

He then dried their feet with the large towel that was tied around him. Simon Peter thought it was not right that Jesus should wash his feet. That was a servant's job.


But Jesus was his **teacher**. Simon Peter said, "You will never wash my feet."






Jesus answered him, "If I do not wash your feet, you can't follow me."


"In that case," Simon Peter said to him, "wash my hands and my head too!"




He was teaching them to serve one another and to care for one another.



Then he said some very important words: "Love one another just as I have loved you ... everyone will know that you are my disciples." (JOHN 13:34)




Jesus wanted to gather his disciples together for a special meal to celebrate the Passover feast. He knew this was going to be his last supper with his friends.




Jesus asked his disciples to go and prepare a room and a table for the meal.
