Aviation Australia Pre-Apprenticeship Courses

Aviation Australia's aero skills pre-vocational courses provide the essential training required to begin a career in aircraft maintenance engineering. Their instructors are highly experienced professionals from Commercial and Defense aviation and aerospace industries. Aviation Australia offers:

- <u>Certificate IV in Aeroskills (Avionics) MEA40618</u>
- Certificate IV in Aeroskills (Mechanical) MEA40718
- Certificate IV in Aeroskills (Structures) MEA41322

The pre-vocational training components are aligned to <u>CASR Part 66 training</u>. This allows you to complete training towards a vocational outcome and achieve a CASA Certificate of Recognition for <u>Part 66 examinations</u> which can be used towards a future Licensed Aircraft Maintenance Engineer (LAME) outcome. Quick facts about apprenticeships and traineeships

- Apprenticeships and traineeships combine work with structured training.
- Apprenticeships and traineeships can be full-time, part-time or school-based where some training
 is undertaken while the apprentice or trainee is in high school.
- Apprenticeships and traineeships can be completed part time but not on a casual basis.
- Existing employees may undertake an apprenticeship or traineeship.
- Apprenticeships and traineeships require employers to enter into training contracts and a
 commencement <u>contract</u> with the apprentice or trainee, which is a legally binding agreement to
 work and train together for a length of time.
- Employers work with a training organisation and the apprentice or trainee to negotiate a <u>training</u> plan and training record.
- Training options must be negotiated and outlined in the training plan. Aspects of training that are open to negotiation (subject to training package requirements) include selection, content and sequencing of competency units, timing, location and mode of delivery and trainer or facilitator.

Thinking about becoming an apprentice in 2026?

The Australian Government provides both financial and non-financial support to Australian Apprentices and their employers throughout their apprenticeship journey. This includes assessing eligibility for support and financial assistance for Australian Apprentices and their employers under the Australian Apprenticeships Training Support Payment (AATSP). The AATSP provides up to \$5,000 for eligible Australian Apprentices in an occupation and linked qualification listed on the Priority List and paid over 4 instalments:

- \$1,750 at 6 and 12 months and \$750 at 18 and 24 months (full-time)
- \$875 at 6 and 12 months and \$375 at 18 and 24 months (part time)

Start investigating your career options now

It is never too early to start looking around to see what career options and pathways are available to you. It's important to know:

- Career exploration can give you a sense of control about your future! Remember, you are
 only exploring jobs for your first step in life, not for the rest of your life. The future world of work
 will continue to present exciting opportunities over time, which will lead to future jobs and careers.
- Remember, there is not one 'ideal' job for you. There may be several jobs that will build on your skills, knowledge and experience and will give you the things you want from a job e.g. enjoyment, challenge, good income, working in a team, prestige, management opportunities, work/life balance, variety, skill development, self-employment, respect, travel or a combination of all of these.

Where to start:

- Make a list of the jobs you have already considered. The list can include your dream job i.e. a job you would love to have but are unsure what you need to do to get it
- Talk with five people who know you well (include a parent/guardian and a teacher). Ask them what
 jobs they think you would like and why. Some of their suggestions will be worth investigating
 further, so add them to your job list but remember it's only their opinion
- Think about your favourite subjects at school. Use the <u>Career Bullseyes</u> to find jobs related to these subjects. Select the jobs you find interesting and add them to your job list.
- Do a careers questionnaire. There are many career questionnaires that can help you learn more about yourself and the jobs you might like:
 - o myfuture (sign up when entering for the first time it's free for Queenslanders)
 - o Career Quest

Remember it is an ongoing process and this is the beginning of your journey. Your list can change as you move through school and gain more work experience and personal insights.

What is a VET course

Vocational education and training—or VET—is learning that directly relates to getting a job. The VET system delivers education and training services to students, jobseekers or persons who are already employed. VET also plays a significant role in senior school studies. School-based training allows you to study a recognised qualification while at school which can count towards your Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) and/or Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR). - Unemployment rate remained at 4.0%
- Employment increased to 14,616,400
- Underemployment rate remained at 6.0%

- Employment to population ratio increased to 64.5%
- Monthly hours worked increased to 1,976 million

International Labour Market Update

According to the latest <u>International Labour Market Update</u>, the global labour market showed resilience in 2024, with employment and the total workforce growing, according to the International Labour Organisation (ILO). The global unemployment rate remained steady at 5%.

Labour Market Update

The <u>Labour Market Update</u> for the December 2024 quarter, shows almost two-thirds of employment growth in the past 12 months came from occupations with Vocational Education and Training pathways. Employment growth was also sound, overall.

Occupational shortages easing

Occupation shortages across Australia are showing signs of easing, with the latest Occupation Shortage Report revealing a slight improvement in job vacancy fill rates. The national job vacancy fill rate rose by 0.8 percentage points in December quarter 2024 to 68.9%, supported by an increase in the number of qualified and suitable applicants per vacancy. This aligns with broader signs of a softening labour market. Click here to find out more.

Use the STAR interview method when writing your resume

Do you get nervous and ramble during interviews? Or do you worry about what details to include and what to leave out when explaining your experience? Understanding and applying the STAR interview method can be the deciding factor between landing an offer or continuing your <u>job search</u>. The **STAR** acronym stands for Situation, Task, Action, Result. I always recommend adding a T at the end for Takeaways to connect the dots between your past experience and the job you're hoping to land. What Students Are Saying About A.I. and the Future of Work

The New York Times asked USA teenagers if they were worried about A.I. taking human jobs? They shared their hopes and fears about an increasingly technologically-driven future. Although this is an USA snapshot, it will give you some idea about what other young people are thinking about AI and jobs in the future. Click here to read their responses:

- Many students said they were worried about A.I. taking human jobs. For some, that's affecting their post-high school plans.
- Others pointed out that humans are already being replaced.
- But another group suggested that perhaps our fears are overblown.
- And some urged us to embrace A.I. in the workplace for the help it can provide.
- A.I. could even create new job opportunities, they said.
- Many students discussed A.I.'s role in creative fields. Some argued that the technology will never be able to replace human-made art ...
- ... But others worried it eventually could.
- Several hoped A.I. would take manual labor jobs rather than creative or people-facing ones ...
- For now, at least one student pointed out, A.I. and the future of work is still under our control. What will we do with it?

Commonwealth teaching scholarships

Commonwealth Teaching Scholarships support new undergraduate and postgraduate teaching students to meet the costs of their study in exchange for teaching in Government schools or Government-run early learning settings for a period of time after graduating from their degree. Real Futures Grant

The Real Futures Grant provides the winner with a \$5,000 grant and is awarded to a student studying for a certificate, diploma, degree, apprenticeship or traineeship in one of the following fields:

- Business including any business-related courses from any institution.
- Finance including actuarial, statistics, accounting and general finance courses.
- Medicine including medical and health sciences, surgery and medical research.
- Healthcare including health and fitness-related specialties, sport sciences, health services assistance and international health.
- Specialist healthcare including nursing, optometry, dentistry and pharmacy.

Entries for the 2025 grant are open until 31 October 2025.

Only citizens or permanent residents of Australia can apply and you must be 18 years of age or older to enter. Click <u>here</u> for more information and how to apply.

Thinking of a Gap year – Make it Meaningful with a Purpose

Taking a year off after Year 12 will not necessarily help if you are unsure of your career path. Without a plan, a year out of formal education can see you spend your time 'having a good time' only. Alternatively, a formal gap year is known to offer many significant benefits.

In a formal gap year, you could take on structured activities such as paid-work, volunteering and other forms of self-development related to possible future career options. This type of gap year enables you to try out a range of activities that can assist you in your career decision making. According to research, students who have a purposeful gap year are less likely to drop out of further study pathways. There are many organisations offering gap year opportunities so research well and plan carefully - include your parents/guardians in your research.

How to have a life outside of school

Your schedule probably looks something like this: wake up, get dressed, go to school, muck around on your phone, go home, watch Netflix, panic about assignments, actually do assignments (if they're due the next day), have dinner, sleep. Are you thinking that this routine is problematic because your only real focus is school?

Even if you're sitting there thinking you're not *that* boring or your daily life includes a bigger variety of activities, it's still common for us to set aside no time for yourself outside of school. The bubble of school life means that just attending takes up a huge chunk of your day, not to mention all the assignments, study and homework that you're expected to be doing at home. <u>Year 13</u> offers some suggestions on how to break out of that bubble and have a life outside of school including:

- Decide what's important
- Manage your day
- Start being accountable to other people
- Reach out to your friends
- Find things you like to do on your own

Take care of yourself

Your brain and body are closely connected and looking after your body has great benefits for your mind. Activities like sport, dance, walking or yoga can increase your performance by increasing oxygen to your brain. It's also great at reducing tension from stress and school pressure.

Some stress can be useful in keeping us motivated and without it we would find it hard to stay awake! However, during Year 12 and especially during exam time, you may find your stress levels rising high into the 'critical zone', causing a dramatic decline in performance. Proven strategies for beating stress include:

- Relaxation: smartphone apps like Smiling Mind can help
- Time management: try making a list of activities and prioritise
- Connecting with others: talk about your worries, laugh, be positive!
- Remember to be kind to yourself: take some time out to do the things you enjoy or help you maintain your wellbeing

Taking care of yourself - mental fitness

In practice, mental fitness involves consistently and intentionally developing the mental skills you can draw upon to respond to setbacks, sustain healthy relationships, navigate change and uncertainty and make

effective decisions. Take action and check in on yourself today. Reach out to someone in your 'village' you trust, tell them what's going on for you right now. Having the courage to be vulnerable is all part of building mental fitness. Click here to find out more.
