Liturgical JottingsSymbols of Pentecost

Our churches and schools are often decorated by banners and signs depicting the events and elements of the Holy Spirit coming amongst the believers at Pentecost: wind, tongues of flame, fire in a brazier, water, images of a dove, Mary and the disciples in the room. Hymns both ancient: "Veni Creator Spiritus" and modern: "Pentecost Oh Pentecost" may be sung.

Pastoral Notes: Ordo 2022

Pentecost Sunday is the last day of the Easter Season concluding after Evening Prayer II.

The Easter (Paschal) Candle is lit at all Masses. Following evening prayer II, it is given a place of honour in the Baptistery.

The dismissal with the double Alleluia is used.

The Sequence before the Gospel Acclamation may be sung.

Looking at the Readings

The major feasts of the Church's liturgical year are: Easter, Christmas, Pentecost, Epiphany, Annunciation, Saints Peter & Paul. The Gospels of the day relate the events: resurrection, birth, adoration by the wise men, the Gabriel's message to Mary, except Pentecost. It is the First Reading at the Pentecost Mass of the Day that relates the event on the descent of the Holy Spirit (Acts 2:1-11). The Gospel is a passage from the Farewell Discourse of Christ before his death. Yet both reveal some of the Pentecost mystery: Jesus' gift of the Holy Spirit to strengthen and guide the early Church and to witness and remind the disciples of Christ's teachings. In hearing the familiar story of Pentecost let us not get lulled into complacency for every element carries great importance: place, time, people, weather, language.

Place: Jerusalem: the City of prophets, kings and martyrs: where Jesus ended his ministry and the church begun.

Time: The day of commemoration God's deliverance and covenant with Moses at Mt Sinai, the week of weeks; the fiftieth day of Easter

People: Apostles, Mary and other women, Jesus' relatives and other disciples and later people from all corners of the Jewish Diaspora

Weather and Language: a loud wind, tongues of fire that gave energy and the gifts of tongue to proclaim the Good News of salvation

The Easter-Pentecost mystery begins a new day of creation, the eighth day of Creation, the first day of the new week. The Story of Creation in Genesis is completed: the Spirit that breathed over the waters to give life now breathes over the people to give new life: Our response is: "Lord, send out your Spirit and renew the face of the earth" Ps 103:30

The Saints on Pentecost

No one can say, 'Jesus is Lord' unless he is under the influence of the Holy Spirit. There is a variety of gifts but always the same Spirit; there are all sorts of service to be done, but always to the same Lord; working in all sorts of different ways in different people, it is the same God who is working in all of them. The particular way in which the Spirit is given to each person is for a good purpose." St Paul 1 Corinthians 12:3-7

REFLECTION FROM FR PETER

With the Plenary Council about to convene for the second session (July 4-8) and we through the universal Church this Sunday celebrating PENTECOST, it's a hopeful sign the HOLY SPIRIT will animate the Plenary Council in deliberating a future for the Church in this land. One of the hopes the Holy Spirit brings is the 'Spirit being an effective sign of all truth'. Our continuing hope as a Church born out of Pentecost will create new vision and purpose for the Church through the Plenary Council.

The Holy Spirit does bring about renewal. To RENEW THE FACE OF THE EARTH is one of the purposes why our Christian faith living seeks of our personal renewal through the GIFTS the Holy Spirit brings. Jesus saw this in the beginning of his public ministry being filled with the power of the Holy Spirit. The closest we experience from this is through the SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION. The Sacrament preparing the newly initiated in taking their place in the Church and her community.

As the Rite of Confirmation says ... "Be sealed with the gifts of the Holy Spirit" is very invitational for us. In light of this and all Pentecost Sunday gives we can ask ourselves.....

What is one gift of the Holy Spirit I want to see in my life presently?

When I'm drawn to the Pentecost event I see this as a 'PEAK EXPERIENCE' for the Church. Peak experiences are the Wonder and Awe moments taking us out of ourselves, or to take our breath away! Moments of insight bringing effect and where God is relational. One important part of a peak experience is it creates a deep sense of belonging. This may be in our own humanity, how we see creation and the land we walk upon.

May Pentecost fill you with a deeper sense of belonging within our community of faith and where God's gifts are close with you.

Pope Francis has accepted the gift in St Peter's square in Rome. Gweagal woman, Theresa Ardler, presented a copy of the Uluru statement to the Pope during a recent 15minute meeting ahead of Reconciliation week. Last week Prime Minister, Anthony Albanese, committed to a referendum on the Uluru statement and leaders from nine faiths, including the Catholic Church, formally endorsed the statement, calling for a "voice" – a representative body that can help shape policy directed at First Nations People – to be enshrined in Australia's constitution.

St Mel's Parish would like to acknowledge the elders past and present of the Yorta Yorta Nation, and pay our respects as the Traditional Custodians of the land on which our parish and church is situated.

I DON'T THINK WE SHOULD BE BANNING ANYONE FROM THE EUCHARIST

I received this article, title above, from a long time Parishioner here at St Mel's and found this a good read and thought it may be of interest to some of you also. I will share this article over the next few weeks in the bulletin. Below is part one:

I love the Eucharist.

Indeed, there is no time in my day when I feel more myself than when I am celebrating, with a community of faith, the mystery of love given to us on the altar. At this table, the spirit of God fulfills the promise of Christ by transforming the gifts of field and vine into the body and blood of the Lord. Here bread and wine—gifts freely given to us, which we now return in offering—become the presence of God. This occurs not through the power of the priest nor through the merit of those present, but through the fidelity of Christ, who constantly responds to the faith of the people of God with incarnate love. Here the gift of the Spirit is offered to us through this living memorial of Christ's death and resurrection.

In such an exchange, the priest's role is that of minister—servant of the one who prepares the feast, and spokesperson for the church who gathers to receive it. This communion with God is not magic. The words of institution and consecration are not incantations that force God to act. Rather, it is a miracle, a free action of God, beyond anything nature can achieve or human beings can rightfully expect. Of all the sacraments, the Eucharist is the most treasured, because in its simplicity it proclaims all that is accomplished through the incarnation: the welcome of the stranger, the healing of the sinful, the inclusion of the alienated, the sanctification of the people of God through constant and irrevocable communion in Christ. These are not things that we accomplish or earn, but things that God accomplishes in us and for us, whenever we stand hungry at the altar, whenever we open our hearts and hands to receive God's gift. He will glorify me, since all he tells you will be taken from what is mine.


