the Guest Speaker and handed their prize by the Senior Deputy Head.

A Word from the Headmaster

Here we are at "Part II" of the celebration at which we say a fond and slightly formal farewell to you (or if you are family, your son/ daughter/grandson/granddaughter/niece/nephew etc.,). Part I of the celebration is, of course, the Graduation Ball - a slightly more relaxed event we all enjoyed together earlier in the year. Both events are symbolic of a key moment, the crossing of an important threshold. While almost everyone we are honouring today is continuing on to higher education, the celebration is both a transition into adulthood and a journey into what I told the students was their "second age" of freedom. I told them this during the Last Bell: a day of high jinx when they rampaged through the classrooms drawing love hearts on everyone's cheeks and marched to the old building on Sokolovská in order to say their goodbyes (and do a bit of graffiti in the process). On that day, I talked to them about the three ages of freedom. The first age of freedom is that experienced by a young child or toddler. In this age you don't have any responsibilities and the world is lovingly built around you by your parents designed almost exclusively to give you a sense of security and happiness. Your needs are magically met and wonderful things (hugs, kisses, tasting treats, toys, parties) keep miraculously appearing. The third age of freedom is late adulthood when you (if things have gone well) no longer have the familial responsibilities of looking after and supporting your children, but are not quite yet caring for your own elderly parents). These are two times in our lives when our responsibilities do not dominate our decision making. But today is the start of the second age of freedom, where almost uniquely in your life, you can walk out of the Betlemská kaple to whatever destination you choose. Despite some undoubted nerves, there is no-one to worry about at home and the ink in which the next chapter will be written is still patiently waiting in the barrel of the pen. We will see the first steps into this chapter today.

We have changed the way we are asking our leavers to receive their certificates, such that after receiving their certificates, they will walk outward from the stage toward the audience. Friends and family will now really see these first few steps. I have told the leavers that the symbolism of this walk from the stage is an expression of their first steps into this second age of freedom. So as those steps are taken we can all imagine they are steps towards whatever future each of our leavers desires. We hope in time we will hear those footsteps returning to hear actual stories that will cover the blank unwritten pages of their lives they leave with today.


Guest of Honour

Mgr. Viktor Kundrák, Ph.D., E.MA

Viktor Kundrák is a prominent authority in the field of human rights and minority protection in the Czech Republic and internationally. He graduated and holds a PhD in international law from the Faculty of Law at Charles University in Prague and obtained an EMA degree in Human Rights and Democratisation from the Global Campus of Human Rights in Venice and the Université Libre de Bruxelles. His professional career includes various significant positions. He initially served at the Ministry of Justice as the Senior Ministerial Advisor in the office of the Government Agent for Representation before the European Court of Human Rights in Strasbourg. He then worked at the OSCE Office for Democratic Institutions and Human Rights as a Hate Crime Officer, and a Senior Advisor on Freedom of Religion or Belief. Since 2023, he has been serving as the Director of the Department of Human Rights and Minority Protection at the Office of the Government of the Czech Republic.



A Note on the IB Prizes

Every year teachers nominate students who have made a notable contribution to their subject for the specific subject prize.

There are also Special Prizes that recognise a student's broader talents and achievements. For these prizes students are usually nominated by the broader school community.

The highest academic prize is the Chairman of Governors' Prize for Academic Achievement. It recognises the best academic results through the whole IB

programme. The highest prize for the Service to the Community is the Lord Holme Prize, for which any member of the school community can nominate any student whose charity work is remarkable.

Most of the prizes are named after specialists in the subjects. Some special prizes are also awarded in the names of those who have had a special relationship with the College or with whom we continue to celebrate a connection.

SUBJECT PRIZES

Newly Named Prizes in 2024

The Dr Jane Goodall Prize for Environmental Systems and Societies

Jane Goodall was born in London in 1934 and is a British ethologist, known for her exceptionally detailed and long-term research on the chimpanzees of the Gombe Stream National Park in Tanzania.

Goodall, who was interested in animal behaviour from an early age, left school at age 18. She worked as a secretary and as a film production assistant until she gained passage to Africa. Once there, Goodall began assisting palaeontologist and anthropologist Louis Leakey. Her association with Leakey led eventually to her establishment in June 1960 of a camp in the Gombe Stream Game Reserve so that she could observe the behaviour of chimpanzees in the region. In 1965, the University of Cambridge awarded Goodall a PhD in ethology, one of very few candidates to receive a PhD without having first achieved a Bachelor's degree.

Except for short periods of absence, Goodall remained in Gombe until 1975, often directing the fieldwork of other doctoral candidates. In 1977 she co-founded the Jane Goodall Institute for Wildlife Research, Education and Conservation in California; the centre later moved its headquarters to the Washington, D.C., area. She also created various other initiatives, including Jane Goodall's Roots & Shoots (1991), a youth service programme.

Over the years Goodall was able to correct a number of misunderstandings about chimpanzees. She found, for example, that the animals are omnivorous, not vegetarian; that they are capable of making and using tools; and, in short, that they have a set of hitherto unrecognised complex and highly developed social behaviours. Goodall wrote a number of books and articles about various aspects of her work, notably In the Shadow of Man (1971). She summarised her years of observation in *The Chimpanzees of Gombe: Patterns of Behaviour (1986).* She continued to write and lecture about environmental and conservation issues into the early 21st century.

In 2002 she became a UN Messenger of Peace. The recipient of numerous honours, Goodall was created Dame Commander of the Order of the British Empire (DBE) in 2003. She was also awarded the 2021 Templeton Prize and the 2022 Stephen Hawking Medal for Science Communication. Jane, a documentary about her life and work, appeared in 2017.

The Prof. Helena Illnerová Prize for Biology

Professor Helena Illnerová, a distinguished biochemist, was born in Prague in 1937. Her father, of Jewish origin, endured the hardships of concentration camps during World War II, but thankfully survived and returned home. Illnerovás academic journey began with her graduation from the Faculty of Natural Sciences, setting the stage for her remarkable contributions to the scientific community.

After completing her studies, Illnerová embarked on her career at the Institute of Physiology of the Academy of Sciences. During this period, she married Michal Illner and later had two children. In 1969, the Illnerová family spent a transformative year in New York, where Helena gained valuable experience at Columbia University, shaping her scientific perspectives.

In the 1960s, Prof. Illnerová's groundbreaking work began with the study of biorhythms. Her pivotal discovery revealed that mice exposed to light during specific periods at night experienced disruptions in their hormones, uncovering the existence of a biological clock governing the bodies of mammals, including humans. She was the first to identify the interdependence of the biological clock's function on the length of the day during different seasons.

After the Velvet Revolution, she became first Vice President of the Academy of Sciences for eight years, and then between 2001 to 2005, she held the position of its President. She has also chaired the Learned Society of the Czech Republic and the Czech Commission for UNESCO.

Illnerová is dedicated to passing on her knowledge, regularly engaging with

the wider community through media appearances and public lectures. Her commitment to science, education, and the support of young scientists has earned her numerous domestic and international awards. She continues to serve on various scientific councils and ethics commissions, showcasing her enduring commitment to the advancement of scientific knowledge and ethical standards.

The Ian Mikyska Prize for Music

Ian Mikyska, a Czech composer based in Prague, is known for his versatile contributions to the arts. He was born in 1994 to Czech parents in Miami, and grew up in Cuba, Peru and the Czech Republic, where he graduated from the English College in Prague. His work extends beyond concert music, encompassing installations, texts, theatre, walks, radio and video. Rooted in the exploration of perceptual concepts, his creations often touch on the impermanence of existence, ecological themes, meditative practices, and everyday experiences. Mikyska's music, characterised by its exploration of sound and the interplay of various media, has been performed in multiple countries. Renowned ensembles and performers have brought his compositions to life.

In addition to his musical pursuits, Mikyska is a prolific writer, contributing creative, academic, and journalistic texts to various publications. His works have found a place in anthologies and magazines. In 2013, Mikyska co-founded Strato Cluster, an ensemble focusing on multimedia improvisation, with a particular emphasis on lighting and analogue projections. Their performances and collaborations with other artists have solidified their presence in the contemporary music scene. Beyond his artistic endeavours, Mikyska is active as a translator, bringing Czech poetry and prose into English.

Ian Mikyska's artistic journey is characterised by a seamless integration of creativity, collaboration, and a commitment to exploring profound connections between different forms of expression. His impact resonates not only in the Czech Republic, but also in the broader international artistic community.

The Sir Tom Stoppard Prize for Drama

Born Tomáš Sträussler on 3 July 1937, in Zlín, Sir Tom Stoppard is a celebrated English playwright renowned for his verbal brilliance and structural dexterity. Raised in Singapore and India during World War II, Stoppard moved to England in 1946 with his mother and stepfather, his own father having been killed in Singapore. Educated in Nottinghamshire and Yorkshire, he began his career as a journalist, working for the Western Daily Press (1954-8) and the Bristol Evening World (1958-60). His journey into playwriting commenced in the 1960s, with notable works for radio and television, including The Dissolution of Dominic Boot and The Real Inspector Hound.

Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead, his breakthrough play, premiered in 1966,

earning a Tony Award for Best Play in 1968. Stoppard continued to impress with works like Jumpers, Travesties, and Every Good Boy Deserves Favour. An advocate for dissidents, Stoppard spoke out for Czech playwright Václav Havel and wrote Professional Foul for Amnesty International in 1978, earning him a knighthood in 1997. His illustrious career includes the 2002 trilogy The Coast of Utopia and plays like Heroes (2005), Rock 'n' Roll (2006) and The Hard Problem (2015). Venturing into screenwriting, he adapted works like Anna Karenina (2012) and Tulip Fever (2014), co-writing the screenplay for Shakespeare in Love (1998).

Sir Tom Stoppard's legacy is deeply ingrained in English theatre, resonating globally. Currently residing in London, he continues to enrich the world of drama with compelling narratives and cinematic endeavours.

The Alan Turing Prize for Computer Science

Alan Turing (1912-1954), often referred to as a man before his time as an English Mathematician who pioneered the mechanical concepts for early computers. He is not only referred to as a Mathematician, but a Computer Scientist, philosopher, logician, cryptanalyst, and theoretical biologist. This brilliant English code-breaker was arguably one of the key people in turning the tide of World War II. He was a Renaissance man who studied and made contributions to the philosophical study of the nature of intelligence, biology and to physics.

One of his most famous inventions, the Turing Machine (1936), were automated machines devised for specific

solutions. The Universal Turing Machine, developed later that year, could simulate all other Turing Machines, which was what influenced Bombe (1939) - the machine that cracked Enigma, the Nazi cypher machine. From 1940 onwards, Bombe allowed the Allies to decipher the Nazi's secret communications.

Additionally, Turing championed the role of poets and poetry in contemporary society, and was Chairman of the Poetry Society from 1988 to 1992. He wrote poetry himself, with his final volume being *The Land of Gold*. After WWII, Andrew Hodge's biography of Turing revealed that he was the victim of antihomosexual attitudes and laws, losing his security clearance and two years later, he committed suicide.

The Oswald Kittel Prize for German

Oswald Kittel has collaborated with the College since 2016, bringing friends annually to meet students on their Exploring History trip to Česká Kamenice. He shares unique life stories of Germans forced to leave Czechoslovakia after the war, aiding student understanding of Sudetenland's 20th-century history. Mr Kittel, known for his honesty and kindness, graciously allowed the College to establish the Upper School German prize in his name.

Born in 1929 in Česká Kamenice to a German family, Oswald Kittel recalls the town's predominantly German population with a minority of Czech officials. He

attended a German-language school with some Czech classes and remembers prewar tensions, including the aftermath of the Munich Agreement. Despite his father's loyalty to Czechoslovakia during mobilisation, they were expelled after the war under Benes's decrees. Oswald Kittel served briefly as a soldier, wounded in the last battles of the war before being deported to Saxony. He later settled in the German Democratic Republic, occasionally visiting his homeland. Since 1964, he has maintained ties, eventually becoming Chairman of the German Association of Česká Kamenice, fostering Czech-German reconciliation through regular meetings and joint religious ceremonies.

The Karel and Josef Čapek Prize for Czech

Josef and Karel Čapek were close friends as well as brothers. They entered the world of literature together, collaborating on their first books before finding their own literary paths. It was Josef who invented the word ROBOT, but Karel who first used it in his play R.U.R. As a child, Karel was already asking questions, always seeking the truth and wanting to put right what did not

work. He was an excellent observer and had a remarkable knowledge of people, their lives, weaknesses and virtues. While Karel explored the visible world, Josef was more interested in the inner, invisible world. Both of them resisted Fascism and spoke out when human and moral values in society were threatened. Josef died in the Bergen-Belsen concentration camp.

The Lightfoot Prize for English

Bob Lightfoot was an early supporter of the English College Foundation. He worked

in London as a Senior Partner in a firm of Chartered Patent Attorneys.

The Ronald Rankin Prize for Mathematics

This prize is given by David Rankin in memory of his father Ronald, who lived in Liverpool from 1905 to 1974, and was an early supporter of the English College Foundation. David Rankin writes: "My father ran a food import business for a good part of his life. He had an analytical mind, but his talent for analysis was not passed

through the genes to me. Indeed, he had to pay for extra tuition to ensure that I passed my Maths exam when I was sixteen years of age. So, in 1996, I thought that I would try to encourage some students in the College in the same way that my father had helped me and, with a certain sense of irony, chose Mathematics!"

The Otto Wichterle Prize for Chemistry

Otto Wichterle is remembered as the inventor of the soft contact lens. He supported Alexander Dubček and his Prague Spring reforms and signed the Two Thousand Words manifesto calling for the continuation of the democratisation process. When Czechoslovakia was invaded

by the Soviet Union, Wichterle was dismissed from his position as Director of the Institute of Macromolecular Chemistry. He was unable to resume his work until 1989, when he was elected head of the Czechoslovak Academy of Sciences and received many awards and honorary doctorates. He registered around 180 patents and wrote over 200 publications on various aspects of organic, inorganic and macromolecular chemistry, polymer science and biomedical materials.

The Jiří Hovorka Prize for History

Jiří Hovorka's studies at the Prague English Grammar School came to an end when it was closed by the Communist regime. He was arrested for his part in resistance activities and imprisoned for 15 months. Prevented from studying, he spent his life as a manual worker, but continued learning, gaining knowledge of politics, history, literature, space flights and languages: English, Polish and German. English literature and culture became his lifelong hobbies.

When the English College was established after the fall of Communism, he provided invaluable assistance to the founders and the first Headmaster. His early life under the Nazis and the Communists strengthened his belief in democracy. He was firm in his principles and moral attitudes, generous, kind and modest. As Jiří Hovorka's personality was formed by the adverse history of this country, it is fitting that our prize for History should bear his name.

The Professor Sir Roger Scruton Prize for Philosophy

Roger Scruton was born in 1944 and studied Philosophy at Cambridge University, where he wrote his PhD on "Art and imagination, a study in the philosophy of mind". In 1979 he was invited to lecture at the underground philosophy seminars in Prague and realised the hunger for philosophy among young people in Communist Czechoslovakia. He co-founded the Jan Hus Educational Foundation and worked with Czech and Slovak colleagues

to extend the seminars to Brno and Bratislava. In 1985 the Communist regime placed him on the Index of Undesirable Persons. After 1989 he worked to establish the JHEF as an educational charity in the Czech and Slovak Republics. He published more than 50 books, including a novel about the underground university, *Notes from Underground*, and was an early supporter of the English College Foundation. He was awarded the Medal of Merit (First Class) by President Václav Havel in 1998 and knighted by Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in 2016.

The Jan Grossman Prize for Dramatic Performance

Jan Grossman attended the Prague English Grammar School before World War II and then, during the Occupation, took part in the Resistance against the Nazis. The Communists expelled him from Charles University, which meant he was unable to follow an academic or literary career, and so he chose to work in the theatre. He had an analytical mind and found it impossible to conform to ideology. He became renowned internationally as a theatre director, particularly for his work at the Theatre on the Balustrade in the 1960s, when he worked closely with Václav Havel on the early productions of his plays, but in the 1970s and 1980s had to work in obscurity.

The Professor Martin Hilský Prize for Drama

Martin Hilský is Professor Emeritus of English Literature at Charles University and one of the leading translators of English literature into Czech. He is well known as an author, translator and performer on various Czech broadcast platforms including ČRo 3 Vltava and Česká televize. A member of the Czech Modern Language Association, he was its Chairman from 1993 to 1996, and he is also a member of the European Society for the Study of English and the Czech branch of the PEN Club.

His translations include Peter Shaffer's *Amadeus*, James Goldman's *Lion in Winter*,

J M Synge's *Playboy of the Western World* and works by Steinbeck, D H Lawrence, T S Eliot amongst others. But it is for his translation of the complete works of William Shakespeare that Martin Hilský is most acclaimed and for which he was awarded the 2011 Czech State Award for Translation, having previously received the prestigious Jungmann Prize for his Czech translation of Shakespeare's Sonnets and the Tom Stoppard Prize for his essays on Shakespeare.

In 2001, the late Queen Elizabeth II, for his achievements as a translator, writer and teacher, made him an honorary Member of the Order of the British Empire (MBE). In 2012, he was awarded two further prestigious awards - the State Award for Translation and the President's Medal of Merit.

Martin Hilský has been invited to give lectures at many universities and venues in the Czech Republic and beyond including the University of Warwick, the University of East Anglia, the University of London, Penn State University, Pennsylvania, Shakespeare Gesellschaft, Weimar, the University of Murcia and the Shakespeare Institute in Stratford-upon-Avon, the home of the Bard himself.

Lara Ivanović Can I Call You?

The Eva Jiřičná Prize for Art & Design

Eva Jiřičná CBE RA is a world-renowned architect and designer. Born in Zlín, she studied architecture at the Czech Technical University and at the Academy of Fine Arts in Prague. In 1968, she moved to the UK to take up a temporary placement with the Greater London Council, working on social housing projects. She stayed in the UK working on projects such as the Brighton Marina, becoming a British citizen in 1976.


She established her own practice, concentrating more on interior design projects, including several retail shops for fashion designer Joseph Ettedgui. But it was her work on the interior design of the Lloyd's Headquarters that brought her to international attention. She formed her current practice, Jiřičná Kerr Associates, and has worked on projects all over the world. Since 1989, her work in the

Czech Republic has included the Congress Centre in Zlín, the main hall of Komerční banka in Wenceslas Square, the Orangery at Prague Castle, the reconstruction of St Ann's Church in Old Town and the new building at the VFN. Since 2019, Eva Jiřičná has been the head of CBRE Art of Space Awards, and in 2021, her design won the tender for the reconstruction of Věžák Tower in Ostrava.

Her projects are stylish, featuring mathematically pure forms and a holistic approach to design and they are known for their subtlety and originality, combining the qualities of the materials with the intriguing use of light. Illustrations of Eva Jiřičná's work can be seen in the world's most prestigious design magazines and she has received many international awards, recognising her contribution to architecture, including the Lifetime Achievement Medal at the London Design Festival in 2018.

The Věra Čáslavská Prize for Sporting Achievement - Girl

Věra Čáslavská was a Czechoslovak gymnast, coach, member of prominent sports organisations, 7-time Olympic Gold medalist, 4-time World Champion, 11-time European Champion, and 4-time Czechoslovak Athlete of the Year. During the period of political liberalisation of the Prague Spring in 1968, Čáslavská signed the 2000 Words manifesto and so became a target of the Communist regime. She was also punished by Czechoslovakia's Communist authorities for her silent

protest against the Soviets. For two decades she was barred from travelling or attending major sports events and often prevented from coaching children. Following the Velvet Revolution in 1989 that resulted in the fall of Communism in Czechoslovakia, Věra Čáslavská was President of first the Czechoslovak and then the Czech Olympic Committee and a member of the International Olympic Committee. In January 1990, Čáslavská became a trusted adviser to Václav Havel, the newly-elected President of Czechoslovakia, in the area of social issues and sport.

The Dominik Hašek Prize for Sporting Achievement - Boy

In the world of great Czech ice hockey players, Dominik Hašek is *primus inter pares*. One of the world's most successful goalkeepers ever, his legendary status perhaps owes most to his sterling performance in the 1998 Winter Olympics in Nagano and the country's first and only Olympic gold medal in ice hockey. He became a hero to his compatriots and holds the highest career save percentage of all time at 0.9223. Spending most of his professional career in the NHL, he returned to Europe in 2009, signing for HC Pardubice before playing his last season with Spartak Moscow in 2012, to be

inducted into the International Ice Hockey Hall of Fame and the Czech Ice Hockey Hall of Fame. He is also the father of ECP alumna, Dominika Hašková, whose successful musical career we have regularly celebrated since she graduated in 2014. A good supporter of the English College, teachers and graduates will remember Dominik Hašek's visit to school to help us celebrate our Theme of the Year to coincide with the London 2012 Olympics. With Czech paralympian cyclist, Jiří Ježek, he spoke to students about the skills and dedication needed to succeed in sport and how they are relevant in our everyday lives.

The Jan Kovařovic Prize for CAS

Jan Kovařovic attended the Prague English Grammar School from 1945 to 1951, then studied at the Faculty of Architecture and Building at the Czech Technical University in Prague where he received his PhD. His focus on educational facilities developed there and continued during his Postdoctoral Fellowship in Trondheim. He also studied the management of education at the University of Victoria in Canada. His professional interest focused on education - from research, planning, design and the wider use of educational facilities and educational infrastructure, but also on the economy and effectiveness of education. He worked at the Educational Research Institute, the Institute for Development of Educational Facilities, the Ministry of Education and the Education Policy Centre, but also for the former Greater London Council where, as an architect, he planned and designed educational facilities.

He is a co-author of the NEMES Freedom in Education and the Czech School project, the study Czech Education and Europe, and other works for the OECD and other international organisations. He was a member of the team that prepared the National Programme for the Development of Education in the Czech Republic. Jan Kovařovic served as a Governor of the ECP from 1997 to 2020.

The Ernest Gellner Prize for TOK

Ernest Gellner was a theorist of modernity. He made significant contributions in very diverse fields, notably in Philosophy and Social Anthropology. Born in Paris in 1925, Gellner was brought up in Prague and attended the Prague English Grammar School, the model and inspiration for the ECP. He left PEGS after the Nazi occupation of Czechoslovakia in March 1939, when his Jewish family managed to escape to England. He finished his secondary education at a school in St Albans and when he was 17, he passed the entrance exam to Balliol College, Oxford, where he studied Philosophy for a year.

During the Second World War, he enlisted with the Czechoslovak Independent Armoured Brigade with which he took part in the siege of Dunkirk, returning to Prague in 1945. In 1946, out of fear for the country's political direction, he left Czechoslovakia again and returned to England, finishing his education at Oxford in 1947. He became Professor of Philosophy, Logic and Scientific Method at the London School of Economics, staying for the next 35 years, moving to teach Anthropology at Cambridge before returning to Prague after the Velvet Revolution, where he died in 1995. His most significant work was his book Nations and Nationalism (1983), which was translated into more than ten languages, including Czech.

An eminent Czech sociologist, Professor Jiří Musil, who had worked with Gellner, offered an interesting insight into what PEGS had meant to Gellner. Writing in the Czech Sociological Review in December 1995, he said: "Prague experiences, his father's conversion to Czech nationality, the multicultural milieu of the

family, a Czech and an English school in Prague, and a flourishing life of the city in the thirties, all that had without any doubt a formative effect on Gellner's intellectual orientation."

The Ivan M. Havel Prize

Ivan M. Havel, a brother of our patron Václav Havel, scientist, writer, artist and philosopher, was a great supporter of our school. His prize is awarded to a student who displays the qualities of a polymath. Specialism is increasingly important in society, but a polymath excels in more than one discipline. Primarily

a scientist, who has shown exceptional talent and interest across scientific disciplines, including theoretical ones, enhancing interdisciplinary approach to the studies, showing an understanding of the humanities and creativity in the arts and the ability to apply interdisciplinary competence across several subjects. The prize recognises hard work, enthusiasm and willingness to go beyond the curriculum.

Special Prizes

The Chairman of Governors' Prize for Academic Achievement

This prize is awarded to a student in Year 6 whose academic achievements are outstanding and who excels in many areas. The winner's name will be engraved on the stand that supports an Armada silver dish, generously donated to the College in 2011 by the late Nicholas Morris, ECF Director (1998-2012) and ECP Governor (2004-2012).

The Karel Schwarzenberg Prize

This prize is named after our late Czech Patron Karel Schwarzenberg and is awarded to a student who has shown exceptional interest in the history and spirit of European development. The prize recognises the ability to appreciate European heritage, to be able to analyse

history and make connections with the current political scene. The winner of the prize must show initiative in promoting the importance of a willingness to learn from understanding history. It also recognises hard work, enthusiasm and a readiness to go above and beyond the curriculum that this student demonstrates.

The Lord Holme Prize for Service to the Community

The Lord Holme Prize is awarded in memory of the Founder Chairman of the Governors of the English College, Richard Holme. Any member of the school community can nominate a student who has worked hard for the school community or who has helped people in need. Teachers then vote for the winner of the award.

The Headmaster's Prize for Services to the School

This prize is awarded to the student who has done most for the school community over the year.


The Jan Barta Prize
