- install security systems, changes tumblers in locks, changes locks, cuts keys and opens locks by manipulation
- estimate costs and prepare quotes for repairs.

- 2. Complete a Job Opportunities Assessment
- 3. Attend a virtual YOU Session (Your Opportunities Unlimited Session)
- 4. Attend assessment and Officer Selection (if you are wanting this pathway)
- 5. Take a Fitness Test if required
- 6. Attend Enlistment and Appointment day

Also known as Personal Care Worker or Personal Carer, Aged or disabled carers support elderly and disabled people by helping them with daily activities and personal tasks. This can include assisting with eating, showering, dressing and cleaning, providing companionship, emotional support and transportation. Work usually takes place within the client's home or a residential care facility. If you are caring, compassionate and reliable, with the ability to communicate with people of all ages and abilities this may be a career pathway for you. Click here for more information.

What is a Vocational Education and Training (VET) qualification?

The National Careers Institute says that a vocational education and training (VET) qualification is a formal certification awarded by a training provider in recognition of the successful completion of an occupational or work-related knowledge and skills-based educational program. There are eight types of <u>VET qualifications</u>:

- Certificate I, II, III and IV
- Diploma
- Advanced Diploma
- Graduate Certificate
- Graduate Diploma.

All VET qualifications must be listed on the National Register, <u>training.gov.au</u>. Visit the Australian Qualifications Framework <u>website</u> for more information regarding VET qualifications.

Can't decide between a Registered Nurse, an Enrolled Nurse and a Midwife?

Registered nurses (RN) assess, plan, provide and evaluate preventative, curative and rehabilitative care for patients and supervise other nursing staff. They work in a wide variety of settings such as hospitals, aged care and other health care facilities and private medical practices. To become an RN, you need to complete a three-year Bachelor of Nursing at a university or other accredited institute of higher education. RNs are required to be registered with the <u>Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency: Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia</u>. You can obtain more information about this occupation from the <u>myfuture website</u> (you will need to Log in or Sign up to enter this free site) and the <u>Good Universities Guide website</u> (this site has a list of nursing specialisations).

Enrolled Nurses (EN) under the direction and supervision of Registered Nurses, assist with the provision of acute, preventative, curative, rehabilitative and the day-to-day personal nursing care of patients. They work in hospitals, aged-care facilities, the community and other healthcare settings. To become an EN in Australia, the minimum level of study is the Diploma of Nursing (18 months – 2 years), delivered through TAFE or an accredited private Registered Training Organisation. After graduation, ENs apply for registration with the <u>Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency: Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia</u> to practice as an Enrolled nurse. You can obtain more information about this occupation from the <u>myfuture website</u> (you will need to log in or Sign up to enter this free site) and the Good Universities Guide website.

Midwifes provide care and advice to women during pregnancy, labour and childbirth and postnatal care for women and babies in a range of settings such as the home, community, hospitals, clinics and health units. They are also known as a Certified Midwife or Registered Midwife and can specialise as a Community Midwife and/or Midwife Practitioner. A bachelor degree in midwifery is needed to work as a Midwife. Some Midwives complete postgraduate studies. Midwives are required to be registered with the <u>Australian Health Practitioner Regulation Agency: Nursing and Midwifery Board of Australia</u>. You can obtain more information about this occupation from <u>Your Career</u> and the <u>Good Universities Guide website</u>.

Students' career aspirations do not reflect education plans or labour market demand, says OECD

One in five students and one in three socially disadvantaged students across the OECD expect to go into desirable jobs that often require at least a bachelor's degree but at the same time do not expect to go to university, according to a new OECD report. The State of Global Teenage Career Preparation found a significant misalignment of teenagers' career expectations and the labour market. The study of 690 000 teenagers in 81 countries, based on data from the 2022 edition of the OECD PISA survey, also found that social background plays a bigger role in determining a student's educational ambition than academic ability. On average across OECD countries, low performing students with socio-economically advantaged backgrounds are more likely to expect to complete university education than high performing students from the lowest socio-economic backgrounds. Government allowances for students

Abstudy is a Government allowance which is available to Indigenous students and apprentices to assist with education, accommodation, living, transport and prescription medicine costs. To receive ABSTUDY, you must be enrolled in an approved course and not be receiving any other government assistance to complete your qualification. The payment rate you receive depends on several factors, including whether you are considered independent or dependent on your parents or guardians, whether you are studying full time or

QUT Indigenous Commonwealth Scholarships

Year 12 post school information management

If you are in Year 12 you should start a folder of information you will need later in the year and early next year. You can add to it during the year. Items that could be placed in this folder include:

- Learning Unique Identifier (LUI) number and password for your Learning Account so you can access
 your Year 12 results early. You will also be required to know your LUI to complete your QTAC
 application.
- Tax File Number (TFN), which you will need when applying for a HELP loan next year. You also need a TFN if you want to be paid for a full-time or part-time job.
- Unique Student Identifier (USI) A USI is your individual education number for life. Without one, you can't get Commonwealth financial assistance or your qualification or statement of attainment.
- The QTAC Guide, which you may receive in June or you can access online at QTAC website.
- Course, job and tertiary entry information you gather at career markets/expos, institution open days, TSXPO, etc.
- The list of courses you are considering (if you haven't a clue, make an appointment to see your Guidance Counsellor/Officer ASAP!!).
- If you're thinking about Uni, a list of Pathway and Early Offer schemes for the university/ies you are interested in studying at
- Handouts on tertiary entry you are given at Year 12 assemblies, expos and lunchtime talks.
- Information about available scholarships and tips for submitting a great application.
- Additional qualifications you might wish to submit as part of your QTAC application and/or portfolio particularly if applying for EAS
- Any other information related to your plans for 2026.

Changes to Bachelor of Veterinary Science for 2026

UQ have changed their prerequisites for entry into the Bachelor of Science for 2026. The Queensland Year 12 (or equivalent) prerequisites are now:

• General English subject (Units 3 & 4, C)

- Chemistry (Units 3 & 4, C)
- Mathematical Methods (Units 3 & 4, C);
- One of Physics or Biology (Units 3 & 4, C).

Applicants must also complete <u>Casper</u>, a situational judgement test in the year of application. Casper test dates are 19 June, 5 August, 11 September and 5 October.

In 2025, a new selection method will be introduced to determine which applicants receive offers for 2026. Applicants will be ranked using a Combined Final Selection Index that considers both their adjusted ATAR or tertiary study selection rank and their result in the situational judgment test. The combined final selection rank will be a combination of both academic and non-academic performance as follows:

- 60% from the adjusted ATAR/tertiary study selection rank (academic performance)
- 40% from the Casper Test score (non-academic performance)

Provisional entry for the Doctor of Medicine (MD)

Applicants are now selected for all offers using a merit order rank which is derived by:

- percentile rank in the MMI (Multi-mini interview) = 50%
- percentile rank in the UCAT = 25%
- percentile rank in the Adjusted ATAR = 25%

This rank was derived by QTAC across those applicants who met the ATAR better or equal to an ATAR 95.00 threshold

If you don't meet the entry requirements for the provisional entry pathway, consider applying for one of our <u>recommended bachelor's degrees</u>. You can then apply for the <u>graduate entry pathway</u> in your final year of study. You can meet the other requirements for this pathway (e.g. subject prerequisites) while you complete your bachelor's degree.

Year 12 subject adjustment scheme

From Semester 1, 2027 you can receive a maximum of **3 adjustments** under the Subject Incentive Scheme. You may still be eligible for other schemes including the <u>School Opportunity Scheme</u> and <u>Rural Access</u> Scheme for a combined maximum of 5 adjustments.

Early Entry Offer

UNE Early Entry is open to all Year 12 applicants, whether or not you're expecting to receive an ATAR. Early Entry relies on your school's assessment of your attributes and abilities, your ability to work and learn independently and your overall potential for academic success. Based on your school's recommendation, UNE will guarantee you an offer to start with them in 2026 but if you are not eligible for one of your preferences, you will receive an offer for an alternative course.
