Student Services and the Community Hub combined efforts to provide fun by the pool, ensuring we are lifting the house spirit teams! Look out for us at the athletics carnival!















LEARN ABOUT OCHRE AND THANAKA

This beautiful practice helps strengthen community bonds and reminds us of the importance of togetherness and harmony.

Students also learned about the significance of thanaka, a traditional Burmese skin paste used for beauty and protection, and ochre, a natural earth pigment with cultural importance for many Indigenous communities. We also explored the art of henna, used for centuries as a form of body art and a symbol of celebration. A huge thank you to Shwe Win and Eh Gay Paw for their stunning traditional Karen dance performances! Thank you to Year 11 VM students Sunday, Si, Shaw Reh and Joseph for helping us.
