

at present will eventually be engaged in occupations which do not even exist today, and the other that by the end of the century, the working week could be one of twenty hours. When we realize that the eight year old child, now in the middle of his primary school life, will only be forty then, the implications become of vital importance.

Through our interests in the home and in community activities whether they be church, youth, art, literary or Mothers' Clubs, or sporting bodies, Activities Clubs or School Committees, and, of course, as teachers, we bear a heavy responsibility to prepare our children for this rather nebulous future.

The primary school does not prepare for a specific occupation. It can, and does, lay the foundations of skills in the basic areas and aims at creating an interest in, and a desire for further knowledge and experience.

At the end of my third annual inspection of your school I can say confidently that it is in the forefront of the work being done in Victoria to find the most suitable means of achieving these ends.

To meet the challenge of the future --- and a very strong one it will be --- your children will need to be adaptable to change and prepared to make decisions formulated on the basis of proven knowledge and the ability to weigh the pros and cons. They will need to know how to gain knowledge and how to make a reasoned judgment. They will need to realize that there are people with varying degrees of ability in various fields and that every one of these has a worthwhile part to play. They will need to know how to profitably employ their leisure time. They will need to be able to enjoy and contribute to the various arts. They will need to have health and moral courage to face the problems ahead.

The school is but one agency in this most formidable task. If you consider the needs as stated --- and there may be many others --- you will see that this is a reason for the existence of each of the school's activities over a wide range of so-called "subjects" which in themselves may only be the vehicles through which these needs are satisfied.

From your support of the school -- and this is well known far beyond the school community itself -- it is obvious that you approve of what is being done to help your children. I convey the thanks of the Education Department to all who are responsible.

By doing so, you are helping every child to achieve the aim so ably expressed in the school motto --- "Live Worthily".
