Traineeships



What is a Traineeship?

A traineeship is part of the Australian Apprenticeships program, where an employer creates a job and employs and trains staff using this method. It involves combining paid employment with formal training conducted by a Registered Training Organisation (RTO). Traineeships are available in a variety of occupations and usually last 1 to 2 years.

What are the benefits?

Trainees earn a wage while they learn; they develop practical skills in their occupation and industry, and they gain a nationally recognised qualification! A traineeship is a stepping stone to career advancement and/or higher-level qualifications.

Who can do a Traineeship?

Traineeships are entry-level roles, so there aren't specific requirements to start one, although you must be of working age, and have your parent/guardian's consent if you're under 18. However, employers set their own requirements for vacancies, so you need to meet their advertised criteria and demonstrate an interest in the role and willingness to learn. In some cases, you can even do a traineeship while at school.

What kinds of Traineeships are there?

Traineeships are available in a broad range of industries and occupations from multimedia and information technology, through to sport and fitness, agriculture, music, aged care, civil engineering, business, retail, hospitality, and more. Each state/territory government decides which qualifications are offered as traineeships and apprenticeships, so check your area <u>here</u> or use the <u>Job Pathways Charts</u> to find out which apprenticeships and traineeships are available in different industries.

How do I get a Traineeship?

Traineeship opportunities can be found in many different ways. The best place to start is by talking to your Careers Advisor. However, you can also register with the Australian Apprenticeship Support Network(s) in you area and checking

Apprenticeships



What is an Apprenticeship?

An apprenticeship is similar to a traineeship, but there are some key differences. Apprenticeships cover trade-based occupations, generally take 3-4 years to complete, and the qualification is usually a Certificate III.

What is a School-Based Apprenticeship?

Sometimes referred to <u>ASbAs</u> or SBATs, schoolbased apprenticeships combine a reduced school timetable with part-time work and VET training as an apprentice. The great thing about them is that you complete your Senior School Certificate while getting a head start on your trade and earning some money.

What is a Higher Apprenticeship?

Higher Apprenticeships generally begin with a Certificate III qualification and then progress to a Diploma or Advanced Diploma level within a 4year timeframe. While they aren't very common, their popularity is increasing as employers seek workers with higher-level and more specific skill sets. Currently, most Higher Apprenticeships are in community services, business, and public services. However, they are also available in child care; construction; plumbing; tourism, travel and hospitality; aviation; sustainability; and health.

What are Group Training Organisations?

Apprentices and trainees can be employed by Group Training Organisations who host them out to industry for their day-to-day work. An advantage of this arrangement is that you gain a range of experience with a variety of employers. You can find your local GTOs <u>here</u>.

What do I need to start an Apprenticeship?

Like traineeships, apprenticeships are also entrylevel roles, but they are a longer-term commitment by both the employer and apprentice. Any kind of previous employment, work experience or extra-curricular activities related to the trade, and referees will be highly valued by employers as evidence of your suitability and commitment. You can also demonstrate enthusiasm, prepare, and gain a competitive edge with:

- A pre-apprenticeship; usually a Certificate I or II, and which may be available as a school VET subject.
- A WHS 'White Card' for construction-based apprenticeships.
- A drivers license and own transport if you're working across sites.
- A Police check, Working with Children check, and First Aid certificate for care-related roles.



Cadetships



What is a Cadetship?

Cadetships are a third way to combine learning and earning that generally involve studying at university-level while working in a professional role.

What are the benefits?

Cadetships offer tertiary students the opportunity to gain experience in their field before completing their degree, and to apply what they learn to realworld scenarios. This gives cadets a head start on their career compared to students who work in roles unrelated to their studies. Depending on their university and course, cadets may even gain credit towards their degree based on their workplace experience. Cadetships can also lead to ongoing employment with an organisation once the program has finished.

Where Do Cadets Work?

Cadetships are available in a wide range of industries, including the public sector, business and finance, engineering, journalism, and transport and construction. Some large government and private organisations run cadetship programs in which they hire new cadets each year. Some cadetships are open to all applicants while others have equity or other specific criteria.

What are examples of Cadetship programs?

Cadetship programs are diverse, so check ones that interest you to find out what's involved. Note that many require applicants to be in Year 12, while others are only open to those who have commenced tertiary study:

- Deloitte Cyber Academy in NSW and VIC.
- <u>Professional Cadetships Australia</u> in Business and Engineering and Technology, in NSW
- <u>Australian Government Digital Cadetship</u> <u>Program</u>, nationwide.
- <u>STEM Defence Cadetships</u> in SA, QLD, ACT, VIC, NSW, and WA.
- <u>Australian Public Service Finance</u> Career Start Program, mostly in the ACT.
- <u>First Nations AFL Sports Ready Cadetships</u>, nationwide.
- <u>Management Cadetships</u> through study and work at the University of Wollongong.
- Coleman Greig Lawyers in NSW.
- <u>Whitehaven Coal Cadetships</u>, in Engineering, Geology, or Environmental Science, in NSW.
- <u>Doxa Cadetships</u>, for students with difficult circumstances in VIC.
- <u>Hall Chadwick Accounting</u> in NSW, SA, WA, VIC, and QLD.

Internships



What is an Internship?

In Australia, internships are a kind of work experience for university students. Unlike work experience at school where you learn mainly from observing, interns are expected to actively contribute to the tasks and projects in their workplace. Like work experience at school, Internships may be paid or unpaid depending on the arrangement between the student and employer and they generally range from one to three months in duration. For some degrees such as Engineering, completing an internship can be a compulsory requirement to graduate.

What are the benefits?

Internships give students the chance to apply what they're learning to the real world which leads to deeper understanding of their field. It also helps them to build and demonstrate employability skills such as team work. communication, problem-solving, and time management. An internship is an excellent way for university students to network and meet people who may be able to help with mentoring and employment opportunities. The experience gained through internships also provides the basis for job applications, interview examples, and professional referees when the time comes.

How do I find an Internship?

It's never too early to gain work experience, as it helps you learn more about your field of study, if it's right for you, and the different pathways you can pursue. There is no limit to the number of internships you can do, however your university may only formally recognise one. There are also eligibility criteria for some internship programs, such as being in your third or fourth year of study, so be sure to research your options early on and thoroughly.

While your university may help with some suggestions about where to find an internship, there will be more students in your course than there are places available, so you'll likely need to do some of your own internship-hunting. Large employers in business, law, and STEM fields may advertise internship opportunities, but in others, you may need to use your networks or find volunteer roles instead.

Many industries have professional associations that offer free or low-fee membership for students and it's definitely worth joining these for your career development. They offer networking events, publications, professional development, and sometimes even mentorship programs.
