To assist with providing a safe environment for students both within the school as well as on excursions, all students must wear the approved college uniform. The reason for this is that it makes it possible to readily identify our students as well as those who are not part of our community and to enable them to safely participate in college activities.

The correct wearing of uniform also adds to the student's sense of belonging to the college community and encourages the students to develop a sense of pride in the school.

When all students wear the college uniform it promotes the development of a sense of egalitarianism, so that all students can feel equal within the college. The provision of a college uniform also makes it cheaper for parents to provide appropriate and durable clothing for their children to wear to school.

Summer (Terms 1 & 4) Girls

- Lyndale SC summer dress
- Shorts or grey stretch trousers with white cotton school shirt with logo or white cotton long sleeve shirt and school tie
- Lyndale SC blazer
- Lyndale SC jumper
- White knee high/ankle socks (stockings are not to be worn with the summer dress)
- Female students wearing a hi-jab may wear black tights/stockings under their summer



Lyndale SC winter skirt, or grey stretch trousers with,

White cotton school shirt with logo or white cotton long sleeve shirt and school tie

Winter (Terms 2 & 3) Girls

- Lyndale SC blazer
- Lyndale SC jumper
- Black knee high socks or black stockings



Summer (Terms 1 & 4) Boys

- Grey school trousers or grey school shorts
- White cotton short sleeve shirt with logo or white cotton long sleeve shirt and school tie
- Lyndale SC blazer
- Lyndale SC jumper
- Grey ankle socks or short plain grey socks



Winter (Terms 2 & 3) Boys Grey school trousers or grey school long grey school trousers with

- White long sleeve shirt and school
- College blazer, college jumper
- Short plain grey or white socks



Both Girls & Boys - PE Uniform

- Lyndale SC v-neck polo
- Black sports shorts
- Black tracksuit pants with the college name
- White socks
- Runners must be worn in the stadium at all times

When students have PE in Period 1. the complete PE uniform may be worn to school. students must then change into their school uniform for the remainder of the day. When students have PE in Period 4, the complete PE uniform may be worn home.



Both Girls & Boys - Outer uniform

- The college blazer is the required outer garment
- If a student is wearing the college jumper they must also wear a college
- A college blazer may be worn without a jumper
- Plain black leather lace up shoes for boys & girls or t-bars for the girls







What is NOT acceptable dress at Lyndale Secondary College:

- Wearing non LSC jumpers, jackets or coats, caps in the classroom or corridors
- Jeans or leggings
- Boots, Basketball style shoes, thongs, platform or high-heeled shoes
- Hairstyles should not be extreme and must be of a naturally occurring colour. No facial hair is permitted. Students are to be clean shaven
- Make up, if worn, should be subtle to the point of being unnoticeable. Nail polish must be clear only
- No visible jewellery may be worn with the exception of a watch and a pair of sleepers or studs in the ears only
- No other facial/body piercing is permitted
- Tattoos must not be visible at any time
- Mobile phones and ear phones are to be kept in lockers at all times

Safeguarding your property

All students are expected to have uniform items clearly and permanently labelled. All books and requisites must be named and kept in lockers, not in school bags.

Locker, Student Diary and Canteen

Lockers

Every student at Lyndale Secondary College has a locker to keep your school books, equipment and bags. Each student is required to purchase a combination lock from the school. It is important that you do not share your code with anyone else and keep your locker locked and organised at all times. You must store and bring all the relevant equipment, textbooks, device and pencil case for each class.

Student Diary

Each student will receive a student diary at the beginning of the year. You must bring your school diary to every class as it can help you plan and manage your work, record your achievements,

communicate between parents and teachers and provides useful information about the school.

Canteen

Reading is a wonderful pastime. If you are an ESL student it will be very important to read as much as possible to improve your English. So use the library as much as you can! You may work quietly when you are in the library and ensure you are tidy & take care of all equipment.

Borrowing Conditions

Students can borrow up to 4 items and should present their student card as proof of identity. You can borrow books, magazines, journals, class sets, talking books, charts and maps. Loans are either 7 or 14 days depending upon what you have borrowed.

Students with overdue books will not be allowed to borrow other items until the overdue books are returned or paid for.

Never ever borrow books for your friends under your name! You will have to pay if they loose the books.



Laptop Program (BYOD)



Lyndale Secondary College is dedicated to ensuring students develop the skills and knowledge to be a successful member of the 21st Century Digital Age. Individual access to personal laptop will assist in providing the best contemporary education for all students at Lyndale. By facilitating a Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) program, we empower our students and give them direct involvement in the way they use technology in their learning. **The IT office is located in the B building next to the library if you require extra support with your device.**

How does it work?

At Lyndale Secondary College students are expected to bring their own computing device to the College every day.

BYOD Parent Managed

Parents must provide a laptop of their own choice. Tablets such as iPads and phones are not permitted as the primary device a student uses at school, and will not be connected to the school's WiFi.



Laptop Program (Continued)

Minimum Netbook requirements:

For the purpose of BYOD use in class, iPads, smartphones and tablets are not a suitable replacement for a laptop.

The device used by the student must have:

- a physical keyboard
- a USB port
- 6 hours battery life or more.
- a minimum 10" viewable screen
- Support provided by your retail outlet
- Minimum 4 gigabytes (Gb) installed RAM
- Minimum 64Gb storage capacity
- Chromebooks are NOT recommended for use by students of any year level.
- Apple brand laptops are NOT recommended for students in years 7, 8, 9 or 10.
 Students may elect to obtain an Apple laptop in Year 11 and 12 depending on the subjects chosen (such as Media, or Visual Communications).
- Windows 10 running in 'S Mode' cannot be used. The student will be asked to switch
 the device out of 'S Mode' to revert the device to Windows 10 Home. 'S-Mode' devices
 cannot connect to the school's WiFi, and cannot install the superior version of Microsoft
 Office provided by DET. 'S-Mode' installations of Office cannot be activated using the
 student's EduPass credentials.

Support for ICT devices by school technicians

Lyndale SC technicians will support your child's ICT device where possible and practical to do so. Lyndale SC *cannot* provide support for devices under warranty by the manufacturer. You must contact the manufacturer (through the retailer) to obtain support for your in-warranty device.

For devices verified to be out of warranty, the Lyndale SC technicians will assess the device's problem and provide to the student recommendations. In the case of physical failure or damage – such as a broken screen or faulty keyboard – the technicians will research the cost of replacement parts and advise accordingly. The technicians may not be able to assist due to complexity or fragility and will also advise accordingly. Replacement parts may not be available.

Where the installed operating system is confirmed to be corrupt to the point the device will not boot or programs no longer run, the technicians <u>might</u> be able to reset the device, or re-install the operating system entirely. Loss of files might result.

DET provides ALL students the free use of the Microsoft Office product (Word, Excel, Powerpoint, etc) and the Adobe Creative Cloud software suite, for both Mac and Windows devices. Do NOT sign up for a Microsoft Office subscription at the time you purchase your device. You should also resist pressure to buy an anti-virus software subscription because the Windows 'Defender' antivirus software built into Windows is adequate. Apple devices so very rarely get viruses antivirus software.





DET provides students with a free 'OneDrive' cloud file storage solution with practically unlimited space. DET provides all students with an 'EduPass' email account. This account will be the default used to receive Compass communications.

Our ICT Technicians are available to answer questions and to give assistance.

I'm concerned about the costs

The purchase of a device is a major decision and a significant expense. A good quality device may last up to four years and viewed over this timeframe the expense is considerably less. Lyndale Secondary College is integrating use of devices into many aspects of teaching and learning. Your investment allows the College to maximize learning outcomes for all students.

I'm concerned about device security

Experience from the previous Commonwealth-funded scheme indicates that students who took good care of their device and considered themselves the device's owner rarely had device security issues. If you are concerned the device is going to be broken, lost or stolen, you may wish to consider specific accidental loss and breakage insurance for the device. You can specifically list the item on your home contents insurance, or you might be able to purchase an Accidental Damage Protection plan for your device. Internet access on the device will be filtered by DET and students are prohibited from connecting to other networks while at school.

Actions required by Students and Parents/Guardians

All students in Years 7 - 12 are expected to bring their netbook to school each day. Prior to bringing a personal device for the first time, students and their parents must read and sign the Acceptable Use Agreement which sets out the responsibilities and expectations for use of all electronic devices at Lyndale Secondary College. Students must use their device in accordance with the College's Cyber Safety Policy and the Acceptable Use Agreement.

Students must follow teachers' directions as to appropriate use of their devices in class. Each student is absolutely and solely responsible for the care and conduct of his/her own personal device whilst at school or at other school activities, travelling to and from school or to and from other school activities. Students must present their device to the ICT technicians to have it connected to the school's wireless network.

Students must not connect to any other network, wired, wireless or cellular whilst at school. iPads and other tablets, and phones, will not be connected to the wireless network.

Actions by Lyndale Secondary College

Maintain a BYOD Equity Policy to ensure all students, no matter their family's financial means, have access to the computing resources, inside and outside of class time, that are required by their coursework.

Provide an Acceptable Use Agreement to list the responsibilities and expectations of each student and their families.

Ensure a copy of the Acceptable Use Agreement is signed by each student and their parents prior to allowing the student's device to be brought to school. A copy of the signed Agreement will be held by the College.

Provide a wireless network with filtered Internet connection to which students can connect their device.

Install software which is appropriate for the College's teaching and learning. Provide support to assist students with establishing network connectivity with the device.

Accept no responsibility for loss or damage to, or for maintenance or repair required on a student's device through any act or omission resulting from the negligence or otherwise of the College, a member of the College staff or of another student.

All parents, guardians, students and teachers in the Lyndale Secondary College community have a personal secure online Lyndale COMPASS account. By regularly logging in to COMPASS you will be kept well

informed about what is happening at Lyndale including information specific to your child.

To access the secure COMPASS portal go to

The school will provide parents with their personal login details. On their first login parents are required to verify their details and to change the password provided. Parents should not share their login details with

anyone. This includes their own children, who are issued with their own login.

By logging in to their portal parents will be able to:

- Monitor your child's attendance, and enter an explanation for absence of lateness
- Communicate with your child's teachers, and update your family contact details
- View your child's timetable and the school calendar
- Monitor your child's homework and assessment tasks
- Download and view your child's progress and semester reports
- Book parent—teacher conferences
- Pay and provide consent for events and school fees.

How do I access Compass?

Compass is accessible on any modern web browser (Internet Explorer, Firefox, Chrome, Safari) or by using the Compass iOS or Android apps (continue reading to learn more about the app including how to use it).

To access the parent portal, you can go to your school's website and click the Compass link on their homepage. Alternatively, you can go to schools.compass.education where you can search for our school's direct URL.

To log in you will require your unique family username and password. These details will be provided to you by our school. Upon first login, you will be required to change your password and confirm your email address and mobile phone number. These details may be used by our school for SMS, password recovery and email communication throughout the year.



Compass Apps

You can download the Compass App on iOS and Android devices, simply search for Compass School Manager in the store.





Assessment and Reporting are essential elements of the Teaching and Learning Cycle. Assessment is an ongoing process of gathering information, analysing and reflecting on results which supports consistent improvement in student learning and indicates future directions. Assessment, both formative and summative is an integral part of learning. Students' progress is regularly communicated to parents/carers in both written reports and through Parent/Student/Teacher Interviews. In Years 7 to 10 the College will report against the Victorian Curriculum Standards.

The assessment is based on the student's performance against the state-wide standards. There are currently **four reporting cycles** within the school year. These are as follows:

Interim Reports (end of Term 1 and end of Term 3):

• These reports indicate your child's progress in regards to the standard of classwork, work ethic, self-management and behaviour in each of their classes.

End of Semester Reports (End of term 2 and End of term 4):

- These comprehensive written reports are published at the end of Semester 1 and 2
- Letter grades will be awarded in these reports for each Common Assessment Task
- Students will receive feedback for each CAT to allow for improvement and growth

Ongoing Reporting

Feedback is provided on Compass for each Common Assessment Task. This is accessible to students and parents by opening the Learning Task. Feedback for each Common Assessment Task is compiled and uploaded for reporting purposes.





Year 7 and 8 Curriculum

Years 7 and 8 we provide each student with a comprehensive and balanced education. Students are encouraged to think critically and creatively, making links in their learning across classes, subjects and beyond. We have a strong focus on literacy and numeracy with students having eight x 75 minute periods of Mathematics and English each fortnight.

Lyndale Secondary College Year 7 and 8 curriculum is divided into eight domains: The Arts, English, Language (French and Japanese), Health & Physical Education,

Mathematics, Science, Humanities and Technology. Throughout Year 7 and 8, all students will have the opportunity to learn and study a variety of subjects within these domains.

The curriculum is in line with the Victorian Curriculum, which describes what students are expected to know and be able to do at different levels.

Year 9 Curriculum

Consolidating learning from Years 7-8, Lyndale Secondary College provides engaging learning experiences and strong preparation leading to the independence and responsibility of Years 10-12.

Lyndale Secondary College's Year 9 Curriculum Program provides students with a core curriculum of studies, along with significant choice of subjects to suit their individual

preferences. Students undertake core studies in Mathematics, English, Languages,

Humanities, Sciences, Health and Physical Education. Students also select from a wide variety of Semester-based electives where they pursue their interests within the areas of Technology and The Arts, so to increase their engagement at school.

Year 10 Curriculum

We are a school who prides ourselves in offering our students with a diverse range of

innovative programs that cater for individual needs and aspirations of all students. These programs also support personal growth, encourage self-discipline and promote social

responsibility. As students enter Year 10, the senior pathways available to them increase significantly. The students may choose a course designed to prepare them for the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE), Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning (VCAL) or

Apprenticeship/ Traineeships (VET). It is therefore important that students are provided with a course that meets their specific educational needs and that challenges them to produce their personal best.

The Year 10 course is designed to effectively prepare students with the skills and knowledge to successfully complete the applied and academic learning pathways that will be available in the VCE, VCAL and on and off-site Vocational Education and Training (VET) programs. Similar to Year 9, there is a variety of core subjects and electives/ programs students select as part of their studies.

VCAL

The Victorian Certificate of Applied Learning is an alternative Senior School qualification that allows students to complete practical work-related experience, as well as literacy and numeracy skills and the opportunity to build personal skills that are important for life and work. If students choose to study the VCAL, they will gain practical experience and 'employability' skills as well as the skills they will need to go onto further training in the workplace or at a TAFE institute.

As part of students enrolment, they are required to complete work placement and enrol in a VET course. The students who have been enrolled in VCAL have been able to greatly

benefit from being able to network with potential employers and/or try out an industry to see whether they are interested in going on to an apprenticeship or traineeship.

VCE

We are a school who prides ourselves in offering our students a diverse range of innovative programs that cater for the individual needs and aspirations of all students.

These programs also support personal growth, encourage self-discipline and promote

social responsibility. With these opportunities comes an expectation of performance. Our expectation as a College is that each student will perform to the best of their ability in their chosen program.

To ensure all students select and undertake appropriate and relevant programs, students receive extensive course and careers counselling together with rigorous academic support. Relationships between students and staff are based on mutual respect and cooperation as they work towards a common goal of achievement.

Challenge and Extension

Learning in each classroom is differentiated and personalised. All students are supported to develop their leadership skills, problem-solving abilities and to challenge themselves to reach their full potential.

The College encourages students to extend their abilities and knowledge through participation in public speaking and debating, literacy events, school governance, robotics, performing arts, sport and a variety of clubs and leadership positions.



Student Wellbeing

Lyndale Secondary College is committed to providing a safe and caring learning environment for all members of it's community. Students are encouraged and supported to take responsibilities for their wellbeing and all teachers have a duty of care in this area. Students' first point of call for any issues relating to their wellbeing is their classroom teacher. Year Level Coordinators oversee the engagement and management of students ensuring their safety and a positive school culture.

The Wellbeing Team

At Lyndale, the Wellbeing Team consists of a Leading Teacher who is also a qualified counsellor, two school based and one external psychologist from the Regional Student Services, a Wellbeing Officer and qualified counsellor and a school community nurse. This team is available to support students with counselling, guidance, advocacy, psycho-educational assessments and referrals where required. They act as a liaison between staff members, parents and external agencies to support students with various aspects of their educational and school life. It guides the Program for Students with Disabilities and provides parents and teachers with strategies to address specific physical, socio emotional and academic student needs.

Wellbeing Services

The Student Wellbeing Department is a more specialised student support service. It provides a range of services to support students who experience serious challenges in their lives. Challenges which negatively impact on their resiliency and their education. These may include, poor academic performance, social emotional problems, difficult peer relationships, financial difficulties, conflict resolution, health concerns and those related to learning and study. The Wellbeing Team provides a number of services to support both individual and groups (class, year levels, whole school) of students

Wellbeing Services Include:

- Counselling
- Absenteeism tracking and follow up for individual and groups
- Home visits
- Psycho-educational assessment
- Building a positive school culture
- Health information

Student Engagement Team

All student engagement based extra curricular programs in the college are overseen by the Student Engagement Team (SET). This team:

- Oversees the developments of all policies, services & programs that support the socio-emotional educational development of students at each year level and that specifically address issues of resiliency, transition & pathways and student voice.
- Monitors and profiles all school services and programs and their relevancy to our school community.
- It makes recommendations for programs & resources based on school data which identifies student needs and emerging trends.
- It develops strategies for the development of services and programs that address the gaps in our profile and ensure their smooth implementation and promotion.
- It ensures this services/programs further build on each year levels' sense of
- community, build resiliency and engage 'Student Voice' in their delivery.

The Student Engagement Team is a subcommittee of the school council 'Student Service' Team. It incorporates a range of perspectives through representation from the following areas of the college:

- Student Engagement Wellbeing
- Curriculum
- Principal Class
- Middle Sub-school
- Senior Sub-school
- VCAL
- Careers
- Student Leadership/SRC/Scholarships Coordinator
- House Teams Coordinator
- Student support and intervention programs

The SET meets twice a term and the assigned dates are reflected in the school calendar.

Referrals to Wellbeing

Students can be referred to this department through: Year Level Coordinators, classroom teachers, parents, students and through self referrals. Students and parents can make their referrals directly to the members of the wellbeing Team.

The SSSO Service

The Region Student Services program provides a range of services to schools, including psychological, speech pathology, and social work support. Referrals to this service must go through the Wellbeing Team.

The Wellbeing Office is found in the Front Office.



Supportive Relationships Policy

Lyndale Secondary College is committed to providing a supportive and safe environment for members of the College community. The College will respond quickly and effectively in the event of a bullying incident. Supportive relationships see our community cooperate to provide and enjoy a safe, caring environment. Supportive relationships promote respect for self and for others. Appreciation of differences and the need to cooperate are essential ingredients of a working, supportive and harmonious community. Individuals within such a community feel valued and understand how they actively contribute to the happiness and wellbeing of others.

Lyndale Secondary College values staff, students and parents working together to create a supportive environment for all.

Rights and Responsibilities

The College community, students and staff of Lyndale Secondary College have a right to a safe and caring environment that promoted learning, personal growth and positive self-esteem. The College is committed to providing such an environment and all members of the College community have the responsibility to ensure this occurs.

What is bullying?

"Bullying is when someone, or a group of people, upset or create risk to another person's health and safety—either psychologically or physically—their property, reputation or social acceptance, on more than one occasion." *Safe Schools are Effective School.*

Bullying is a form of aggressive behaviour and can be differentiated from teasing and violence in three ways:

- Bullying is a deliberate hurtful action directed towards another person or persons, by one or more persons
- Bullying is often repetitious in nature, where incidents occur more than once and are not random acts. However, severe "one-off" bullying also occurs and is recognised as potential very harmful
- Bullying usually involves a person having more power or strength at the time. As distinct
 from playful teasing, bullying is a mean action intended to hurt the victim and create
 subordination as well as a feeling of superiority for the bully.





Supportive Relationships Policy (Continued)

Types of bullying

There are a variety of categories and examples of bullying behaviour including:

Direct Physical Bullying: hits, trips, pushes, pokes, damages property, physically threatens, gives intimidating looks, steals property, touching and brushing up against (sexual in nature).

Direct Verbal Bullying: calls names, insults, makes homophobic remarks, makes racist remarks, verbally abuses name, family, religion, disability, or other individual characteristic of "victim", laughs at, puts down, threatens, sexual joking and innuendo.

Indirect Bullying: (sometimes referred to as "Social Bullying"; this form of bullying is harder to recognise and is often carried out behind the bullied student's back. It is designed to harm someone's social reputation and/or cause humiliation): lies and spreads rumours, plays nasty jokes to embarrass and humiliate, mimics, deliberately leaves "victim" out of activities, encourages others to socially exclude someone, damages someone's social reputation and social acceptance.

Cyberbullying: this involves being cruel to others by sending or posting harmful material or engaging in other forms of social aggression using the internet or other digital technologies.

Lyndale Secondary College's prevention and response plan

Lyndale Secondary College staff are committed to:

- Modelling supportive behaviour in words and actions at all times.
- Being vigilant for sings of distress or suspected incidents of bullying.
- Assisting the person being bullied by removing sources of distress, without
- increasing any risk to their wellbeing. Victims of bullying behaviour are encouraged to practise assertive behaviours and offered ongoing support whenever necessary. Eg. Classroom Support Program, Student Workshops.
- Referring suspected incidents to the appropriate staff member (Form Teacher, Coordinators, Sub-School Leaders, Student Wellbeing Leader, Principal Class) who will follow the College's procedures to deal with the behaviour.
- Year Level Coordinators & Wellbeing staff complete the Response to Bullying templates and procedures.

- Assist those who exhibit bullying behaviour by:
 - Applying Restorative Justice practises
 - Consistently applying the College's Supportive Relationship Policy
 - Providing ongoing counselling, whenever necessary, to reinforce the value of supportive relationships

In cases where a student has been identified as engaging in bullying behaviours, the procedures listed below will be acted on. Student Managers may also invoke detention consequences or suspension (in accordance with the Department of Education and Early Childhood Development's Student Engagement Guidelines) whenever they believe that individual cases warrant these actions.

First Offence: A formal warning is issued by a Form Teacher, Coordinator, Wellbeing Leader, Assistant Principal, Principal, in which it is made clear that the bullying behaviour must cease. An attempt to resolve the situation via mediation and conferencing with the parties involved is undertaken.

Second Offence: The offending student is issued with a Bullying/Harassment Notice that informs parents of the College's concerns and forewarns of the consequences should the behaviour continue. A Student Support Group Meeting may also be undertaken at this stage.

Third Offence: Suspension procedures will be instigated. Repeated bullying behaviour may lead to exclusion from the College.

Lyndale Secondary College students are expected to:

- Refuse to be involved in any form of bullying, either alone or as part of a group,
- Report the incident or any suspected incident to a trusted adult at the College (eg Pastoral Teacher, Teacher, Coordinator, Student Wellbeing staff),
- Take some form of preventative or supportive action (eg speak up on that person's behalf) if they feel safe to do so.




Supportive Relationships Policy (Continued)

What parents and family members can do to help:

- Watch for signs of distress in your child (eg unwillingness to attend school, a pattern of headaches, missing personal belongings, requests for extra money, damaged clothes or bruising).
- Take an active interest in your child's social life and acquaintances, encouraging out of school social contact.
- Encourage your child to take the initiative by immediately telling a staff member about any bullying incident.
- Keep a written record of what is happening (who, what, when, why, how).
- Discourage retaliation.
- Be willing to attend interviews at the College if your child is involved in any bullying incident.
- Be willing to inform a Teacher, Coordinator, Student Wellbeing staff or

Principal class of any cases of suspected bullying, even if your own child is not directly affected.

- Teach your child the value of supportive relationships.
- If the problem continues to occur please re-contact the school.

Inter-school sport



Lessons are half an hour per week during school hours, and students are expected to maintain a regular practise routine at home during the week or at school where possible. The timetable for lessons during school hours is structured on a rotating basis to ensure minimal disruption to classes.

The Free Tutoring & Homework Support Program will help students who:


- may need assistance in completing class work, assessment and other learning tasks
