Every year, on a day approximately half--way between the birthdays of our two Founder Patrons, President Václav Havel (5 October) and HRH The Prince of Wales (14 November), the ECP celebrates Founders' Day. Members of the whole school community – students, staff, parents, Governors, graduates and former staff – come together to remember the vision, determination and hard work of those who founded the English College, giving young people in Prague the educational opportunities still offered by the ECP today.

There are musical and drama performances and a guest speaker talks about the people who contributed to the founding of the school. This year we cannot meet together, but we decided to hold the Founders' Day online and to focus on PEGS

which played a crucial role in the founding of the ECP.

The Prague English Grammar School was opened in September 1927. Its mission was described as wanting 'to turn out young people who are inspired with the idea of international solidarity and who, in addition to possessing a thorough knowledge of English and the life and literature of the English-speaking nations, will remain true at the same time to the ideals of their own nation.

Václav Havel said that when he was growing up in Prague, it had been his dream and that of all Prague school children of his time to be accepted for this institution.

- The Prague English Grammar School - PEGS was first closed by the Nazis in

1939, re-opening again briefly after the war, but closed again, this time by the Communists. However, its former students never forgot their school, what it taught them and above all, its committed and dedicated teachers.

From an initial suggestion made by President Václav Havel's press secretary at a meeting in 1990 between the President and a UK Foreign Office Minister, attended by our Chairman of Governors, Ann Lewis, then a Foreign Office official, and a conversation at a lunch in London between former Governor, Dr Martyn Bond, and a Czech businessman, Zdeněk Mládek, the idea of opening a school in Prague, modelled on the old Prague Grammar School was born.

As a result, the English College Foundation was established and President Havel and HRH The Prince of Wales agreed to be our Founder Patrons. The ECF is a UK registered charity who recruited the first Headmaster, Hubert Ward, and continues to support the ECP today. Prague 9 offered the school a lease on our current building. And so, with furniture and equipment begged from many organisations - their names are amongst those listed on the board on the wall at the foot of the stairs on the ground floor – the English College in Prague opened its iconic blue

doors to the first 110 students on 6 September 1994.

The College would not only teach in English, but would use British teaching methods, which were very different from those employed in Czech schools.

We have been honoured to have had PEGS alumnus, Jan Kovařovic, as one of our Governors. He is standing down after nearly 25 years as a Governor and we would like to thank him both for sharing with us today his reminiscences of the Prague English Grammar School and for his long and distinguished service as a Governor of the English College in Prague.

"Tradition, meaning the continuity of thinking, of effort and of service, is important. Freedom, fairness and decency will always be at stake and must be defended again and again, and this requires personal responsibility and commitment. To cultivate these values, commonly perceived as traditional British values, is one of the main tasks of the English College, as well as to transmit the values of Anglo-Saxon education. And of course, the English College should lead its students, irrespective of their origin, to a deeper understanding of Czech culture."


This is how The Times newspaper in London reported the opening of the English College, in September 1994.

"An English language school reopened in Prague this week after being closed for 42 years. The Prague English Grammar School was shut down by the Nazis in 1938 and again by the Communists in 1952. Renamed the English College, the new term started with 110 boys and girls ranging in age from 13 to 18. The renovation of the century-old school comes after three years of preparation by a London-based charity, headed by Lord Holme of Cheltenham,

the Liberal Democrat peer. President Havel of the Czech Republic and the Prince of Wales are joint patrons. "Years of repression have failed to break the Czech spirit or dampen the appetite for first-class education, which we are now on the brink of providing again for the young people of the Czech Republic. The school will embody the best traditions of British and European teaching. Within the Czech Republic there is a huge demand for the English language and a yearning for the ideals that underpin our society, although often on the world stage we underestimate these attributes, "Lord Holme said."




Introduction

A NOTE ON THE PRIZES

The Professor Jaroslav Slavík Prize for Czech

Professor Slavík was a teacher at the Prague English Grammar School where he was very demanding, but loved and respected by the students. He was imprisoned by the communists for supporting his students in their work against the regime. Here, one of those students, liří Berounský, writes this tribute to him:

Professor Jaroslav Slavik taught us Czech at the then English State Gymnázium. However, Czech lessons were not only about the language and its unpopular grammar, they were also lectures on philosophy, civic education, comparative literature. There were two, three students with Grade 7 in the class, as professor Slavik - and he was a professor in the true sense of the word - he was educated, pedagogically and rhetorically funded, and therefore he was very demanding. He appreciated critical thinking during oral and written assignments and in written compositions. He taught us to evaluate the literary work, to perceive its construction and its style, not only to narrate its content as we were used to in our previous schools. (After the war, it was possible to join the English State Gymnázium in the third year, so everyone had to attend some other school before joining the Gymnázium.)

any warnings or reprimands to students. His interpretations of the lectured topics were so interesting and gripping that there was no one in the class who would dare to disturb. He also initiated and organised some extra-curricular activities - recitative and literary competitions. As far as I know, his authority and education were respected by other members of the teaching staff.

Because of his essential democratic belief, he could not reject the offer of his four students, then the 'Septimans', to work illegally against the totalitarian communist regime. The illegal work of these pupils was manifested by writing leaflets and placing them in telephone booths and especially by stealing the 'ČSM' school file, where active volunteers drew attention to the various political misconduct and opinions of their classmates. Probably because of one member of the teaching staff, who was involved in other anti-regime activities, the group around Professor Slavík was revealed. The students and Professor Slavík were tried at the State Court in 1951. After the prosecutor's appeal, Professor Slavík was sentenced to seven years in prison. He spent those seven years mainly in the uranium mines in Jáchymov. When he returned, he remained in contact with the students and they appreciated his friendship.

As far as I remember, he never had to give An unforgettable experience of tho-

se three days spent at the State Court, which were full of phantasmagoria and exhibitions of power, was when they were hugged by their teacher when they were all locked in a cell together, along with murderers and other violent criminals. There they called him - for the first and last time - Jaroslav. Professor Jaroslav Slavík was again amongst his students.

The Pavel Eisner Prize for Czech (non-Czech students)

Pavel Eisner (1889-1958) was a linguist, one of the most important Czech translators and the author of many studies about the Czech language. He came from a German-speaking Jewish family who lived in Prague. He loved the Czech language and chose it as the language he spoke and in which he wrote his works. He translated from twelve languages, mainly German, edited for the German newspaper, Prager Presse, and contributed to a number of Czech cultural magazines. He was a member of the Prague Linguistic Circle and a great promoter of the Czech language. Notable works include an essay on the power and beauty of Czech Bohyně čeká, as well as the books Chrám i tvrz and Čeština poklepem a poslechem, which are important linguistic works on the Czech language. The prize in his name is awarded to students whose mother tongue is not Czech and who excel in the Czech language or who promote Czech culture.


The Sebastian Barker Prize for English

Sebastian Barker (1946-2014) was a distinguished lyric poet as well as an early friend and supporter of the English College. He was committed to the idea that the study of language and literature should be central to the liberal education planned for the English College in Prague. He championed the role of poets and poetry in contemporary society, and was Chairman of the Poetry Society from 1988 to 1992. He produced a fine body of poetry himself, which culminated in his last volume, The Land of Gold, which many readers consider his best work.


He was a creative editor of the London Magazine from 2002 to 2008, served for many years on the executive committee of PEN, and he was also a Fellow of the Royal Society of Literature. The prize is awarded to students in the Lower School.

The Jan Grossman Prize for Dramatic **Performance**

Jan Grossman (1925-1993) attended the Prague English Grammar School during the 1930s, but WWII interrupted his education. Nevertheless, he retained a perfect command of the English language and during the war, he was a member

of the non-Communist resistance. Afterwards, he studied at Charles University and became a literary critic and editor, but was uncompromising in what he wrote and was banned from publishing. As an alternative career he decided to work in the theatre and in 1962 was appointed head of the drama company at the Theatre on the Balustrade. His programme there became a legend, and included the encouragement of new dramatists, one of whom was his close colleague, Václav Havel, whose first three plays were written under Grossman's supervision. Grossman was also best man at Havel's wedding.

After 1968 Grossman was banned from working in Prague and after 1976, from working abroad. He was allowed to work in the provinces only as a guest and was continually harassed by the secret police. His productions during these years were also legendary, but his health had deteriorated and although in 1990 he was reappointed to his former position at the Theatre on the Balustrade, he died a few years later.

Jan Grossman was a person of complete integrity who inspired deep loyalty and in 1995 he was posthumously awarded the Medal of Merit (First Class) by President Václay Hayel.

The Věra Čáslavská Prize for Sporting Achievement - Girl

Věra Čáslavská was a Czechoslovak gymnast, coach, member of prominent sports organizations, 7-time Olympic Gold medalist, 4-time World Champion, 11-time European Champion, and 4-time Czechoslovak Athlete of the Year. During the period of political liberalization of the Prague Spring in 1968, Čáslavská signed the 2000 Words manifesto and thereby became a target of the Communist regime. She was also punished for her silent protest against the Soviets by Czechoslovakia's Communist authorities. For two decades she was barred from traveling or attending major sports events, forced to work as a cleaner and often prevented from coaching children. Following the Velvet Revolution in 1989 that denoted the fall of Communism in Czechoslovakia, Věra Čáslavská was President of the Czechoslovak Olympic Committee (1990-1992), President of the Czech Olympic Committee (1993-1996), and a member of the International Olympic Committee (1995–2001). Čáslavská was inducted into the International Women's Sports Hall of Fame in 1991, and the International Gymnastics Hall of Fame in 1998. In January 1990, Čáslavská became a trusted adviser to Václav Havel, the newly-elected President of Czechoslovakia, in the area of social issues and

sports. President Havel conferred the Czech Republic's Medal of Merit on Věra Čáslavská in 1995.

Headmaster's Prize for Services to the School

This prize is awarded to the student who has done most for the school community over the year.

The Ivan M. Havel Prize for Science

Ivan M. Havel, (*1938 in Prague) is an employee and former director of the Center for Theoretical Studies, a joint workplace of Charles University and the Academy of Sciences of the Czech Republic. From 1990 to 2019, he was the editor-in-chief of Vesmír magazine. Together with his brother Václav he was one of the founders of the Civic Forum.

He graduated in Automation and Computers at the Faculty of Electrical Engineering of the Czech Technical University in Prague. In 1971, he received his doctorate from the University of Berkeley in California. In the early 1990s, he received his habilitation in the field of artificial intelligence at the 3rd Medical Faculty of Charles University in Prague.

His current work at the Center for Theoretical Studies at Charles University and the Academy of Sciences of the Czech Republic is focused on cybernetics, artificial intelligence, robotics, cognitive sciences and philosophical issues related to these fields.

The Ivan M. Havel Prize is awarded to a student who displays the qualities of a polymath. Specialism is increasingly important in society but a polymath excels in more than one discipline. Primarily a scientist, who has shown exceptional talent and interest across scientific disciplines, including theoretical ones, enhancing interdisciplinary approach to the studies, showing an understanding of the humanities and creativity in the arts and the ability to apply interdisciplinary competence across several subjects. The prize recognises hard work, enthusiasm and willingness to go beyond the curriculum.
