Students who do best at university or TAFE are not necessarily those with the highest ATARs but those with persistence, determination, organisational and self-management skills that are also assertive in asking for help. Make sure you choose a course you will enjoy and are interested in; otherwise, you may experience problems with motivation. Form friendship groups with other students so you can be active in groups that discuss work and share ideas. Students that are engaged in learning communities and networks have a more positive university experience.



C.A.S. Hawker Scholarship

Valued at up to \$75,000 over three years, and open to Australian citizens, the C.A.S. Hawker Scholarship commemorates the achievements of one of Australia's most respected pastoral pioneers who served with distinction in the First World War and went on to become a distinguished scholar and leading figure in the Federal Parliament prior to his tragic, and untimely death in an aircraft accident in 1938.

The scholarships have been awarded almost equally to male and female applicants. Scholarship holders have come from every sector of Australian society and graduated from government, catholic and private schools. The majority of scholarships are awarded to students entering their first year of university. Past awardees have studied law, politics, economics, medicine, and arts. Hawker Scholars are now working in Australia, Europe, the USA, and Asia.

Applications for the 2026 Hawker Scholarship will open on 3 November 2025 and close on 2 December 2025. Australian National University (ANU) launched the *Tuckwell Scholarship Program* in 2013. The Tuckwell Scholarship Program at the ANU is the most transformational undergraduate scholarship program in Australia. A Tuckwell is not just about a students' intellect. It is also about their desire and determination to use their natural abilities to realise their full potential so that they can make a difference in the world. All up one could say, this is no ordinary scholarship!

All eligible applicants are considered against four criteria:

- 1. Academic potential and achievements;
- 2. Other significant achievements of any type;
- 3. Demonstration of the **Tuckwell Attributes**; and
- 4. Connection and commitment to Australia.

Although applications will only open on 2 March 2026 and close on 13 April 2026, current Year 11 students who are not only interested in studying at ANU, but also believe they meet the eligibility criteria for this scholarship, are encouraged to browse <u>Tuckwell Scholarship</u> and the link <u>How to Apply</u> to find out more.



VICTORIA POLICE Exam Exemption Criteria for Victoria Police Applicants

Recent changes have expanded the exam exemption criteria for Victoria Police applicants.

Applicants may be exempt from the exam if:

- They are currently:
 - undertaking a Bachelor of Criminology (or similar) at an Australian, New Zealand or United Kingdom university, and are in their final year of study, or
 - a Victorian Public Service (VPS) employee (VPSG3 or above), or
 - employed by Victoria Police (all classifications and tenures).
- In the last five years they have:
 - passed the Victorian Certificate of Education (VCE) or equivalent in Australia, with:
 - an Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR) of 65 or above, and
 - a minimum score of 25 in English, or
 - completed a bachelor's degree (or higher) in an arts, science, humanities, business or law discipline at an Australian, New Zealand or United Kingdom university, or
 - were employed in the Australian Defence Force (ADF) on a full-time basis (this exemption does not apply to ADF Reservists).

Pathway to Federation University

If you thought that university was not for you because you don't have the academic background or the study skills, or if you have finished year 12 but do not have the entry requirements you need to start a degree, the Foundation Access Studies program (FAST) may be the pathway for you.

Students who have completed the VCE Major or an unscored VCE can apply for the *Foundation Access Studies (FAST)* Program at Federation University.

FAST is a single semester program designed to teach students effective study techniques, including academic writing, research, use of university systems and how to apply these skills to their studies. When students have successfully completed FAST, they are guaranteed a place in one of Federation University's undergraduate degrees.

<u>The entry requirements are</u> - a study score of at least 18 in any English. For the Mathematics unit FASTP1013, the prerequisite is Year 10 Mathematics (or equivalent).

Federation Access Studies (FAST) for Engineering and Mathematical Sciences - a study score of at least 18 in any English and either satisfactory completion of Units 1 and 2: Mathematical Methods or Specialist Mathematics or satisfactory completion of Units 3 and 4: of General mathematics,

All applicants who have not met the English and Maths pre-requisites through their Year 12 results will be required to complete a literacy and numeracy test to determine their eligibility for admission. In order to qualify for entry into FAST for Engineering, applicants need to complete the Technical Maths entry test.

Applications to the FAST program should be made via VTAC.

Women of STEM Scholarships 2026

Scholarships for women aged 18 - 20, who are commencing an applicable** STEM related degree in 2026.

These scholarships are to -

- INSPIRE high school girls to select subjects in the fields of science, technology, engineering and mathematics
- 2. **GROW** future university educational opportunities for women in science, technology, engineering and math.

- 3. **PROMOTE** advanced STEM professional and management careers and celebrate the STEM career achievements of Australian women and make a social impact.
- 4. **PROVIDE** financial support for women from diverse backgrounds, independent of any political, economic, religious or social framework.

For the purposes of this scholarship, the scope of STEM is defined as Australian University degrees within the following discipline categories:

- SCIENCE: Biology, Chemistry, Geology, Physics, and Environmental Science
- **TECHNOLOGY**: Computer Science, Information Technology, and Software Disciplines
- ENGINEERING: Electrical, Electronic, Mechanical, Civil and Robotic Engineering
- MATHEMATICS: Applied Mathematics, Statistics, Data Analytics

Awardees receive financial grants of \$5,000 per year for the life of their degree (maximum of 5 years).

Applications for 2026 Women of STEM Scholarships open on Thursday 18 December 2025 and close on Friday 6 February 2026.

The LAT will not be included in the entry requirements for students seeking entry in 2027 and beyond.

New Laws/Psychological Science Double Degree in 2026

Deakin University has just announced that it will be offering the <u>Bachelor of Laws/Bachelor</u> of <u>Psychological Science</u> from 2026. This double degree will be offered at both the Burwood and Geelong Waterfront Campus and has been designed for students to develop legal expertise and psychological insight to understand human behaviour and justice systems.

Over five years, students will develop core legal skills and explore psychological science laying the foundation for careers in law, mental health, policy and advocacy, and providing a pathway to further study should students wish to progress towards registration as a psychologist.

The VCE entry requirements are Units 3 and 4: a study score of at least 30 in English EAL (English as an Additional Language) or at least 25 in English other than EAL.

The VTAC code for the Burwood Campus is 1400512291, and for the Waterfront Campus it is 1400412291. As this is a *new* course no ATAR is available.

Current Year 12's interested in applying for this new course can add it to their VTAC preferences up until Saturday 13 December 2025 at 12.00pm.



Narrm Scholarship Program

This scholarship provides financial, wellbeing, academic and career support to eligible Access Melbourne students. As a Narrm Scholar, students receive financial assistance, as well as get to participate in an enrichment program that includes academic, career and wellbeing support, so they can thrive at university and beyond.

To be eligible to be considered for the Narrm Scholarship, students must be an Australian or New Zealand citizen or a holder of an Australian permanent visa and completed Year 12 or the International Baccalaureate in Australia. Students who have applied for Access Melbourne through VTAC (SEAS) will automatically be considered for a Narrm Scholarship.

Snapshot of Holmesglen Institute in 2025

- Holmesglen was formed in 1982 and has grown into a very large TAFE provider.
- Holmesglen offers over 500 <u>courses</u> from seven <u>campuses</u> at six locations, including Chadstone, Moorabbin, Glen Waverley, and Eildon.
- Holmesglen has invested over \$25 million the last few years in building world-class facilities at the Moorabbin Campus. 

Psychiatrists and Psychologists: What's

the Difference?

According to the *Your Health in Mind* website, there are three main differences between psychiatrists and psychologists:

- Psychiatrists are medical doctors, psychologists are not.
- Psychiatrists prescribe medication, psychologists can't.
- Psychiatrists diagnose illness, manage treatment and provide a range of therapies for complex and serious mental illness.
- Psychologists focus on providing psychotherapy (talk therapy) to help patients.

It would seem many people get psychiatrists and psychologists confused with each other.

Both psychiatrists and psychologists understand how the brain works, our emotions, feelings and thoughts. Both can treat mental illness with psychological treatments (talking therapies).

However, psychiatrists attend medical school and become medical doctors before doing specialist training in mental health – with up to 11 years of training. As they are doctors, psychiatrists understand the links between mental and physical problems, and they can also prescribe medications.

Guaranteed Pathways for Bachelor of Design Students

All University of Melbourne <u>Bachelor of Design</u> graduates who continue into a Melbourne School of Design graduate program will have **guaranteed entry**—no portfolio or personal statement required.

To qualify, students must:

- 1. Achieve a minimum 65% WAM in the Bachelor of Design.
- 2. Complete the corresponding major for their preferred Master's program.
- 3. Apply within 2 semesters of completion of the Bachelor of Design.

Examples include:


