesus saw the crowds approaching and said to Philip, 'Where can we buy some bread for these people to eat?' He only said this to test Philip; he himself knew exactly what he was going to do. Philip answered, 'Two hundred denarii would only buy enough to give them a small piece each.' One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said, 'There is a small boy

here with five barley loaves and two fish; but what is that between so many?' Jesus said to them, 'Make the people sit down.' There was plenty of grass there, and as many as five thousand men sat down. Then Jesus took the loaves, gave



thanks and gave them out to all who were sitting ready; he then did the same with the fish, giving out as much as was wanted. When they had eaten enough he said to the disciples, 'Pick up the pieces left over, so that nothing gets wasted.' So they picked them up, and filled twelve hampers with scraps left over from the meal of five barley loaves. The people, seeing this sign that he had given, said, 'This really is the prophet who is to come into the world.' Jesus, who could see they were about to come and take him by force and make him king, escaped back to the hills by himself. **The Gospel of the Lord**
