RECONCILIATION WEEK 2025



Earlier this term, we proudly acknowledged the important role our school community plays in building a reconciled, inclusive, and respectful future. Reconciliation Week provided a powerful opportunity to reflect, connect, and take meaningful steps toward truth-telling, justice, and unity.

We were honoured to welcome Aunty Judy Dalton Walsh, a respected Wathaurong Elder, who delivered a powerful Culture Talk that inspired deep reflection and learning. Students also participated in energetic workshops with Indigenous Outreach Projects, exploring both traditional dance and contemporary hip hop, highlighting the strength, creativity, and resilience of First Nations culture.

A special Smoking Ceremony, led by Elders from the Bunurong Land Council Aboriginal Corporation was held for our Year 12 cohort and deepened our school's collective connection to Country and culture.

Our Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) Management Group has continued developing our school's second RAP, focusing on strengthening relationships, building respect, and creating opportunities, especially within our classrooms.

A proud moment from the week was when our Young Mob students visited Western Autistic School to share stories, culture, and connection with primaryaged students. It was a meaningful exchange that reflected the leadership and pride of our students.

Together, we continue to walk the path of reconciliation- learning, sharing, and growing side by side.

We will provide an environment in which we aim to support every student to engage with truth, justice, and healing through reconciliation via the curriculum and listening to our elders and our family stories. - Year 7 students took part in a high-energy basketball clinic with Junubi, learning new skills and teamwork through sport.
- Years 8 and 9 joined an energetic Afro Movements dance class, moving to the rhythms of African music and culture.
- Year 10 explored the traditional art of Karen weaving, discovering the skill and symbolism behind this beautiful cultural practice.
- Year 11 students unleashed their voices through slam poetry, crafting spokenword pieces on identity, migration, and hope.
- Year 12 wrote heartfelt letters of welcome to newly arrived families, offering solidarity and encouragement.

ARTIST STATEMENT

Hi, I'm Sofia Hla, a young artist from Myanmar. My journey brought me from Myanmar's Kayin State to Australia in late 2021, a time marked by significant conflict back home. It gives me a deep passion for helping my people. This Refugee Week, I'm dedicating my art to make a tangible difference. I'm raffling off one of my paintings: (Bagan) a captivating sunset scene from Bagan, the ancient UNESCO World Heritage Site in Myanmar's Mandalay Region, renowned for its golden temples and pagodas. This piece isn't just a painting; it's a piece of our resilient heritage, offered as a prize for those who stand with us.

All funds raised will go directly to supporting refugees in Karen State, providing essential education, food, and shelter. My art represents half of this effort, and the other half comes from your support.

This term, we were joined by Claire and Jimmy from the First Peoples' Assembly Youth Team to help us learn more about Treaty and why it matters.

A Treaty is an agreement between groups that sets out how they'll work together. In Victoria, the government and First Peoples are working on Treaties to recognise the truth of the past, and to give Aboriginal communities the power to make decisions about what's best for them, especially at the local level.

There are two kinds of Treaties being worked on:

- Local Treaties with Traditional Owners, to support decisions made for communities by communities.
- A Statewide Treaty, which strengthens the First Peoples' Assembly to help drive big changes and make life better for Aboriginal people across Victoria.

Treaty is about truth, respect, and a better future, together and our Young Mob students were able to provide feedback on what they would like to see for their futures.

Staff, students, parents, and families from our school joined the Wyndham leg of Walk for Truth, led by Commissioner Travis Lovett, a proud Kerrupmara Gunditjmara man.

The walk was part of a 500km journey from Portland to Parliament House in Naarm, calling for truth-telling and justice. Message Sticks collected along the way were delivered to Parliament — a powerful call for government to listen and act on the Truth shared through the Yoorrook Justice Commission.

We're proud to have stood alongside thousands of First Peoples and allies in this historic moment.





This term, our Year 8 and 9 students had the powerful opportunity to hear from Aunty Brenda Matthews, a proud First Nations woman and survivor of the Stolen Generations. Aunty Brenda generously shared her personal story, one of love, loss, resilience, and identity. Her words moved the room into stillness, creating a moment of deep listening and reflection for all present. It was more than a history lesson; it was an act of truth-telling that left a lasting impact on both students and staff.

Later that day, our school hosted a Family Yarning Circle with Aunty Brenda, where she led a traditional weaving workshop.

The event brought together elders, parents, children, and community members, sitting side by side, sharing stories, laughter, and connection through culture. Aunty Brenda's husband Mark and our KESO Aunty Judy Dalton Walsh also joined us for the day, offering guidance and support.

A highlight of the experience was witnessing the growth and strength of our Young Mob students, who engaged with deep respect and cultural pride. Many of these students began their journey in the Young Mob program still seeking a sense of identity and belonging. Now, they stand with confidence, asking questions, showing leadership, and honouring their culture with every step.

This event was made possible through the dedication of our Enrichment student, Annabella, whose project work focused on cultural learning and community building, with the support of her mother Janis. We extend our heartfelt thanks to Aunty Brenda for her generosity and strength in sharing her story with our school community. Her message, and the space she created, will remain with us for a long time.

For those who want to learn more, Aunty Brenda's story is captured in her memoir and featured in the documentary The Last Daughter, available on Netflix.
