In an absolute nail-biter, Marist secured a dramatic 1-run win over Padua 6D in a match that went right down to the wire.

Padua 6D batted first and set a competitive target of 8/114. Marist's bowlers worked hard to contain the scoring, and a crucial moment came when Ben Cipriano claimed two wickets in consecutive deliveries, swinging the momentum firmly in Marist's favour. The intensity lifted even further when Max Hammon bowled with such pace and strength that his delivery shattered the stumps — a moment that perfectly captured the fire and determination in the field.

Chasing 115 for victory, Marist showed composure under pressure to finish 5/115, reaching the target with only one run to spare in a tense finale.

After the match, the Padua coach — who had seen MCA earlier in the competition — praised the team's development, commenting that all skills had improved to a very high standard since their previous encounter.

It was a hard-fought contest played in great spirit and a memorable win for Marist.

Marist 5A 131 def. SLC 5A 96

Under rainy skies and on a damp outfield, Marist 5A won the toss and elected to bat against St Laurence's College. Scoring proved difficult from the outset, with the ball skidding through and the slow outfield limiting value for shots. SLC bowled consistently well, and the Marist boys found it challenging to regularly lay willow on leather.

Wickets fell at regular intervals, which further hampered momentum. Bowled out for the first time this season, Marist finished on 131 — a competitive total in the conditions, though perhaps 50 runs short of what the side is capable of at its best. Hamish McCarthy top-scored with a determined 17 (22), while Jay Dhillon contributed a patient 15 (25).





Defending 131 required something special in the field — and that is exactly what followed.

The Marist boys lifted to produce a fantastic display of energy, enthusiasm and encouragement. Every run was chased, every stop celebrated, and the positivity in the field was infectious. It was cricket played the Marist Way.

Relentless pressure in the field restricted the Laurie's batters and forced them to take risks, creating opportunities. The catching was exceptional, and the intensity never dropped. Marist eventually rolled SLC in the final over for 96, sealing an outstanding 35-run victory.

Oscar Hirst (2/10) and Levi Ittensohn (2/11) led the bowling effort, supported by a disciplined all-round team performance.

The boys continue to develop and are playing increasingly well as a team. We look forward to the challenge of our next opponent.

5B Blue

Marist 5B Blue continued its undefeated record with yet another convincing win, deafening St Laurence's 5B by 10 wickets.

After winning the toss we sent St Laurie's into bat on a wet early wicket. The boys capitalised on these conditions having Laurie's at 5/8 at one point in the match. The wickets did dry up a bit in the back end of the match however with tight bowling at limiting the extra St Laurie's finished their innings with 46 runs.

With a very chaseable total at hand, Will Kneebone showed no mercy with the bat to display some of the biggest hitting we have seen all season, coming very close to the first 6 of the year. Off the back of this the boys cruised to the victory, making it 4 from 4 for the year.

The Marist 5B Gold squad trekked out to Curlew Park for another clash, going into the game with level heads and clean 3-0 record so far in the season.

After Fred Hambleton won the bat toss, the boys elected to bat first. The boys made it off to a rocky start, mainly due to a very wet pitch and the ball not rolling to the boundaries after the previous nights rain. However, after a bit of time in the sun the boys found their groove. Some stellar performances all round, especially thanks to Caleb Rosenstengel's 21 off 25 balls, and Jock McKenzie's incredible 32 not out, the boys flew out to a lead of 139 runs off only 25 overs.

5C Blue

Marist were sent into bat on a damp wicket and a very wet outfield. The boys found out quickly that these would be tough conditions, with the pink ball seeming to skid off the wicket, testing the batters timing. The wet outfield caused chaos between the wickets, as well struck balls would plug in the ground. Despite this, Nate Townsley and Lachlan Bradford navigated the start of the innings well, before a mix up saw Nate run out for 7 and Marist at 1/19. Laurie's bowled tight lines, and at drinks Marist found themselves at 1/46. Drinks proved to be a turning point in the game, however, as the first over after the break went for 14, and Marist carried this momentum, with a few boys finding the boundaries more frequently as the field started drying. Late wickets stopped the flow of runs for a few overs, but in the end the boys put up 4/122 in the 20 overs, an extremely well made total especially considering the conditions.

Harry Greene set the tone early with a double wicket maiden in the first over of our bowling innings, including a sharp chance to keeper Charlie Symonds. The boys kept it tidy, with Jack Alexander providing some real pace in the 6th over, until the next breakthrough, another sharp catch from Charlie off the bowling of Tom Brown. Soon after, Nate had a wicket maiden, and Lachlan Bradford took another, meaning at drinks Laurie's were 5/33. After the break, Henry bowled what had to be one of the strangest overs in Marist history, which included 3 left arm pace deliveries, 2 left arm leg spin balls, and a right arm pace ball. 2 nice run outs followed, courtesy of Tom Brown and Tom Christsen, before Theo (who was keen to go home after bowling his 2 overs) took an outstanding catch on the boundary to not only take a wicket but also to save 6. After this, Tom Brown cleaned up the tail in his over to limit Laurie's to 63 all out.
