What does the last post represent?

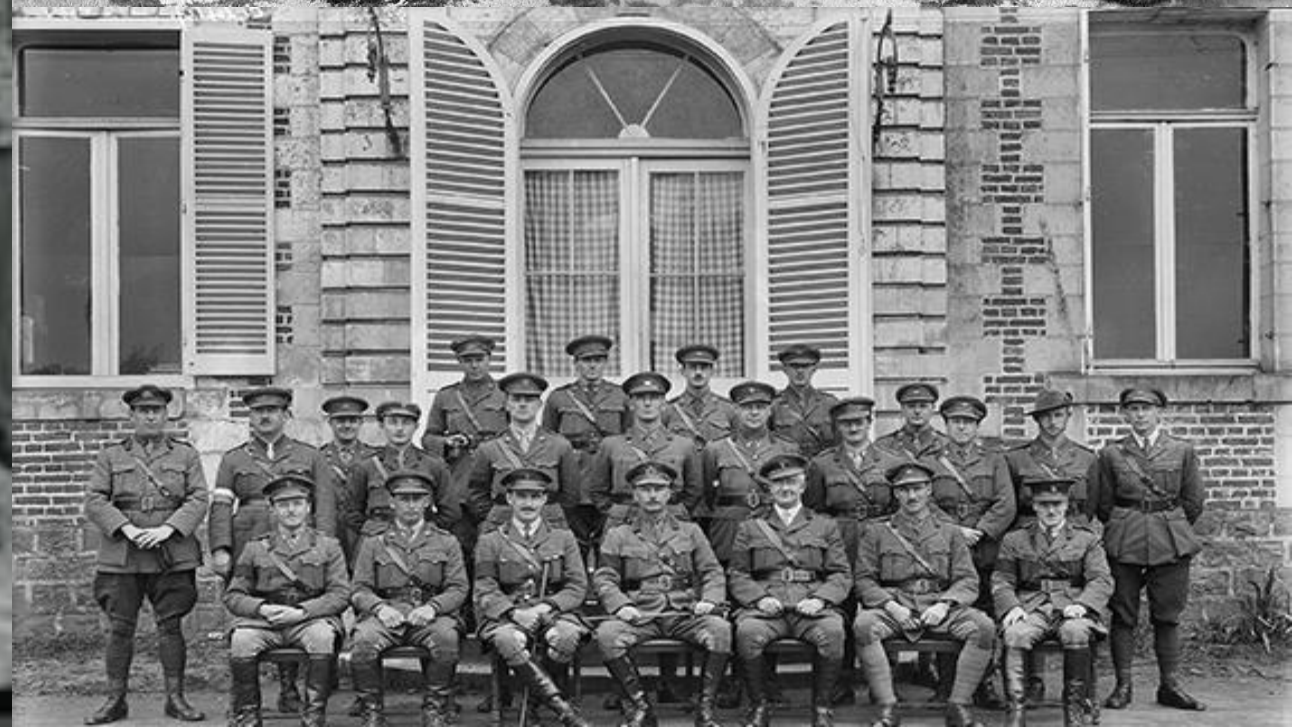
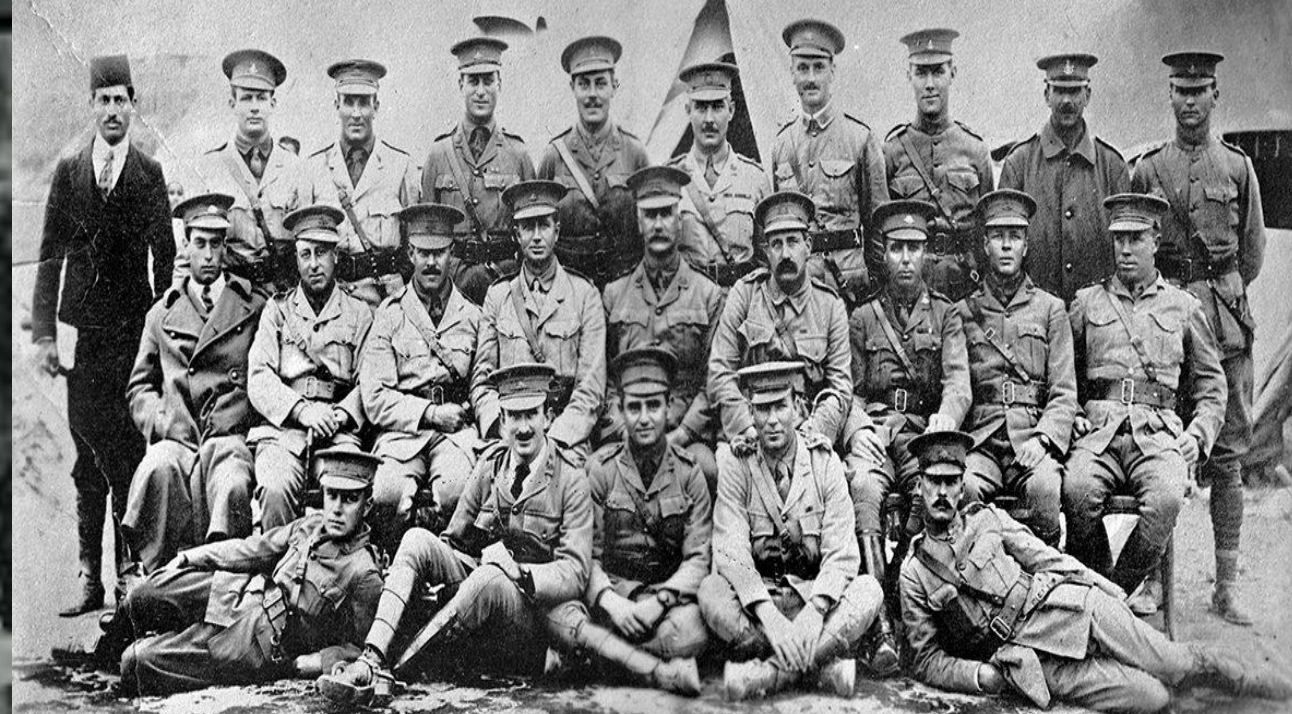
In military tradition, the Last Post is the bugle call that signifies the end of the day's activities. It is also sounded at military funerals to indicate that the soldier has gone to his final rest and at commemorative services such as ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day.



Did you know?

- April 25th was the day when the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps landed on the Gallipoli Peninsula in 1915.
- In 1916, April 25th was officially named ANZAC Day.
- There is no town called “Gallipoli” however, it is the name of the area.
- The site where the ANZACs landed at Gallipoli was renamed ANZAC Cove.
