Ouestion 3

Describe a time when you worked with others to achieve a goal.

- Most degrees requires good collaboration and communication skills and this question is looking to get at those.
- Use a specific example and ensure you include the outcome. It doesn't necessarily have to be a 'school' example. It could be from volunteering, paid work, sport or a club.
- This question doesn't necessarily require that you led the group. It can be just as important to illustrate how you can work with others and bring out the best in them, as well as yourself.

From my parttime job at Officeworks, we worked as a team towards a common goal to meet customer needs, develop experience in a workplace and raise funds for a charity. Collaborative teamwork and clear communication, led to success in raising large funds for The Smith Family. Interacting with customers and the team led me to develop traits of an adept communicator. Collaborative and communication skills are crucial to interact within society, thus applicable to the course I am applying for.

Our dance teacher transferred full creative control to allow us to create a polished routine for eisteddfod competition in 2 weeks. Preceding Year 11 exams, and with 7am rehearsals to achieve our goal, stress was high and time was of the essence. Communication was key to voice issues or ideas, and the ability to form a happy compromise was swiftly developed. Although we didn't come first, we discovered that the real success came from utilising our unique strengths to create something that we all loved.

Question 4

Tell us about a time you set yourself a goal and worked really hard to achieve a result.

- This question emphasises goal-setting and taking planned, practical steps to achieve that goal.
- The goal itself could be important here, particularly if it connects in some way to the degree you're interested in
- Again, it's useful to include the outcome and, if you have any space, maybe even what this showed you about yourself/what you learnt in the process.

At the age of 16 I purchased my first car in with the mindset to repair it and sell for a profit within 6 months. I purchased a vehicle with serious mechanical issues for \$4000. After setting myself a budget of \$1,500 I worked on the car every spare moment I had. Effectively completing all the repairs within 4 months and staying \$200 under budget. I sold the car for \$8000 which generated a profit of \$2,700, which was used to purchase the next vehicle.

Next Steps

- Applications will be assessed by faculty staff.
- Applicants will be notified of their requirement to attend either an interview or an online event, held during the September school holidays. Don't worry if you have an interview and a friend has the online event as different parts of the uni assess applications differently.
- Offers will be issued before the first HSC exam in early October.
- These offers are almost always unconditional.
- Offers are issued by UAC, they are official offers and do not need to be placed in your 1-5 UAC preferences.
- Accept and enrol.



- Register with an email, or a social account. Please use a non-school email (Gmail etc)






- The government statistics are de-identified, used as a part of a government survey

- If you believe that you will require support for physical disability or medical condition there is an optional page to outline your circumstances.


At this point the first part of the application is complete and you will be given an application number.




Qualifications

Question 1
