What is a Sacristan?

A Sacristan is a member of the parish who is responsible for preparing the church for Mass and special liturgies.



The sacristan ensures that all necessary items are available and in their proper place, such as turning on the lights and getting the bread and wine ready before mass.

Some other responsibilities of a Sacristan are:

care and maintenance of the sacristy for liturgical ceremony,

assisting the priests as they ready for Mass, and

ensuring Lectors, Eucharistic Ministers and Acolytes are present and ready before Mass begins.

Qualifications necessary to be a

good Sacristan include:

a practicing adult Catholic who has received Confirmation and is able to show responsibility, knowledge and dedication to the liturgy; commitment to fostering volunteer participation within all groups and Masses;

ability and willingness to commit to one regular Mass and during special liturgical seasons;

attention to detail;

excellent communication skills.

At present we have very few Sacristans in our parish, only one parishioner for each mass (with a few parishioners who assist when the sacristan is unavailable).

These members of our community are here every weekend to carry out their role. It would be a great help for these generous people if some other adults in the parish would offer to join this small group.

First Reading 1 Samuel 26:2. 7-9. 12-13. 22-23

A reading from the first book of Samuel

Saul set off and went down to the wilderness of Ziph, accompanied by three thousand men chosen from Israel to search for David in the wilderness of Ziph.

So in the dark David and Abishai made their way towards the force, where they found Saul asleep inside the camp, his spear stuck in the ground beside his head, with Abner and the troops lying round him.

Then Abishai said to David, 'Today God has put your enemy in your power; so now let me pin him to the ground with his own spear. Just one stroke! I will not need to strike him twice. David answered Abishai, Do not kill him, for who can lift his hand against the Lord's anointed and be without guilt?' David took the spear and the pitcher of water from beside Saul's head, and they made off. No one saw, no one knew, no one woke up; they were all asleep, for a deep sleep from the Lord had fallen on them.

David crossed to the other side and halted on the top of the mountain a long way off; there was a wide space between them. David then called out, 'Here is the king's spear. Let one of the soldiers come across and take it. The Lord repays everyone for his uprightness and loyalty. Today the Lord put you in my power, but I would not raise my hand against the Lord's anointed.'

Gospel Luke 6:27-38

To the man who slaps you on one cheek, present the other cheek too; to the man who takes your cloak from you, do not refuse your tunic. Give to everyone who asks you, and do not ask for your property back from the man who robs you. Treat others as you would like them to treat you. If you love those who love you, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners love those who love them. And if you do good to those who do good to you, what thanks can you expect? For even sinners do that much. And if you lend to those from whom you hope to receive, what thanks can you expect? Even sinners lend to sinners to get back the same amount. Instead, love your enemies and do good, and lend without any hope of return. You will have a great reward, and you will be sons of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked.

'Be compassionate as your Father is compassionate. Do not judge, and you will not be judged yourselves; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned yourselves; grant pardon, and you will be pardoned. Give, and there will be gifts for you: a full measure, pressed down, shaken together, and running over, will be poured into your lap; because the amount you measure out is the amount you will be given back.'

LENT

Lent 2025 begins on Ash Wednesday, March 5th, and ends on Holy Thursday, April 17th. (Why Thursday instead of Saturday, you ask? The answer is that the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Holy Thursday ushers in the special period known as the *Sacred Triduum*, which goes through the evening of Easter Sunday. The Triduum is not considered a part of Lent.)

You might also be wondering why Lent is approximately forty days long.

Lent is forty days because Jesus fasted in the wilderness forty days and forty nights before embarking on His public ministry.

But Jesus did not select the length of His fast at random. Throughout the Old Testament, a stretch of forty days (or years) always carried a deep meaning often related to **punishment**, **penance**, **and/or preparation**.

Here are a few examples:

• During Noah's time, God sent rain for forty days and forty nights to punish the earth with flood

• In consequence of their lack of faith, the Israelites wandered in the desert forty years before reaching the Promised Land

• The people of Nineveh fasted and repented to avert the wrath of God which the prophet Jonah predicted would come upon them in forty days

Both Moses and Elijah fasted forty days before or during important conversations with God

When the time came for Jesus to begin His public mission, He utilized this tradition. His mission was of an all-encompassing nature that taps into—and fulfills—all the biblical reasons for forty day events.

As the God-Man, He was embarking on His mission to be our Mediator—to converse with God on our behalf, as Moses and Elijah did in a prefigurative way. As the one Man Who came to bear the punishment due to all men, He evokes the repentance of Nineveh that averted the punishment of God.

His time in the desert—reminiscent of the Israelites' forty year sojourn—proffers the idea that He is deliberately taking on the punishment due to our faithlessness, which otherwise would keep us away from the Promised Land of Heaven.

The season of Lent is our great opportunity to enter into the desert with Christ. Even though it's still a ways off, let's start thinking about how we are going to approach this holy season before it sneaks up on us and finds us unprepared.
