
## **Imagine Activities!**


# FOLLOW THE DRAGON TOUR

While it has been a quiet touring month for our Laureate Gabrielle Wang, she has still been sharing her message about the importance of imagination and reading.



ALIA has announced Aura Parker's stunning picture book *Bowerbird Blues* as the National Simultaneous Storytime book for 2024.



Don't forget about your OCTOBER Audiobook. This month's special release is "Nona & Me" by Clare Atkins.



Rosie prefers to hang out in the nearby mining town, where she goes to school with the glamorous Selena and her gorgeous older brother, Nick. When a political announcement highlights divisions between the Aboriginal community and the mining town, Rosie is put in a difficult position – will she have to choose between her first love and her oldest friend?

To further support our Audiobook program, Reading Australia is sharing connected resources from its collection.

This month's focus resource is <u>Two</u> Mates by Melanie Prewett, illus. Maggie <u>Prewett (Year 1)</u>

The true story of two mates is brought to life by a mother-daughter team descended from the Ngarluma people of the Pilbara region in WA. This teaching resource focuses on Jack and Raf's special friendship and highlights the story's distinct setting in Broome in Australia's north-west.

Reading Australia – which turns 10 this year – is a Copyright Agency initiative to support the teaching and reading of Australian literature in schools. The website features 275 freely available resources written for teachers, by teachers, on books aligned to the Australian Curriculum. Of these resources, 75 are for books written or illustrated by Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander peoples.
