Reflection by Rev Mark O'Brien OP

In Matthew's Gospel, there are seven statements that Jesus makes in reply to Peter's confession that 'you are the Christ, the son of the living God'. Each statement says something not only about Peter and his role but also about the church – hence about ourselves.

The first statement is the proclamation that 'you are a happy man'. The use of the Greek 'makarios' which is translated as 'happy' or 'blessed' suggests that in making this profession of faith by Peter, Jesus is implying that Peter has been singled out by God for God's work is blessed indeed. As Deuteronomy 7 says, God did not choose Israel because it was better than other nations but because God loved Israel and had a particular purpose for it in the divine scheme of things. So it is with Peter, so it is with each one of us.

Jesus' second statement is about the revelation of 'my Father' and emphasises that there is no separation between Jesus and his Father. When taken in conjunction with the first statement, the intimate presence of the Father - the grace of God enhances the humanity of Peter.

The third statement involves the change of name. By virtue of God's grace Simon, as in baptism, becomes a new man with a new name. The fourth statement links his new name with his unique vocation, to be the 'rock'. Each vocation is a sign of God's trust and confidence in us.

The fifth statement focuses on the church's battle against the forces of evil. These seek to enslave people in sin but the church built on the 'rock' will provide a safe haven of freedom for all those within its gates. The metaphor of a rock and of an impregnable fortress with gates can create a somewhat static impression of the church and the vocation of Peter.

As if to provide a balance, the sixth statement is providing Peter with the keys of the kingdom of heaven. He is empowered to step out confidently from the fortress, the forces of evil reduce3d to impotence, and lead the faithful to their ultimate goal, the gates of the kingdom of heaven. But this kingdom is not some distant place; in Matthew's Gospel the kingdom of heaven is a circumlocution for the presence of God. Peter and the church usher people, freed from slavery, into the freedom of the presence of God.

The final statement respects a key feature without which the vocation of Peter and the church would not be truly human – decisions will have to made and they will have to be made for the whole church, otherwise things would grind to a paralysing halt. To give Peter and the church the confidence to make decisions that at times may be painful and difficult, Jesus promises that the decisions will be ratified in heaven. This does not mean that they will automatically be the best or perfect decisions. But God accepts the honest decision that the church and indeed any Christian makes because they are part of a vocation of discipleship, part of being remade in the image and likeness of God.

If this passage is lifted out of context, it can give the impression that Peter and the church will live a charmed life. As we know from the gospels and the Acts of the Apostles, and our own history, this is not the case. Our passage is immediately followed by the one in which Jesus reprimands Peter and calls him 'Satan'. To go from a rock to a Satan in a few verses is almost as amazing as the reverse – the trust and confidence that God places in us poor human beings. But, as Paul says 'who could ever know the mind of the Lord? Who could ever be his counsellor?' Only a God who loves in a way that we cannot fathom can keep trusting and forgiving those who continually fail; we certainly cannot.

Gospel

Matthew 16:13-20

When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi he put this question to his disciples, 'Who do people say the Son of Man is?' And they said, 'Some say he is John the Baptist, some Elijah, and others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' 'But you,' he said 'who do you say I am?' Then Simon Peter spoke up, 'You are the Christ,' he said, 'the Son of the living God.' Jesus replied, 'Simon son of Jonah, you are a happy man! Because it was not flesh and blood that revealed this to you but my Father in

heaven. So I now say to you: You are Peter and on this rock I will build my Church. And the gates of the underworld can never hold out against it. I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven: whatever you bind on earth shall be considered bound in heaven; whatever you loose on earth shall be considered loosed in heaven.' Then he gave the disciples strict orders not to tell anyone that he was the Christ.

SCRIPTURE REFLECTION

Today's readings focus on the way God looks on the lowly, the ones who need help. The Gospel encourages us to reflect on our own faith in Jesus. As we seek to answer truthfully Jesus's question about his identity, we may also ponder on Peter, a simple fisherman, who is given the keys of the Kingdom and entrusted to build the Lord's Church.

In the First Reading, a lowly servant is also given keys. He is entrusted with authority and will become a father to the nations. The key of the house of David is on his shoulder. The Psalm expresses the gratitude of a lowly person. In their distress they call and the Lord answers, giving them the strength, they need. St Paul, in the Second Reading, asks several questions that no one can really answer. Thereby he leads us to realise the omnipotence, benevolence and wisdom of God.

This week, like St Paul, we might also want to give glory to the Lord. Through our prayer we trust that God will help and empower the lowly and the needy, whether near at hand or further afield.

'Brothers and sisters, what happened in a unique way in St Peter, also happens in every Christian who develops a sincere faith in Jesus the

Christ, the Son of the Living God. Today's Gospel passage also asks each of us, is your faith good? Each one answer in his or her heart. Is my faith good? How does the Lord find our hearts? A heart that is firm as a rock, or a heart like sand, that is doubtful, diffident, disbelieving? It will do us good to think about this throughout the day today. If the Lord finds in our heart, I don't say a perfect, but sincere, genuine faith, then He also sees in us living stones with which to build his community. This community's foundation stone is Christ, the unique cornerstone. On his side, Peter is the rock, the visible foundation of the Church's unity; but every baptized person is called to offer Jesus his or her lowly but sincere faith, so that He may continue to build his Church, today, in every part of the world.

Even today, so many people think Jesus may be a great prophet, knowledgeable teacher, a model of justice.... And even today Jesus asks his disciples, that is, all of us: "Who do you say that I am?". What do we answer? Let us think about this. But above all, let us pray to God the Father, through the intercession of the Virgin Mary; let us pray that He grant us the grace to respond, with a sincere heart: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God". This is a confession of faith, this is really "the Creed". Let us repeat it together three times: "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God"


