Staying Safe at Schoolies

At the end of Year 12, you deserve your well earned celebration. Whatever you've got lined up, we hope you have an amazing time.

Although you probably don't need reminding, we've put together a few tips and resources you might like to read before you head off.

Your parents will also feel happier when you tell that that you've done your due diligence and are all prepared – winning!

Before Schoolies starts:

Planning ahead could help ensure that you have a drama free, full fun time.

- Leave a copy of your bank card details at home in case you lose it and have to cancel it, and take your bank contact details with you so that you can report lost or stolen cards
- Make sure you'll have enough money to cover all the essentials while you're away, including an emergency stash
- Know where you're staying and how you'll be getting there
- Plan a safe place you can store any important documents or valuables while you're away
- Remember your phone charger and make sure you have plenty of credit/data, so that
 you can stay in touch with home or call for help if you need to
- When you've booked your accommodation make sure your parents or carers have a copy of the details they'll want to know where you are and it could be handy if you have any problems with your booking

What to pack

We've no doubt you'll take enough outfits to last (hopefully enough socks and jocks too), but you might also need:

- Your ID
- Phone charger
- A hat, sunscreen and mozzie repellent
- Some comfy shoes
- Small first aid kit band aids and paracetamol at least
- Any medications or prescriptions you might need
- Snacks and emergency food; muesli bars, noodles, cup-a-soups for example
- A reusable water bottle is a good idea staying hydrated is really important
- Sharing a room? You might want a sleep mask or ear plugs

Heading overseas?

Now that borders have opened back up and you can travel overseas again, remember these useful tips:

- Got all your vaccinations?
- Scan or take photos of your itinerary and travel documents, have a copy with you and leave a copy with someone at home too
- Get an international SIM card or make sure you have a way of contacting someone back home (international calls can be expensive!)
- Organise some travel insurance and make sure you keep a note of the phone number and your policy
- Know what you need to if there's an emergency

We also recommend you take a look at the resources on <u>Smart Traveller</u> for school leavers looking to head overseas for Schoolies.

Staying safe at Schoolies

- Make sure someone always knows where you are going and when to expect you back –
 ideally go out with at least one other person or in a group
- Have a way of staying in touch with your parents and contacting them in an emergency.
 Remember it's <u>FREE to use public pay phones across Australia</u> now. You could give your
 parents contact details to a couple of your friends going away with you (and their
 parents too if you know them).
- When you're out and about, stay with your friends and have a plan to meet up at a certain time and place if you get split up
- Be careful about who you tell where you are staying you could arrange to meet new friends in a public place rather than at your accommodation – and who you let into your room
- Plan how you will get back to your accommodation and make sure you'll have enough money left at the end of the night to follow your plan
- If you're walking around late at night, stick to well-lit areas
- Don't leave your drinks unattended or accept drinks from strangers
- There's plenty of help around if you need it, so don't be afraid to ask police, security, emergency services, officials and volunteers

There's other tips about how to party safely and avoid potential dangers, plus what to do in an emergency <u>here</u>.

How to become a Graphic Designer

Graphic Designers are professionals who design and create images, typography, animations, and other forms of visual work for all types of media, from print to television.

Artistic and creative with a large splash of computer skills? If that describes you, then there's a good chance a career as a Graphic Designer would suit you.

About you:

- Creative and innovative
- A whiz with technology
- Great time management
- Excellent communication skills
- Knowledge of typography
- Attention to detail

The job:

- Meet with clients or art directors to understand project requirements, scope, and budget
- Advise strategies for targeting audiences
- Determine the message to be conveyed
- Design the images that convey the message or develop graphics for illustrations, websites, and logos
- Choose branding font, colour palette, images, layout, etc.
- Present the project to the client/director
- Make edits if required
- Publish the work to a quality determined by the project

Lifestyle Impact: Low

- Part Time opportunities: Moderate around 32% of Graphic Designers work part-time (source: labourmarketinsights.gov.au).
- Average hours for full-time workers: 42 hours a week, which is average (source: labourmarketinsights.gov.au).
- Graphic Designers' salary (median) \$58,200* per year (source: ato.gov.au). *Salaries can vary depending on your skills and experience.
- Future career growth: Very strong (source: labourmarketinsights.gov.au).
- You will be doing most of your work indoors, using computers and other technology.

Graphic Designers are most in demand in these locations:

Many Graphic Designers work in metropolitan areas and capital cities, but using technology means there is also the possibility to work remotely or from home any where in the world. Most Graphic Designers work in the Professional, Scientific and Technical Services industry.

How to become a Graphic Designer in Australia

While there are no formal qualifications necessary, having a VET or university qualification can boost your skills and employability.

Step 1 – Complete Year 12 with a focus on English and Maths. Arts and Design can also be beneficial.

Step 2 – Consider undertaking a relevant VET qualification, such as:

- Certificate IV in Design
- Diploma of Graphic Design
- Advanced Diploma of Graphic Design

Step 3 – Consider upskilling with a university-level qualification, such as a Bachelor of Design.

Step 4 – Get lots of hands-on experience and build up a portfolio of works to show to potential clients.

Step 5 – Once you have lots of experience, consider starting your own business.

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs)

What options are there for career progression?

As your portfolio grows, you might attract bigger clients, and eventually work for some high profile brands and companies. You might even like to start your own design firm and employ others.

Do I need to go to university to become a Graphic Designer?

Not necessarily. VET qualifications are often satisfactory, and if you have an impressive portfolio, formal qualifications might not be necessary at all.

Where do Graphic Designers work?

Graphic Designers can work in private firms, where they are hired by companies or individuals, or in-house for a company. You could also work freelance or from your own home.

What are 3 things I can do right now to help me become a Graphic Designer?

If you're in high school and you'd like to find out if a career as a Graphic Designer is right for you, here's a few things you could do right now:

- 1. Take short courses and workshops to build on your design skills. Learn about colour theory, typography, visual balance, and a variety of other design fundamentals.
- 2. See if you can find work experience in arts or design. This will help you see if you might enjoy the work, and can help you start building important contacts for the future.
- 3. Talk to a Graphic Designer to see what a day in their life is like. If you don't know anyone, see if you can watch videos or documentaries about a career in design.
