Together, we walked proudly, listened deeply, and celebrated the voices of our future leaders.


FROM BUNURONG LAND

Together, the school community raised over \$300 for the Wear It Purple charity, supporting their mission to empower LGBTQIA+ youth across Australia.

For many young people in the LGBTQIA+ community, seeing their school and peers stand proudly beside them sent a clear message: they are seen, valued, and belong.














LEARNING FESTIVAL

The Community Hub team hosted a community gathering for the Wyndham Learning Festival, bringing together local leaders, educators, service providers, and community members to highlight the meaningful work happening across our school and the broader Wyndham community.

The morning included keynote presentations from Equity Alliance and Target 100, sharing their work on systemic approaches to educational inclusion, closing the achievement gap, and addressing the over-representation of young people in Melbourne's west within the justice system. Guests also participated in a walkthrough of the Community Hub, exploring programs, partnerships, and student-led initiatives, and spent time networking and sharing ideas with others committed to improving outcomes for young people.
