CHOOSE WHAT WORKS FOR YOU

Choose subjects that reflect your strengths and interests. This should result in greater motivation, ensuring you give your best efforts.

KEEP OPTIONS OPEN

If you're unsure about your future, that's ok! Choose a mix of subjects to keep your options open while building a broad skill set.

REMEMBER THE BIG PICTURE

Are you considering a certain pathway? How can studying a subject help your future pathway? How could a subject contribute to your personal growth and develop valuable skills?

BE REALISTIC ABOUT YOUR RESULTS

Review your past results, think about feedback from teachers and be realistic about your abilities. Choose subjects at the right challenge level.

BALANCE WORKLOAD

Look for a combination of subjects that will challenge you but not overwhelm you and will work with all your current commitments.

KNOW WHAT YOU ARE SIGNING UP FOR

The more you research the more satisfying your choices. Carefully explore the subject content in the 2026 Elective Subject Guide to decide if the subject is for you.

SEEK GUIDANCE

Talk to teachers who teach the subject, attend information sessions, ask students already studying it, and talk through your options with your parents.
