## APPLIED LITERACY - YEAR 9, 2019 - 100 hrs, Elective Subject

The College is offering a Year 9 elective subject called **Applied Literacy**, following its successful introduction into the Stage 5 subject choice selections in 2018. It has been strategically designed to address the increased emphasis on whole-school literacy improvement at SPX, with a focus on literacy skills mastery of literacy and language skills in reading, writing and use of language conventions, spelling, punctuation and grammar.

This is a tailored school-developed one-year elective program for Year 9 students, which provides a structured but unpressured classroom setting, involving a schedule of practical, targeted and self-directed literacy tasks and activities aimed at maximising students' literacy skills, communicative confidence and achievement potential across their Stage 5 subjects.

Applied Literacy is a unique course in its focus on addressing individualised literacy needs, its explicit teaching and learning of skills, its ongoing formative assessment, its wide range of age-appropriate high-interest resources including interactive vocabulary games and skill-builder activities, as well as its one to one literacy conferencing, and its goal to improve learning habits and exam performance.

The Applied Literacy program also allows for a regular 'Applied Study' Period, to allow boys allocated time to work independently on their choice of cross-curricular assignments or assessment tasks which involve reading, interpretation, responding and writing skills, and to be monitored and assisted with their work if and as needed.

## Sample topics, features and content of the Applied Literacy course include:

- how to identify and use grammatical features and language techniques in a wide range of popular and literary texts;
- how to read for meaning, and to recognise when reading, language for emphasis and effect;
- how deconstruct questions, tasks, topics and address instructional language and keywords within task notifications;
- how to employ a range of comprehension strategies to boost understanding of fiction and non-fiction texts;
- how to build and use active vocabulary, and strengthen working memory;
- understanding the difference between analytical writing and descriptive writing;
- distinguishing literal from higher-order figurative meaning in responses;
- how to paraphrase without plagiarising;
- how to revise and study for exams and assessments
- how to structure and write for specific purposes including persuasive and information texts, using appropriate language and vocabulary;
- how to draft and edit writing, for content and conventions;
- how to write and deliver confident oral presentations on a topic;
- how to use visual literacy skills, when interpreting visual texts or media texts
