Dear Mr Couani,

I am writing concerning the current St Pius X uniform and in particular, the absence of a broad brimmed hat. My sons in year five and nine have extremely fair skin and given the now well known statistics on sun cancer in Australia, I believe a broad brimmed hat (please see suggested further below) should be incorporated as a standard part of the college uniform.

Aside from looking smart, a broad brimmed hat will better assist protecting students from the damaging effects of the sun later in life. Unfortunately, I have had first hand experience with melanoma, so know all too well the consequences of not mitigating sun exposure from an early age. I know students currently wear a cap - however caps offer minimal protection against the sun (no ear, neck or side of face protection)

- Childhood and adolescence are critical periods during which exposure to UV radiation is more likely to contribute to skin cancer in later life, representing 33% of the lifetime melanoma risk up to 60 years of age.
- It has been estimated that 50% of total UV exposure up to age 60 occurs before age 20;
- the dermis is thinner in children, with skin thickness gradually increasing from birth to adulthood.
- Skin thickness of the face, limbs, and trunk of children aged two-13 years is significantly thinner compared with young adults, 25-40 years.
- A Queensland study found UV exposure during the first 18 years of a person's life was the most critical risk factor for skin cancer, and also caused skin damage and premature ageing.

My sons apply sun screen every day before school, but a broad brimmed hat for students would go a long way to assist minimising the risk of developing skin cancer.

I would appreciate your consideration of the above and I am of course happy to discuss further.

Knowing what we know now about skin cancer, I believe our generation owes a better duty of care for our kids, to ensure they don't pay an unnecessary and avoidable price in later life.

Further to the above, I discovered the attached guide to updating school uniform requirements to support sun smart hat use - which may be of interest.
