If you're in doubt, or your qualification doesn't appear, we encourage you to apply so that Admissions can assess you. Don't forget to put UniPrep as an additional course preference if you are an Australian Citizen or Permanent Resident, and/or apply to Edith Cowan College or TAFE as a back up too.

If you're an international student and wish to come to ECU, but do not have the subjects and marks to do so directly, think about attending a Registered Training Organisation, like Edith Cowan College or TAFE. This could help you meet requirements and may also mean you get credit for a related course.

Please note: International students cannot apply for our Experience Based Entry Scheme, unless you are studying the Western Australian High School standard subjects at your school and are set to achieve an ATAR. International students are also not eligible for UniPrep.



What is Experience Based Entry?

If you're a Year 12 student and your ATAR is just below a specific course, but higher than our minimum ATAR entry, or you're a Year 12 student with high achievement in three ATAR subjects, you may be eligible to submit an Experience Based Entry application to ECU for one of our Bachelor courses.

Keep in mind that not all courses accept these applications and not everyone is eligible to submit one. We encourage you to contact us about your individual situation and determine if this pathway might work for you.

In your application you would include:

Introductory letter – explaining why you want to attend university and the reasons why you have chosen your particular course. You would also include your future career goals. It should communicate your commitment, preparedness to study and motivation to study.

Resumé – outlining your work experience to date, including details of paid work and any voluntary positions you have undertaken, for example in a sporting club or at your church. If you don't have any work or volunteer experience, that's fine too.

Academic records – detailing your education to date, including secondary school and activities such as leadership programs, sports coaching, umpiring accreditation, TAFE or Registered Training Organisation qualifications, industry training/accreditation, and workplace training. Referees – including two written references, with at least one being a professional/work/school reference.

Checklist – make sure that you attach our Applicant Checklist to the front of your portfolio documents, if you're posting the submission to us.

You may be required to attend an interview. If so, we'll be in touch.
