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Explore Occupations

There are hundreds of occupations that you can do an Australian Apprenticeship in. The Australian Apprenticeship Pathways job and training descriptions can help you explore potential apprenticeship and traineeship pathways. Find out what is involved in that role, the training and employment and wage data for the industry. Find out more here.

Having a driving licence may give you an edge when applying for an apprenticeship

In some trade areas employers are more likely to take on an apprentice who has a driver's licence. This is especially true in the construction and automotive industries where there are multiple and changing worksites or you need to test drive cars. Construction apprentices depending on parents and/or public transport to get to the worksite may not be practical or even possible.

If you are interested in applying for an apprenticeship, especially in the construction or automotive industry, consider applying for your learner driver licence when you become eligible (16 years of age). Once you turn 17, have 100 hours or more of supervised driving experience and pass the practical driving test, you will be issued a provisional licence. This licence allows you to drive unsupervised. Visit the Department of Transport and Main Roads website to find out more about obtaining a driver's licence. Leaving this until the end of Year 12 may put you at a disadvantage.

Start your apprenticeship or traineeship while you are still at school

Starting an apprenticeship or traineeship while still at school is a real option. You need to be confident that you really want to follow this career when you leave school so it's best to think about doing some work experience in the area before you make the commitment. It's important that you talk to your parents and people at your school, such as your VET Coordinator or Guidance/Career Counsellor to gain a good understanding of your options. You could start a school-based apprenticeship or traineeship (SATs) in Year 10 once it is arranged.

A SAT will give you a head start on the training you require while still being eligible to complete your secondary education. This training is a formal course through TAFE or another registered training organisation in addition to your on-the-job-training. Your school timetable will be altered so you can meet your apprenticeship and school obligations. Normally, when you have a SAT, you spend one or two days with your employer and the rest of the week at school.

It's possible to complete a traineeship while still at school. Apprenticeships however, normally take longer. School-based apprenticeships are usually converted to full-time apprenticeships when you leave school. What is a Blue Card and do I need one?

You will need a blue card if you are paid for your work or are a student enrolled in a tertiary course (including certificate, TAFE and university courses) and need to do a practical placement. Students studying a VET (Vocational Education and Training) course such as Certificate III or Diploma, in which they are required to do a work placement involving young people (under 18 years of age) are required, by law, to have a Blue Card. The Blue Card system in Queensland is used to monitor those who work with young people. Its aim is to reduce the risks of harm to young people by creating a safe and non-threatening environment. The Registered Training Organisation (RTO) conducting the VET course (a school or outside organisation) is responsible for applying for Blue Cards on behalf of the students doing a course. ADF Gap year - Apply now

You can now apply for the 2022 Australian Defence Force (ADF) Gap Year, to experience life in the Navy, Army or Air Force. It is an opportunity to experience military life, without committing to a longer period - 'signing up'. An ADF Gap Year is a way to have an adventurous year, gain valuable skills and work experience and get paid for it. Currently there are 19 roles to choose from for your 2022 Gap year experience including administration, cabin crew, artillery operator, driver, engineer and more. Be aware that it is a very popular program and once all roles are filled, the program will close. Click here to find out how to apply and you must be an Australian citizen, aged between 18 and 24 years on admission and have completed Year 12 (required passes vary by job).

Are you choosing a course for the right reasons?

<u>Deciding on a course</u> can be tough. You need to think about what you want to study, how you want to do it and where, and whether it's a realistic path towards your preferred career. There are big differences between courses, so how do you know you're <u>making the right choice</u>? There are many reasons on which to base your decision, but some are far smarter than others. To make sure you stay on the right path, the article *Are you choosing a course for the right reasons?* lists some reasons to avoid:

- You're expecting a high score so you're opting for a tough course
- The field of work seems glamorous
- You're feeling pressure to commit to a specific uni or course
- You've heard the job pays well

Australian occupations

JobJumpstart says that 'Occupation' is the name given to the type of work a person does. For example, a doctor, mechanic, project manager, physiotherapist or cabinet maker. You'll probably work in a number of different occupations over the course of your working life. Many of the skills and abilities developed working in one occupation are directly transferable and applicable to others. The <u>Job Outlook website</u> has information on hundreds of different occupations. They also offer job descriptions, average wages and main tasks. By exploring the website, you can get a sense of the kind of work that might suit you. Have you heard of Hospital Orderlies, Journalists and other writers or Window Dressers?

<u>Hospital Orderlies</u> assist with the provision of care to patients in a hospital by ensuring wards are neat and tidy, lifting and turning patients and transporting them in wheelchairs or on movable beds and providing direct care and support. They are also known as wards persons or patient services assistant. You can work as a hospital orderly without formal qualifications, however, a certificate II or III in health support services or health services assistance may be useful.

<u>Journalists and Other Writers</u> research and compile news stories, write and edit news reports, commentaries and feature stories for presentation in print and electronic media and compose written material to advertise goods and services. You usually need a university qualification in journalism, writing, communications or another related field to work as a journalist or other writer. Some workers have a Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualification.

<u>Visual Merchandisers</u> plan and install internal, window and fixed displays to show goods to their best advantage. They are also referred to as a Window Dresser. You can work as a Visual Merchandiser without formal qualifications. Some on the job training may be provided. A certificate III or IV in visual merchandising or sales and marketing might be helpful.

Not sure how to start thinking about your career options?

The High Five are wise concepts to consider when making career decisions.

- 1. **Change is constant** The world of work is always changing. You also change as you develop personally and experience life. Don't be afraid of change; accept it and use it as an opportunity.
- 2. **Know yourself and follow your heart** A most important skills in career management are self-awareness knowing your interests, abilities, values, aspirations and the things/people that influence you. Start your job ideas list with jobs you would most like (dream jobs) even if they are currently unrealistic. This can get you started and lead to other jobs you hadn't thought of.
- 3. **Focus on the journey** It's good to have goals, both short and long term. However, you should not be so focused on them that you miss opportunities that may emerge along the way.
- 4. **Learning is ongoing** Learning doesn't stop just because you finish your course and get a job. Just as change is constant so is the need to keep up to speed with new technologies, new methods of practice and emerging trends in your career field.
- 5. Access your allies These are the people who can help and support you during your career journey, your school guidance officer/counsellor, teachers, your family and friends, sport coaches and others within your social network. You can learn much from other people's experiences.

Thinking about what to do after finishing school?

Job Jumpstart has three tips to help you to start to sort through the options you have after finishing school:

- 1. Not sure what study or jobs you might want to do? Reflect on what activities you like doing and what you want out of a job. This can help you understand the types of jobs that might suit you. When thinking about jobs that might interest you, it's good to know what's really involved, including the skills, training and qualifications needed for the job. Start your research by visiting myfuture and Job Outlook A Z jobs.
- 2. Might not get the ATAR you were hoping for? Wondering what your options are if you didn't get the ATAR score you needed to get into your chosen university course? Speak with your Guidance Officer/Career counsellor and/or VET coordinator to find out your options so when the time comes you know how best to

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preference your course options at the end of school to ensure that you have a pathway that will get you where you want to go.

3. Want to earn while you learn? Apprenticeships and traineeships are available in over 500 different occupations. If you're interested in bringing in some cash while learning new skills and you want to take on an apprenticeship or traineeship look into the option of a <u>school based apprenticeship</u>. Remember that not all jobs need further study or training.

Why work experience?

The best way to explore a job you are interested in is to try it. This sounds obvious, doesn't it? However, it is often the last thing people think of when exploring jobs and making career decisions. The following are ways you can try a job.

- Work observation/shadowing spend one or two days with someone already in the job
- Work experience spend up to a week working in the job
- Volunteering volunteer your services to an organisation that has jobs you are interested in
- Part-time paid work explore the possibility of part-time or casual work in your preferred career area
- Join an activity group where you can try out some of the skills you will need in the job you like e.g. join the Air Force Cadets or the St John Ambulance Cadets
- Participating in various programs associated with specific career areas e.g. Engineering Link projects

The benefits of trying a job are:

- Learning about what the job involves
- Having a structured, supervised, hands-on experience
- Experiencing a work environment the world of work isn't like school!
- Gaining a new referee to add to your resume
- Developing contacts that may help you gain employment in the future.

The future of work after COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic disrupted labour markets globally during 2020. The short-term consequences were sudden and often severe. Millions of people were furloughed or lost jobs and others rapidly adjusted to working from home as offices closed. This report on the future of work after COVID-19 is the first of three MGI reports that examine aspects of the post pandemic economy. The others look at the pandemic's long-term influence on consumption and the potential for a broad recovery led by enhanced productivity and innovation. It assesses the lasting impact of the pandemic on labour demand, the mix of occupations and the workforce skills required in eight countries with diverse economic and labour market models. Together, the eight countries account for almost half the global population and 62 percent of GDP. Read the report and find out about:

- COVID-19 has accelerated three broad trends that may reshape work after the pandemic recedes
- The mix of occupations may shift, with little job growth in low-wage occupations
- As many as 25 percent more workers may need to switch occupations than before the pandemic
- Companies and policymakers can help facilitate workforce transitions

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To apply to commence study at ANU on a Tuckwell Scholarship in 2022, you must:


- 1. Complete and submit the <u>ANU Direct Application</u> as soon as possible and before 14 April 2021 (11.59PM AEDT)

The <u>ANU Direct Application</u> will ask if you wish to apply for a Tuckwell Scholarship to which you must answer "yes" if you wish to apply.

USA sports scholarships and university placements

Many universities and colleges in the USA offer sports scholarships to students from other countries. To be considered for these scholarships you have to be able to demonstrate your sporting and academic potential. The process involved in researching available scholarships and applying for them is quite complex. There are several organisations that offer a service to help you through the process. It is important to find out as much as you can about the organisations and, if possible, talk to previous clients. The following are examples:

Australian employers offer advice to young job seekers

The Australian Government surveyed more than 3000 Australian employers to find out what advice they would give to young people looking for a job.

Employers said they look for:

- Education and training work in Australia is becoming more skilled and around 90 per cent of new jobs in the future will require a Vocational Education and Training (VET) or university qualification.
- Employability skills the top skills sought by employers are communication skills, teamwork, problem solving ability, organisational skills, creativity and initiative.
- Experience workplace experience gives you a foot in the door, contacts and referees. Options include work experience placements, part-time or casual jobs, temporary or contract jobs, apprenticeships or traineeships, internships and volunteering.

Where to find a job:

- You need an excellent résumé and job application that is short, gives examples and is free from spelling and grammatical errors.
- Every job is unique and your approach to each application should be tailored. Research the business and explain how your skills make you the right fit for that role.
- Prepare for the interview by practicing interview questions, preparing some questions about the job and business, explain what skills you will bring to the job and plan what you will wear.

Employers also mentioned that some young people have unrealistic expectations of work, including:

- being unprepared for the demands of the workplace
- the level of pay they would receive
- wanting to start at the top instead of working their way up.

The rental, hiring and real estate services industry includes all enterprises predominantly engaged in renting and leasing assets, as well as businesses engaged in selling, buying and managing real estate. Property operators and real estate services sector businesses earn their income from the sale or lease of property. According to the Construction & Property Services Industry Skills Council, this sector is being impacted by technological opportunities, resulting in the need for its workforce to up-skill and complete specialised training to take advantage of these advancements. The Australian Bureau of Statistics' January Labour Force data

The Australian Bureau of Statistics has released its January Labour Force data with:

- the unemployment rate decreased to 6.4%
- Participation rate decreased to 66.1%.
- Employment increased to 12,939,900.
- Employment to population ratio increased to 61.9%.
- Underemployment rate decreased to 8.1%.
- Monthly hours worked decreased by 86 million hours.

Why is labour market information important?

To make good career decisions for the future, you need to have some idea of the employment prospects for the jobs you are interested in. The following resources can be helpful in this process:

Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR)

All states in Australia call their Year 12 tertiary entry score an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR). The ATAR is a number between 0 and 99.95 (highest) with increments of 0.05. The Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority (QCAA) provides all Tertiary Entrance data to QTAC who then calculates individual ATARs. If you are applying for interstate courses, the relevant tertiary admissions centre can obtain your ATAR directly from QTAC. You can learn more about ATARs and how to obtain an ATAR statement from the MyQCE portal.



Four ways to expand your social awareness

University Clinical Aptitude Test ANZ (UCAST) 2021

The University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT ANZ) is an admissions test used by the UCAT ANZ Consortium of universities in Australia and New Zealand for their medical, dental and clinical science degree programmes. It helps universities to select applicants with the most appropriate abilities and professional behaviours required for new doctors and dentists to be successful in their clinical careers. It is used in collaboration with other admissions processes such as interviews and academic qualifications. The UCAT ANZ is a computer-based test delivered in Pearson VUE test centres throughout Australia, New Zealand and at some overseas locations.

Some pathways to medicine / dentistry / clinical sciences will not require the UCAT ANZ and a different test may be required so you should refer to the websites of the <u>universities</u> to which they intend to apply to know what their application process requires.
