PALM SUNDAY, YEAR B

24th MARCH 2024

Reflection by Rev Mark O'Brien OP

We have been presented with the Gospel's challenge to make God the centre of our lives because God makes us the centre of divine life by loving us unconditionally. According to the Gospel, this is the relationship that all human beings need (and really desire?) and gives meaning and fulfillment to all other relationships. In the account of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem the people seem to be doing exactly this - they are making Jesus the centre of their lives. They throw a great welcome party for him as he enters Jerusalem. We know from the Gospels that Jesus was always happy to join a party, whether thrown by disciples, his rivals the Pharisees, tax collectors and sinners. Life is meant to be a celebration. But the definitive welcome party in Jerusalem goes horribly wrong; celebration and unity are replaced by violence and division and Jesus ends up being nailed to a cross. What went wrong? A number of things no doubt but the people's cry 'Blessed is the coming kingdom of our ancestor David' provides one clue. The 'our' suggests the people's focus has shifted pretty quickly from 'the Lord' to what might be in it for them. On entering Jerusalem, Jesus does not initiate a rebellion nor does he parade or review his troops nor hold court like a king. Is Jesus coming to establish a kingdom, if so what kind of kingdom?

We can see parallels to the Gospel scene in our modern life. Suburban and rural communities can turn into rival 'gangs' that seeks to settle scores that often end in a bloodbath (one 'nails' the enemy to the wall). All that society seems able to do against this violence is create more laws that seem to exacerbate the divisions within the society. The Gospels teach that Jesus comes between society and rival 'gangs' with love for those on all sides. This kind of love can get a person killed but it is the only kind of love that can, in the end, overcome intractable divisions and hatred and enable people to look at themselves and the others in another light. When one sees Jesus as the centre of love radiating out to all, no matter how divided they may be, there is the chance things can change.

As we come to see in faith divine love radiating out from the crucified Jesus as its centre we are perceive something more. Jesus is doing all that he does out of love of the Father. God is the centre of his life. Paradoxically, the moment that seems, from the human point of view, to deny this truth – his being nailed to a tree, powerless and reviled by society – is the moment he confirms it. The centurion, the complete outsider and one of Jesus' executioners, proclaims 'Truly this man was God's Son!' If it is true that God is fully within Jesus when he cries 'my God, my God, why have you abandoned me', then there can be no moment in human life when God is not at the centre of our lives, no matter how absent God may 'appear' to be. Therefore there can be no more fitting response from one who has become aware of this truth than to make God the centre of one's life.

The passage from Isaiah adds some important features to this portrait as the loyal messenger of God. It lays down three key requirements for a messenger/teacher of God. The first is that he/she must be a disciple: in order to teach others one must first be taught by God. The second requirement is that the disciple must persevere in his/her mission despite rejection and insult. The third requirement is that the disciple must trust completely in God and God's deliverance (the Lord comes to my help').

The passage from Isaiah provides the broad context within which Philippians identifies the unique status of Jesus that completely transforms what it means to be a disciple. But how do the conditions of slavery and death represent the living and liberating God? Ah, we may reply, read the next bit that proclaims the resurrection from the dead. Well and good, but Paul seems to be implying that slavery and death are also in their own way an authentic manifestation of the presence of God – at least in the figure of Jesus. We are called to follow Jesus in his passion, death and resurrection.

First reading

Isaiah 50:4-7

The Lord has given me a disciple's tongue. So that I may know how to reply to the wearied he provides me with speech. Each morning he wakes me to hear, to listen like a disciple. The Lord has opened my ear. For my part, I made no resistance, neither did I turn away. I offered my back to those who struck me, my cheeks to those who tore at my beard; I did not cover my face against insult and spittle. The Lord comes to my help, so that I am untouched by the insults. So, too, I set my face like flint; I know I shall not be shamed.

Philippians 2:6-11

His state was divine, yet Christ Jesus did not cling to his equality with God but emptied himself to assume the condition of a slave and became as men are; and being as all men are, he was humbler yet, even to accepting death, death on a cross. But God raised him high and gave him the name which is above all other names so that all beings in the heavens, on earth and in the underworld, should bend the knee at the name of Jesus and that every tongue should acclaim Jesus Christ as Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

REFLECTION: THE LORD GOD COMES TO MY HELP

Today marks the end of Lent and the beginning of Holy Week. The readings focus on Jesus's sacrifice for us and express confidence in God's faithfulness.



St Paul (Second Reading) highlights the humility of Jesus, who emptied himself of the glory that was his as Son of

God. He gives himself away totally in love, coming among us as the suffering servant described by Isaiah in the First Reading. Jesus puts others before himself rather than seeking power or honour. Riding into Jerusalem on a donkey, Jesus shows us his way is one of love, compassion, mercy, humility, and service. We hear the crowds welcome him excitedly, shouting 'Hosanna', wanting to make Jesus into the king who will save them from Rome. (Procession Gospel)

In the main Gospel, we see the same crowds turn against Jesus, calling for his arrest. He is mocked, beaten, condemned, crucified, and placed in a tomb. Jesus is betrayed by one of his own disciples, denied by another, and abandoned by most. The Psalm describes this humiliation. On the cross Jesus prays the psalm's response: 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' We are invited to walk with Jesus through Holy Week. Jesus, in turn, wants to be with us in our experience of this journey. Lord, help us to walk with you, to be strengthened by your example and teaching.

A LIGHT FOR THOSE WHO YEARN: ARCHBISHOP COMENSOLI DELIVERS 2024 PATRICK ORATION

Archbishop Peter A Comensoli delivered the 2024 Patrick Oration, mapping out possibilities for inviting people into a life with Christ. Speaking at the Greg Craven Centre in Australian Catholic University's new Kolkata Building, he addressed civic, religious, and community leaders, highlighting the importance of embracing faith and renewal.

Drawing parallels from Nick Cave to Six30 Holy Hour and Gen Z's quest for meaning, Archbishop Comensoli emphasized the relevance of Christ's journey and the need for spiritual connection. He reflected on the significance of St Patrick's Cathedral as a beacon of faith, welcoming diverse communities seeking solace and guidance.

Acknowledging societal shifts towards spirituality, Archbishop Comensoli emphasized the distinction between spirituality and religious faith, advocating for a deeper engagement with religious practice. He underscored the importance of creating inclusive spaces where all can encounter Christ and find direction.

Looking ahead, Archbishop Comensoli emphasized the need for renewal and structural improvements at St Patrick's Cathedral, envisioning it as a dynamic hub for faith and community engagement. He urged individuals to embody Christ's message and extend a welcoming invitation to all, especially younger generations seeking meaning and belonging.

Reflecting on Archbishop Comensoli's oration, attendees expressed resonance with his insights and highlighted the Cathedral's pivotal role in Melbourne's spiritual landscape. They emphasized the importance of adapting to the evolving needs of younger generations and fostering an inclusive environment where everyone can find solace and purpose in Christ.
