After more than four years of tireless advocacy, planning, and community engagement, Kangaroo Flat Community Enterprise (KFCE) has announced the JB Osborne Theatre Redevelopment Project will not proceed at the current time due to a lack of external funding support.

The project, which aimed to transform the ageing JB Osborne Theatre into a vibrant, multi-use arts and community facility, was envisioned as a creative hub for Kangaroo Flat.

Plans included a space for theatre, dance, youth programs, arts workshops, and community gatherings designed to foster social connection, support mental wellbeing, and bring creativity to the heart of the community.

Despite widespread local enthusiasm and significant groundwork, including promotional campaigns, parliamentary petitions, community consultations, and detailed redevelopment plans, the project has been unable to secure the necessary funding from the Department of Education and other potential partners.

Simon Wood, Principal of Crusoe College and a strong supporter of the project, paid tribute to the passion and persistence of KFCE and the broader community.

"It has been quite a journey to try and reinvigorate the wonderful school and community asset that is the JB Osborne Theatre.

While the path has not taken us where we wanted to go, the efforts of so many local people, ably led by Geoff Bowyer and the Kangaroo Flat Community Enterprise, deserve recognition," Mr Wood said.

"We all acknowledged it was going to be hard work but the benefits to the community and to the students at Crusoe College and the other local public schools were plain to see.

Our goal was to create a true multi-use facility run by the Department of Education and accessible to a wide range of groups. Unfortunately, without an external funding source, it is no longer viable to continue investing the significant time and resources required to bring the project to life.

However, this is not the end of my advocacy for the space, and I will continue to pursue any opportunities that arise to see it redeveloped in the future."

KFCE Chair Geoff Bowyer echoed those sentiments and expressed deep gratitude to everyone who supported the project.

"On behalf of the KFCE board, I want to extend a heartfelt thank you to our community, our partners, and everyone who shared our vision for the JB Osborne Theatre," Mr Bowyer said.

"While we are disappointed that the redevelopment can't proceed at this time, we are immensely proud of the momentum we built and the awareness we raised about the need for creative, inclusive spaces in Kangaroo Flat.

Our focus now shifts to other important initiatives that support our community's growth, wellbeing and future."

Since it opened in 1978, the JB Osborne Theatre has hosted countless school performances, community events, award ceremonies, and gatherings. KFCE's vision was to ensure this beloved venue could continue to serve future generations in a safe, modern, and accessible way.

During KFCE's advocacy for the project, work undertaken by the Enterprise in partnership with Crusoe College to build the profile of the theatre and its potential included a billboard on High Street, regular letters and information in Flat Matters, a petition tabled in parliament, a brochure which has been widely distributed and many conversations with potential investors, members of parliament and people from all parts of the community. The group also had plans drawn up with detailed costings to bring the JB Osborne Theatre into the 21st century and create an asset that could be used by all for many years to come. Although the project has come to a close for now, KFCE remains committed to advocating for investment in creativity and community infrastructure and hopes the groundwork laid so far will pave the way for future opportunities.

Since January 2025, we have no longer received funding from our former partner, Bendigo Bank, which had




underwritten publication costs. This has placed pressure on our financial demands to continue.

MINING GROUNDWATER CLEAN UP

A new underground lift has been installed at Bendigo's historical Central Deborah Gold Mine as part of a long–term project to help manage the city's groundwater that has been impacted over the years by past mining activities. The lift allows workers to safely reach pumping infrastructure within minutes, replacing a climb of several hours by a ladder system.

Member for Bendigo West, Maree Edwards says the project is part of the \$53 million Central Bendigo Mine Rehabilitation Project that once completed, will pump and treat groundwater at a purpose built treatment plant before it is returned safely to the Bendigo Creek

"We are improving the liveability of Bendigo to ensure that mining impacted groundwater continues to be managed in a safe and sustainable way whilst also allowing visitors to experience Bendigo's past. The upgrade of this infrastructure is an important step in a much bigger project we're undertaking to safeguard Bendigo's local waterways into the future."

WATER STORAGE WORRY

Whilst the Coliban region had some welcome rain across winter, local water storage levels remain well below average. The combined catchment storages only rose by 4 per cent in the period from the end of May till the end of August. Then from the end of August till mid-September there was a rise of just 4 percent.

This is a worrying time for Coliban Water and their General Manager Water Climate Strategy, Adam Crameri says the winter rainfall wet the catchment to see some inflows into our reservoirs, but the real test will come during spring.

"The dry conditions will mean a 30% opening allocation for the 2025/2026 rural season, and this is the first time in 15 years that the rural season has not opened at 100%. This allocation is reviewed on the 15th of each month. Allocations may increase if our water resource position improves, but there needs to be significant rainfall and inflows to our reservoirs over an extended period before any changes will be made." Meantime, Coliban Water is urging residents and businesses to reduce their water use to help conserve water supplies. Coliban says it is the everyday water saving habits, from the backyard to the bathroom that collectively help conserve water supplies.



WE ARE GROWING

Our population continues to show strong growth as more and more people are relocating from capital cities to regional areas.

The Regional Mover Index says the top performing centre here in Victoria is Bendigo, as it attracts new residents looking for affordability, lifestyle and opportunities.

The population of the City of Greater Bendigo was more than 125,000 in 2024 and the region is expected to grow significantly, with forecasts predicting a population of over 172,000 by 2046.

This growth is supported by the Managed Growth Strategy, which plans for an influx of new residents by fostering development in both established areas and the growth corridors like Marong, Huntly, Maiden Gully, and Strathfieldsaye.


There will be lots of fun for kids at the Fair, including:

DEDICATED CHILDREN'S PLAY SPACE OFFERS SO MUCH

At Bendigo Health we are pleased to have created a dedicated environment designed to enhance therapy and enrich the experience of young patients. First imagined about three years ago, the purpose built children's rehabilitation play space project will provide a special area where children can engage in play as a core part of their rehabilitation. At any one time, more than 100 children receive care through the Victorian Paediatric Rehabilitation Service here at Bendigo Health. SCHOOL NO.1592 TURNS 150 YRS OLD

Maiden Gully Primary School is closing in on their 150 Years celebrations. We thought we'd take a step back in time and recognise the many people who have made a lasting impression on the school, be they Head Teachers or Principals, teachers or families. Reading through the scattered records of our history, there are recurring names and themes. Our initial records have found the first Head Teachers to be H. T. Patrick Fitzpatrick (1875-1877) and Herbert B Bashford (1877-1889) followed by a period of fluctuating enrolments causing the school to open and close a few times. Mr. Harry Beckham was the longest reigning Head Teacher, leading the school for approximately 20 years. His contribution to the school and the Maiden Gully community cannot be understated and is still visible today. With a number of Head Teachers and Principals in between, most serving for a handful of years each, Mr Torie Babitsch also spent a significant number of years leading our school community. He was Principal from 1990 through 2005 and is likely known and remembered by many for his time at Maiden Gully. Torie is best remembered for approachability and kindness.

Following hot on Mr. Babitsch's heels and leading us into the present era of the school were David Robins, David Hinton, and Doug Jones.

Mr Jones was superseded by Craig Arrowsmith as the substantive Principal in 2016 to the present day. For the past two years, Mr Jordan Ancrum has been at the helm in the Acting Principal role. All of these Principals lobbied for desperately needed new facilities alongside Maree Edwards, local MP. Mr Arrowsmith achieved a 5-stage masterplan, with Stage 1 delivered in 2022.

Fighting hard for much needed facilities in a growth area has been a common them for Maiden Gully Primary School over its 150 year history. Mr Ancrum and the School Council continue the fight to modernise the learning spaces around the school and provide the best learning possible for our students and their families.

History keeps throwing up familiar names. The Monsant, Durston, Trahair, Trevaskis, and Bouwmeester families stretch all the way back to before 1938 and have been strong advocates for Maiden Gully Primary School.

In recent years, it would be remiss not to thank the likes of the Joyce Wood, Betty Thompson, Duncan Thomson and Annette Conway who dedicated many years to the school in varying capacities.

The continuing contributions of a large number of families with generational links, including the Seeary and Waterworth families, is testament to the strong community in and around Maiden Gully Primary School.

The formal component of our 150 Years celebrations will include an assembly followed by a walk through the 150 Years exhibit and art show. We invite past families, students and staff to our assembly beginning at 9.15am on Friday October 31.





CRIME FORUM IN KANGAROO FLAT

A Crime and Community Safety Forum was held in Kangaroo Flat in September to discuss the rising rates of crime in the region and the concerns of local residents. Nationals Member for Northern Victoria. Gaelle Broad attended the forum along with Shadow Minister for Police and Corrections, David Southwick and Wendy Lovell MP the Member for Northern Victoria Region. Gaelle Broad says the Crime Forum was held at the Kangaroo Flat Sports Club and it gave politicians the chance to hear from concerned residents about crime

"The Allan Labor Government has weakened bail laws, cut funding to Victoria Police, closed prisons and delayed plans to ban machetes and combat Victoria's illicit tobacco trade. Recent figures from the

Crime Statistics Agency show a 15.8 per cent increase in total criminal offences in Greater Bendigo. The number of thefts went from 2,480 in 2024, to 3,405 in 2025. Assaults rose from 909 in 2024 to 1,012 this year whilst burglary and break and enter offences went from 558 in 2024 to 1,177 in 2025. Over the past year there has been a 16 per cent rise in crimes committed by young people.

Our vision is to prioritise community safety, with stronger bail laws and consequences for repeat offenders, recruit more police, combat the illicit tobacco trade, deliver education and mentoring programs for young offenders, and target the root causes of crime."

VOLUNTEERS RECEIVE SUPPORT WITH GRANTS

The Labor Government is continuing to recognise the efforts of volunteers and community organisations, today announcing that 19 local groups in the Bendigo electorate will receive grants up to \$5,000.


Through the \$9.5 million 2024-25 Volunteer Grant Round, community organisations across Australia will receive funding to buy small equipment for volunteers or reimburse their fuel, transport, or training costs.

For the first time this year, eligible community organisations were able to allocate their funding towards insurance premiums. This change helps successful organisations to better navigate rising operating costs and reduces out of pocket costs for volunteers. Member for Bendigo, Lisa Chesters said this funding boost is welcomed in Bendigo as it will provide greater support for local volunteers and ensure they can continue to support their community. A total of 19 local groups will share in the \$66,225 in funding available to each Federal electorate. This round of successful grant recipients includes several community and neighbourhood houses, sporting organisations, and local services such as Sunshine Bendigo. In order to be successful in the competitive process, groups were required to be a not-for-profit organisation with a minimum of 40% of volunteers in their organisation.

HOMELESS THROUGH WINTER

We have just come through a severe cold winter!

Most of us had to resort to applying a Doona and Electric Blanket on some of those extremely cold nights and in particular on the night of May 20th when the Bureau recorded a temperature of minus 2.4 degrees. But not everyone enjoyed the luxury of a warm and comfortable night. The true picture of homelessness was right before our very eyes. Many Kangaroo Flat residents were seriously concerned for the wellbeing of a homeless woman complete with a number of shopping trolleys full of belongings, sleeping rough on our footpaths and road reserves throughout those cold winter nights.

Some residents tried to help this unfortunate lady by offering food and cash. But not on all occasions were the offers accepted. No doubt many concerned residents contacted Health Authorities, Police and Council trying to get help for the homeless lady. Several residents contacted Ravenswood Councillor Damien Hurrell.

"I was made aware of the situation and received some messages which were mainly focused on the lady and her welfare."

FLAT MATTERS also followed up with the City of Greater Bendigo on a number of issues including rubbish left on footpaths and also we were advised by Jessica Howard, Director of Healthy Communities & Environments that everything was being done to assist the homeless lady.

"The City is aware of the female rough sleeper who has frequented the Kangaroo Flat area and has been working closely with relevant support services. Homelessness is a complex issue that requires coordinated efforts across all levels of government, support agencies, charities, and the private sector. The City has also responded to requests to remove items and waste from the area. The Local Laws team continue to work with other internal departments and external agencies such as Victoria Police to ensure impacts on the amenity of the neighbourhood are mitigated wherever possible."

Hopefully, the homeless person is now adequately being cared for.

In another big year for the club, Marong were in a strong position throughout as they eventually ran out 32 point winners over Bridgewater.


