PSW has been selected as the supplier of our school uniform. They have a retail store in Hampton Park near the intersection of Pound Road and South Gippsland Highway. You will have already seen that we have an Assistant Principal and a Business Manager. They took up their positions at the beginning of term 4. Both Kerry and Lisa are extremely excited about the prospect of opening a new school and we have already gelled into a great key leadership team. We are currently interviewing prospective teachers and interest has been really high. We had more than 100 applicants for the first two positions we advertised and there was certainly a great deal of "new school" excitement evident in those applications.

What is inquiry-based learning?

Inquiry-based learning is a student centred or active learning approach that takes, as its starting point, the natural process of inquiry, building on this to develop information processing and problem-solving skills. The focus is on 'how we know' rather than 'what we know', with students actively involved in the construction of their own knowledge through active involvement. There is a shift away from a content driven approach towards one that provides children with the skills and resources to discover knowledge for themselves. Children are posed a question and given the skills and resources to explore, investigate and search for answers. They plan and carry out their research, come to some conclusions and decide how they could make change happen. They convert information and data into useful knowledge. Ultimately, the importance of inquiry learning is that students become life long learners and learn how to continue learning.

The aims of an Inquiry Learning Approach are to:

- Nurture and develop the students' natural inquiring mind, helping them to become life long learners who continue to learn how to learn.
- Develop the students' ability to pose questions and plan, research, investigate and search for answers and solutions.
- Develop the skills needed to convert information and answers into useful knowledge that can be applied to new situations and prompt further learning.
- Provide students with different ways of viewing the world, communicating about it and successfully coping with the questions and issues of daily living.

- Develop an understanding that all knowledge changes over time as people challenge, shape and contribute to it.
- Demonstrate that there are often multiple perspectives for looking at, analysing and understanding things.
- Provide learning opportunities that are more relevant as concepts are learned in context and relate to existing knowledge and experiences.
- Develop thinking processes and strategies as sequentially developed in the Thinking Processes Domain of the Victorian Essential Learning Standards and in line with Tyabb Primary School's Thinking scope and sequence.
- Provide rich learning opportunities that are relevant to the children and cross over all domains eg. English, Mathematics, Civics and Citizenship, Science, Health, Humanities, ICT, Creativity Design Technology and Art.
- Encourage students to become independent, resourceful and responsible learners.

Will we have school camps?

We are certainly considering school camps in the first year of the school but venues will be difficult to book and we really can't make firm decisions until we know numbers. I am a strong proponent of a quality outdoor education program as I believe there are great physical, social, emotional and indeed spiritual benefits for children from such a program. A camps program will be a key component of a broader outdoor education program at Lyndhurst.

What about those who are not keeping up or those who need extending?

The program at Lyndhurst will be individualized and personalized. Gone are the days when teachers teach to the middle group and hope the others will catch on. Education will be focused on each child's point of need based on clear evidence and a strong, cooperative family partnership.



Some more about **Lyndhurst Primary School?**

In the first newsletter, I talked a little about the "Cultures" we want to build at Lyndhurst Primary School. Here, our Assistant Principal Kerry Bates, explains her perceptions about the crucial student well-being factors that will create a positive, engaging learning environment.

Student wellbeing is a critical factor in how students learn and the connection that they have to a school and community. Lyndhurst Primary School will have a focus on building relationships between students, teachers and parents.

We aim to be proactive in managing student welfare, not just reactive. Our whole school social skills program will give everyone a common language to develop the social and emotional skills to be successful in school, experience wellbeing and have positive relationships with others. Our aim is to develop students who are self regulating, responsible and accountable, who are able to problem solve and show empathy towards others.

We will be using a Restorative Practice approach at Lyndhurst Primary School. This is a way of viewing relationship-building and behaviour management in schools that works to strengthen a sense community among students and between students, teachers and parents. In the Restorative Practice philosophy, conflict or wrongdoing is seen as causing harm to people and relationships, and there is an obligation first to repair this harm in order for the people involved to move forward. It is a way of educating students towards selfregulated right behaviour that is respectful of all concerned.

In particular, it puts the onus back on the wrong-doer to be truly accountable for their behaviour and to repair any harm caused to others.
