St. Pius X College – Central Coast Grammar ISA Round 6: 30/11/2019

The 2nd XI finish their year undefeated from six matches after defeating Central Coast Grammar by three wickets in a tense match. Notable mentions go to Joel Austin for scoring 25 and Will Pavely for 21.

The big moments. The moments that matter. The moments that define a team's season. They're the moments where the best teams – and the best players – step up. And to step up is exactly what the St Pius X 2nd XI did last Saturday against the second-placed Central Coast Grammar. The scene was set for a tense top-of-the-table clash when SPX travelled up the coast to play CCGS, and that's exactly what played out, a top quality game of cricket which eventuated in Pius consolidating their lead at the top of the table and continuing their now six-match undefeated run.

Both captains were greeted with a cloudy sky and a small ground to base their decision on at the toss. Fortunately, SPX skipper Brad Power won the toss and elected to send in the Central Coast batsmen to face the music of the ever-successful Pius opening bowlers. For the first time this season, however, openers Nick Ward (0/24) and Oscar MacDonald (0/10) went without a wicket in their opening spell, giving CCGS a positive – albeit slow – start to the match. However, first-change bowler Brad Power (2/21) got the breakthrough, and then another straight after, removing the openers in quick succession. Then after drinks, the wickets began to fall much quicker, with Ben O'Reilly (1/18) and Jackson Carrall (2/35) removing the maroon-helmeted middle order with some assistance from run outs thrown by Rory O'Connell and Brad, and cleaned up by the ever-reliable Julian Hyde behind the stumps. Rory (2/19) then proceeded to efficiently clean up the tail, bowling out both the resilient number three batsman as well as the number nine; finishing the Central Coast innings at 128.

Notably, in the six games SPX have played this season they have taken sixty wickets, meaning they have bowled out every team they have come up against – no easy feat. After a solid lunch of steak sandwiches, the Pius openers set out chasing down the CCGS total, with Jackson Carrall (8) and top-scorer Joel Austin (25) again putting on a great opening partnership. Jude Boyle (13), batting three after Josh Overton's promotion to the 1st XI, contributed a handy cameo before the well-known tailender Kiefer O'Brien (19) was given an unheard elevation to number four in a tactical move by the coach, Mr. Stearn, to increase the run-rate. Kiefer did just that, hitting four boundaries in his short time at the crease, setting the stage for the next batsman, Ben O'Reilly (15) to edge closer to the target of 129. However, when both Brad Power and Julian Hyde were dismissed cheaply, the game was left in the balance at 7/95 with Pius still needing 33 runs and having only ten overs and three wickets in hand. Enter the heroics of icemen Will Pavely (21*) and Oscar MacDonald (18*) - two of the youngest members of the team, being in Year 8 and Year 9 respectively – who turned the tide back into Pius' favour with some of the best stroke-play around, before

finishing the game in elegant style, hitting three sixes between them on their way to victory with five overs to spare.

"Strength" would be a fitting way to describe the 2nd XI this week, as they kept their nerve and dispatched the very competitive Central Coast Grammar for the second time in three weeks to keep their position at the top of the table secure. For the first time in 2nd XI memory they have also reached the Christmas break undefeated, a brilliant achievement which is only fitting for an extremely powerful team which is only improving as the season progresses. Good luck to the four players picked to play in the 1sts Queensland Tour over the break - Jackson Carrall, Rory O'Connell, Josh Overton and Nick Ward – and a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to all.
