

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A School Based Apprenticeship may be just what you are looking for

Starting a School-Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship while still at school is a real option if you're confident that you want to follow a particular Trade career after school. It's a good idea to do some work experience before you make the commitment. It's important that you talk to your parents and school VET Coordinator or Guidance/Career Counsellor to get a good understanding of your options and responsibilities. You may be able to start a School-Based Apprenticeship or Traineeship (SATs) in Year.

A SAT gives you a head start on the training you require while still being eligible to complete your secondary education. This training is a formal course through TAFE or other registered training organisation as well as your on-the-job-training - one day at work and 4 days at school. Your school timetable will be altered so you can meet your Apprenticeship and School obligations.

It's possible to complete a Traineeship while still at school. Apprenticeships take longer and School-Based Apprenticeships are usually converted to full-time Apprenticeships after school. Find out more about SATs at the Queensland Government Apprenticeships Info website and organise a meeting with your school's VET Coordinator and/or Guidance Counsellor/Officer to talk about SATs opportunities.

Group Training Organisations (GTOs) in Queensland can organise Apprenticeships and Traineeships

GTOs employ School-Based and full-time Apprentices and Trainees and place them with a host employer until their Apprenticeship or Traineeship has been completed. Some GTOs provide Apprenticeships and Traineeships in specific industries, others provide them across many industries. For more information about GTOs, visit the Group Training Australia website. The latest report from NCVER shows apprentices and trainees experienced strong employment outcomes in 2024. The <u>Apprentice and trainee outcomes 2024</u> report shows that 95.4% of trade and 89.4% of non-trade completers were employed after finishing their apprenticeship or traineeship, similar to 2023.

New Energy Apprentice Support Payment (NEASP)

The New Energy Apprentice Support Payment (NEASP) is available to eligible Australian Apprentices in a clean energy occupation and linked qualification listed on the Priority List and where their employer can provide meaningful exposure, experience and work in the clean energy sector. NEASP provides financial support of up to \$10,000 for a full-time apprenticeship and up to \$5,000 for a part-time apprenticeship over the life of the Australian Apprenticeship. Payments are made according to the following schedule and rates:

• \$2,000 at 6,12,24 and 36 months and on completion (full-time) • \$1,000 at 6,12,24 and 36 months and on completion (part-time). Click here for more information.

Work experience is a good idea

The best way to see what a job is all about is to try it. This sounds obvious however, it is often the last thing people think of when making career decisions. The following are ways you can try a job.

- Work observation/shadowing spend one or two days with someone already in the job
- Work experience spend up to a week working in the job
- Volunteering volunteer your services to an organisation that has jobs you are interested in
- Part-time paid work explore the possibility of part-time or casual work in your preferred career area
- Join an activity group where you can try out some of the skills you will need in the job you like e.g. join the Air Force Cadets or the St John Ambulance Cadets
- Participating in various programs associated with specific career areas for example, Engineering Link projects

The benefits of trying a job are:

- Learning about what the job involves
- Having a structured, supervised, hands-on experience
- Experiencing a work environment the world of work isn't like school!
- Gaining a new referee to add to your resume
- Developing contacts that may help you gain employment in the future.
