


DESK DUTIES:

Gordon Pyke has sent in this advice on what to do when the 3G network is turned off this month. This is courtesy of the Eastern Emergency Relief Network.

3G Network to be turned off – check your phone

Telstra and Optus will switch off their 3G networks from 28 October 2024 (TPG Telecom and Vodafone has already switched off its 3G network). So, it is a good idea to check that your phone will still work. Some older phones and others that were not specifically made for Australia may not work properly. Some may also work for phone call, but not for emergency calls to 000.



A simple way to check if your phone will operate fully once the 3G network is turned off is to send a text message to 3498 and just write 3. You will then receive a message telling you if you phone will work properly when the 3G network is turned off. But if in doubt (or the message doesn't work), contact you mobile provider. Even call into one of their shops such as in Eastland.

Remember, if you have an old phone or the one you bought cheaply online is still working okay, it is important to check that when the 3G network stops it will still work, including making emergency calls.
