Principal's Reflection

Reflecting on my first year in the Kimberley, I am humbled to think about the amazing experiences, interactions and learning I have been exposed to. Starting the year with a classic wet season characterised by flooding creeks and plains, muddy and at times, impassable roads, I was able to see how the whole place comes to life. Then the arrival of new students. Young people from Wangkatjungka, Gapuwiyak, Fitzroy Crossing, Roebourne and Derby. Beautiful, trusting, eager young people ready to take on the challenge of living and learning at Yiramalay. For some, it was a significant challenge and for others it has been the perfect fit.

I have been very fortunate to spend time this year in Fitzroy Crossing and surrounding communities with Kaylene Marr, Stanley Shaw and other Indigenous colleagues, getting to know families and elders. My experience living and working in the Northern Territory has taught me that to make a real impact in a community, you need to develop strong and authentic relationships with the families and leaders of the community you serve. This is about being available, listening and listening some more. These first twelve months have been the beginning of that.

As I think about the coming years, I am excited to think about the development of a School Council at Yiramalay which will represent the voice of this community in the development of our school and

its priorities. I'm excited to commit to regular interaction with the community and the local schools, as we combine our efforts and resources towards supporting the youth of our communities to be the best they can. Most importantly, how we work together to counter the negative and distressing representations of young people from this area and begin to tell a new story. A story of growth and leadership, of pride and of happiness. In order to achieve this, we must ensure we are providing caring and engaging educational experiences for our students and supporting families to trust us and encourage their children to participate in the Yiramalay Program and other community led initiatives.

As I look back on 2021, I am extremely grateful. Grateful for the ongoing support of the Wesley College community and Principal, Nick Evans, Friends of Yiramalay with their unfaltering advocacy and support, the families of the students who attend our school and the staff who dedicate themselves to this program. I am overwhelmingly grateful to the students, who through their experiences, honesty, resilience and vulnerability, teach us important lessons about what it means to work and commit to the vision of this program. I am considering health work or the arts as a career in the future. I would tell students starting at Yiramalay to be confident, there is no point in feeling *shame* because it can lead to missing out on so much.

Hiki-Lee Kinley (OW2021)

One of the big changes for Hiki-Lee since coming to Yiramalay is that she has become more responsible and reliable. I hope that next year she finds a career that she loves and enjoys and one that will make her happy. She is considering a placement at KAMS and hopes to do a Cert II in Health Work and may consider doing nursing after that. Hiki-Lee has learnt about western and Indigenous culture while at the school, it is the two way learning that is taught at Yiramalay that made me send her to the school. Being immersed in Indigenous culture was denied to me as a young person and having western education acknowledging Hiki-Lee's Indigenous culture and bringing it together for her, makes the school stand out from others. It was challenging for Hiki-Lee when her family experienced health issues and the loss of a close family member. It impacted our family greatly especially Hiki-Lee because she was away from home at the time and returned to Broome as part of the healing process. The school was very supportive through this difficult time.

Thank you, Matt Watson, and all the teachers for your patience and support. I would especially like to thank the mentors for being there to support students, you all do an outstanding job.

Branch out and make friends, build relationships, take everything in, you're only there for three years. Put your head down and study hard and appreciate the opportunities that come your way. I have not been able to attend the Graduation Dinner in Broome as I am in Queensland training with the Gold Coast Suns Academy and intend to pursue a career in football.

Everything that was done for me has not gone unnoticed by me, so I want to thank my parents and family for their support, they are the best. I am appreciative and grateful to Matt, Sean, and Kym and all the staff and teachers at the Studio School, LiR and Wesley College who have supported me over the three years that I shared with them - my second family.

They decided it was worth it, took a deep breath and organised an adult who would be their quarantine chaperone.

During the holidays, Melbourne COVID-19 case numbers had grown, meaning they would likely face another quarantine to get home at the end of Term 4. Under the circumstances, they all opted to remain in WA and attend their remote classes from there. This was not without its sacrifices – the Vic/WA time difference had meant the first period started at 5:30am! Although it's been challenging to maintain momentum and motivation, they all dug deep and persevered wonderfully by logging on to classes and working on study tasks. When face-to-face classes resumed in Melbourne, the online lessons finished, but they doubled their efforts and began an intensive online self-study phase.
