Liturgy Jottings Mystery of Advent

Within our celebration of the days of Advent we contemplate the twofold character of the season but also, almost hidden from our sight, of the are deeper elements Advent-Christmas sequence. Three Christian mysteries are present in our liturgies: Incarnation of the Word made flesh, Resurrection of the Lord from the dead and the Redemption of believers to eternal life. The Annunciations of the birth of Jesus are made to Joseph (Matt 1:18-24, Fourth Sunday A) and to 1:26-38, 20 Mary (Luke December). The word of God is made flesh and dwells among us. The liturgies contain several allusions to Easter themes of new light, resurrection, new life, the conquering of sin and death. Finally we are redeemed and called to eternal life. These are evident in the Gospel Acclamations and Prefaces of Advent.

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### Looking at the Readings

The fourth Sunday of Advent and the fourth week of Advent focus on the birth of Christ and the leading events. The Gospel of today, in cycle A the year of Matthew, has the Annunciation of the birth of the Lord to Joseph. An unnamed angel appears to Joseph in a dream. The Gospels of Cycle B & C are from Luke with the Annunciation to Mary and the Visitation of Mary to Elizabeth. This event operates on two levels. The first level nothing changes. Joseph takes his fiancée (betrothed) home and continues to work. There is no disruption in the family or in the village or countryside and people move on as usual.

On the second level all is changed. Mary is with child by the power of the Holy Spirit and her child is Jesus, the one who saves; Emmanuel God-is -with-us. The long wait for the Messiah is over. The lives of Mary and Joseph will be changed forever. Faith and trust are required by both and they respond. The drama unfolds as we have seen in many plays and heard proclaimed in scripture throughout salvation history and our liturgies. God the Son became human fulfilling the Word of the ancient prophets and the Will of the Father (Eucharistic Prayer II).

# Quote of the Week

Now we are in the time of Advent, a time that is typically of expectation; of expectation of Christmas. We are in waiting. This is clear to see. But all our life is also in waiting. 
# **Prayer for the Week**

# <u>REFLECTION FROM FR PETER</u>

The fourth Sunday of Advent gets to the heart of God's intervention upon our world of all happening to Joseph, Mary and Jesus. In a dream the messenger of God says to Joseph not to fear what he cannot understand, not to disown the mystery but to enter into it. Joseph wakes and succeeds and where we often fail, he does something about his dream.

Its easy to dismiss this as some kind of pious story yet so many times throughout the scriptures, God speaks to people in their dreams, in their visions and hopes in their imaginations. As we come into this week leading to Christmas is our opportunity to dream with God and God with us. For Joseph it was his ability to enter into the unexpected, to the new to a dream come true.

As we build the Christmas event into our hopes, I'm sure there are thoughts taking us back into past Christmases, to ones in family not present this Christmas, to look back over past memories and where our dreams this Christmas are realized.

As we focus on Joseph we remember Joseph 'with a father's heart'. We ask what sort of experiences do we seek this Christmas One good way is to give time to the reconciliation liturgy we share this Tuesday evening. By coming into this moment we see ourselves together not just as separate individuals.

This fourth week of Advent is timely is giving us a full week to ponder and reflect upon the dream coming true, God taking human flesh into our lives. We give time for letting Christmas overcome awkward situations especially conflict and confusion. May the humanity of Joseph, Mary and Jesus give us further reason to advance God's cause and place with in us.



<u>ADVENT IN THE MIND OF POPE FRANCIS</u> Recently Pope Francis, through Cath News, has said the season of Advent is a time for people to be surprised by God's mercy and compassion. Advent, then, is a time for overturning our perspectives.

'A time' says Pope Francis, 'to learn again who our Lord is, who he is, a time for using words and gestures of consolation for those who are wounded, as Jesus did with the blind, deaf and lamed.'

<u>AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC YOUTH FESTIVAL</u> Melbourne 2024. This festival is on its way back after a hiatus due to COVID - 19, the premier gathering of young Catholics in Australia will return in December 2024, with the Archdiocese of Melbourne being named host. The Australian Catholic Bishops Conference- last week supported the proposal for the 2024 Festival while recognizing a looking forward to its return. Details of the Festival will be released early in the new year.

<u>FR JAMES MARTIN SJ</u> A renowned editor in Catholic communicational matters says today's Catholic communicators need to focus always on the person of Jesus and endeavour to reach others where they are in life using the best media languages possible.

In Rome recently visiting the Dicastery for Communications, alongside Pope Francis, encouraged media professionals to seek the truth, combat hate speech, and give voice to those who have no voice. Pope Francis taking this further commented, "to go forward, to journey, to take risks, with conviction that I am sharing my life with my Christian and human values". Fr Martin said, "It's meeting people where they are", just as Jesus did in His public ministry.

#### <u>First Reading</u>

#### A reading from the prophet Isaiah

All the ends of the earth shall see the saving power of our God.

How beautiful on the mountains, are the feet of one who brings good news, who heralds peace, brings happiness, proclaims salvation, and tells Zion, 'Your God is king!' Listen! Your watchmen raise their voices, they shout for joy together, for they see the Lord face to face, as he returns to Zion.

Break into shouts of joy together, you ruins of Jerusalem; for the Lord is consoling his people, redeeming Jerusalem. The Lord bares his holy arm in the sight of all the nations, and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God. The Word of the Lord

#### Second Reading

#### A reading from the letter to the Hebrews

In our own time, God speaks to us through his Son.

At various times in the past and in various different ways, God spoke to our ancestors through the prophets; but in our own time, the last days, he has spoken to us through his Son, the Son that he has appointed to inherit everything and through whom he made everything there is. He is the radiant light of God's glory and the perfect copy of his nature, sustaining the universe by his powerful command; and now that he has destroyed the defilement of sin, he has gone to take his place in heaven at the right hand of divine Majesty. So he is now as far above the angels as the title which he has inherited is higher than their own name.

God has never said to any angel: You are my Son, today I have become your father, or: I will be a father to him and he a son to me. Again, when he brings the First-born into the world, he says: Let all the angels of God worship him. **The Word of the Lord** 

#### **Gospel**

#### A reading from the holy Gospel according to John

The Word of God became flesh and dwelt among us, and we saw his glory.

In the beginning was the Word: the Word was with God and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things came to be, not one thing had its being but through him.

All that came to be had life in him and that life was the light of men, a light that shines in the dark, a light that darkness could not overpower. A man came, sent by God. His name was John. He came as a witness, as a witness to speak for the light, so that everyone might believe through him. He was not the light, only a witness to speak for the light. The Word was the true light that enlightens all men; and he was coming into the world. He was in the world that had its being through him, and the world did not know him. He came to his own domain and his own people did not accept him. But to all who did accept him he gave power to become children of God, to all who believe in the name of him who was born not out of human stock or urge of the flesh or will of man but of God himself. The Word was made flesh, he lived among us, and we saw his glory, the glory that is his as the only Son of the Father, full of grace and truth.

John appears as his witness, He proclaims: 'This is the one of whom I said: He who comes after me ranks before me because he existed before me.' Indeed, from his fullness we have, all of us, received – yes, grace in return for grace, since, though the Law was given through Moses, grace and truth have come through Jesus Christ. No one has ever seen God; it is the only Son, who is nearest to the Father's heart, who has made him known.
