FOSTERING CHILDREN WITH A DISABILITY OR COMPLEX NEEDS

Foster children who have complex needs or disabilities are like any child in care and they need a safe and secure environment and carers to take care of them.

Common disabilities among children in care can include vision impairment, deaf or hard of hearing, mental health conditions, intellectual disability, acquired brain injury or autism spectrum disorder.

When a child with a disability enters foster care, placements include long-term, short-term, respite and emergency care.

Foster carers play an important role in supporting children with a disability to thrive, alongside the child's care team.

People with relevant experience, such as childcare workers, disability workers, medical staff, and those who have interacted closely with individuals with disabilities, can make great foster carers for a child with complex needs. However, anyone who is willing to learn and can create a safe, consistent, and supportive environment is encouraged to apply to foster children with disabilities.
