

May our discussions tonight be filled with understanding, collaboration, and respect.


Bless our students, that they continue to grow as confident, compassionate, and capable learners, ready to embrace challenges and to make a difference in their world.

In 2026 we will run one Composite Yr 5/6

As our school moves from straight grades to a composite class in our senior space, we recognise this as an exciting opportunity for growth, collaboration, and enriched learning, however, may also bring some feelings of uncomfortableness.







What is a composite class?

- A composite class includes students from two consecutive year levels (for example, Year 3/4 or Year 5/6).
- While classes are typically organised by age, every classroom naturally brings together a range of learners with diverse strengths, experiences, and stages of development.
- Learning and teaching is student-centred instead of being curriculum-centred →
 Learning is about meeting each child where they are.
- No significant difference in academic achievement between composite and single-year classes, with some research outlining the social and emotional advantages for students in multi-age settings.





Why the move to a composite at St. Joseph's?

- Efficient use of staffing and resources: Combining the two year levels allows the school to make the best use of expert experienced senior teachers, funding, and classroom space.
- Consolidation of classes into a senior level: Creating a single Year 5/6 composite class forms a cohesive senior group within the school, strengthening leadership opportunities and identity among older students.
- Balanced class sizes: A composite structure helps manage uneven enrolments (e.g., one small Year 5 and one large Year 6), ensuring fair and equitable student-teacher ratios.





- Enhanced peer learning opportunities: Older students can act as mentors and leaders, while younger students benefit from support and role models within the same classroom.
- Curriculum flexibility: Teachers can plan and deliver lessons that integrate outcomes across both year levels, allowing for effective differentiation and extension.
- Best for students academically and socially: A composite setting supports a broader range of learning needs and fosters positive relationships, cooperation, and confidence.
- Stronger sense of community: Multi-age learning promotes collaboration and connection across the school, enhancing the inclusive and supportive environment valued in small schools.





Composite or Single-year Grades The most important factor...






I'm assuming next year will be a composite class. Beyond 2026, will this stay the same?

No, each year we will reassess and adjustments made based on numbers, school budget and students needs.







Will my year 6 student be extended when working with a year 5 cohort?

Yes, lessons will be taught to hit 80% of students with extension and scaffolds being provided for the remaining 20%. This is responsive teaching. Additional programs will also be offered for students needing extension.







Who will the Year 5/6 teacher/s be?

We are currently in the process of arranging staffing for 2026. The appointed teacher(s) will demonstrate strong academic practice to ensure students continue to excel and are well prepared for Year 7. There will also be a strong focus on student wellbeing to support a cohesive and positive learning environment for our Year 5 and 6 students.







Will the Senior Space stay in the same room?

The 5/6 students will have the current senior space which will be set up to support explicit teaching and small group work.







Will there be additional classroom support?

The students will have the support of the class teacher/s, the senior leader, and possibly a learning support person if there are additional needs in the class.







What number of students will be in the senior space next year?

Currently, the student numbers stand at 26 students, for both Year 5 and Year 6 together.
