iCanMed | Free UCAT Workshop: How to Finish Your UCAT Study During Term 1 & 2

Central Sydney: 16 February 2020, 3:00 pm - 6:00 pm

After talking to around 400 iCanMed students who scored above 3000+ (96th percentile) on the 2019 UCAT, we found that they spent an average of 250-300 hours preparing for the UCAT. However, it wasn't just about the amount of time they spent on preparation—how they distributed their study time and what they did during their study were also important factors that led to their exam-day success.

On the other hand, poor organisation or bad time management may affect your ability to perform your best at school/university.

In this 3-hour workshop, we will be:

- 1. Revealing a Term 1 & 2 timeline, including weekly preparation goals, time allocations and study milestones to help keep you on track
- 2. Identifying the most common mistakes that cause students to waste valuable UCAT time
- 3. Outlining optimal methods for preparing for the UCAT (minimum time, maximum return)
- 4. Sitting a short mock test, followed by live step-by-step teaching of the most commonly-asked Section 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5 questions
- 5. Explaining why most students who wait until Term 2 to start UCAT preparation have a high chance of failure

The ISSP Indigenous Commonwealth Education Costs Scholarship is funded by the Commonwealth Government. It assists undergraduate Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander students with demonstrated financial hardship to meet the costs associated with higher education.

Student must be Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander. Students who have a completed Bachelor degree or higher award at a tertiary institution will not be considered for Macquarie equity scholarships.

UoS Charles Herbert Currey Memorial Scholarship

Value: Up to \$7,000

Open/Closing Dates: February 1, 2020 – March 30, 2020

This scholarship aims to support students who have experienced disadvantage or hardship to participate in an exchange or short-term mobility program.

You must:

- be enrolled in an undergraduate degree in the Faculty of Arts and Social Sciences
- have been accepted into a University of Sydney exchange program or short-term mobility program
- demonstrate at least one of the following:
 - o identify as an Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander person
 - have carer responsibilities

 - be a person with a disability
 - hold refugee status
 - regional or remote disadvantage
 - have sole parent responsibilities

Gallipoli Scholarship

Value: \$6,000

Open/Closing Dates: January 1, 2020 – March 1, 2020

You are invited to apply for a Gallipoli Scholarship to assist your first year of tertiary study either at university or TAFE (the latter at Degree, Diploma or Advanced Diploma level).

An applicant for the Scholarship must:

- Have qualified and been accepted to undertake tertiary study at University or TAFE (the latter at Diploma or Advanced Diploma level).
- Be able to show necessitous circumstances through ill health of family members, death, separation from parents or guardians, unexpected financial loss or asset reduction that would otherwise prevent the applicant's full-time attendance at university or TAFE.
- Be in receipt of or be eligible to receive Youth Allowance, ABSTUDY or a similar Government benefit. This must be supported by relevant documentation in the form of the client registration number showing date of application and/or the decision in relation to the application
- Be an Australian citizen.
- Be a direct descendant of an Australian serviceman or servicewoman who served in either World War I or World War II.
- Be under 25 years of age on 1 March in the year of application.
- Commence their first year of university or TAFE studies (the latter at Degree, Diploma or Advanced Diploma level) in the year of application and be studying fulltime.

Thinking of Studying Medicine at the University of Melbourne?

If you are wanting to study the University of Melbourne's Doctor of Medicine (MD), you might want to consider starting with their Bachelor of Biomedicine.

The Bachelor of Biomedicine provides a solid foundation in biomedical science, and some subjects count as prior knowledge for the MD. This means that you can free up some more time during the MD to explore other subjects or specialise further in biomedicine.

But you don't have to do the Bachelor of Biomedicine to guarantee entry into the MD; in 2022, the University is removing prerequisite subjects as selection criteria for entry into the MD. This means you can get a spot even if you haven't studied any science or health related subjects in your previous degree.

Study Law in France with Notre Dame

Want to become a ballkid?

Ball boys and ball girls are an important part of the professional tennis scene. Responsible for picking up used and providing new balls to the players out on the courts, they keep the game going safely and smoothly.

So if you've been inspired while watching the Australian Open and are keen to get out on the court yourself, why not sign up for the <u>National BallKid Program</u> and turn your dreams into reality.

How to become a ball boy or girl in Australia

- Be aged between 11 and 17 years old
- Register your interest in the National Ballkid Program by completing the <u>online</u> application form

If you're selected, you'll have to attend trials at the National Training Centre. Making the cut at trials means you'll have to attend the 4 month training program, which *could* mean you'll be selected as one of the 360 ball boys and ball girls taking part in the Australian Open.

You won't get paid for your hours spend on court, but you'll be supplied with the official uniform (which you'll be allowed to keep), get a food allowance to use, and might receive tickets for to give to your family and friends.

Future opportunities for ballkids

Taking part in the Australian Open could open doors for you to attend international tournaments and matches.

After the age of 16 if you'd like to progress your career, there's always the option to train as a <u>linesperson</u>, <u>umpire</u>, or work in other <u>court services</u>.

Macquarie Walanga Muru Tutorial Program

The Walanga Muru tutorial program (WMTP) is a Commonwealth-funded program designed to close the gap that exists between the educational outcomes of Indigenous Australians and other Australians in tertiary education. The program provides free tutoring for Indigenous undergraduate students for 20 hours per subject per semester, and 5 hours per subject for postgraduate students.

WMTP assistance is a useful tool for any undergraduate Indigenous student, whether you have average pass grades or high distinctions. It's a great way to get individualised assistance in areas that you may need improvement on, such as specific content, referencing, academic research processes, exam preparation or essay writing skills, as well as developing the outstanding skills you already have.

Job Spotlight

Professional Tennis Player

What do they do?

Professional tennis players follow an international circuit competing in tennis matches. Entering tournaments, playing in exhibition games, and making business deals including sponsorships and other endorsements.

If you're highly competitive, have a passion for tennis, and are willing to commit to long hours of training, you might have what it takes to become the next world number one.

Skills required:

- Natural ability, dedication and persistence
- High level of fitness including speed, stamina, and strength
- Have great reactions, exceptional coordination and be quick thinking
- Possess great focus, self-control, and motivation
- Be competitive and confident with a positive, winning, mentality
- Committed to an intensive training program and competition circuit

How to become a professional tennis player in Australia

While there are no academic qualifications that'll ensure you become a tennis player on the professional circuit, you can give yourself the best chance by:

- Starting young and training hard
- Sign up for tennis lessons to learn the basics e.g. ANZ Tennis Hotshots
- Find a qualified coach to work with and develop your skills
- Progress your abilities and <u>learn how to compete</u> by taking part in as many events as possible
- Volunteer at tennis events, sign up as a <u>ballkid</u>, take as many opportunities as possible to get experience in all areas of the industry

Then consider

- Joining an enrichment program such as <u>Talent</u> Tennis Australia's Athlete Development Pathway
- Get yourself discovered by talent scouts in your state. You could contact them
 directly, or sign up for <u>competitions</u>, plan to attend as many events and workshops as
 possible
- Signing up for the <u>International Tours Program</u> if you're aged 18 or under and meet the eligibility requirements.
- Attending one of the 7 National Tennis Academies
- Apply for Athletic Scholarships that could help you improve your skills, keep competing and obtain a degree at the same time e.g. <u>US College Athletics</u> <u>Scholarship program</u>

Average salary is impossible to calculate for this career, as earnings are dependent upon the number of tournaments won and endorsement deals made. However, if you make it to the top 90 world players – be rest assured you'll have the opportunity to earn lots of money. It's also worth noting tennis players have to cover their expenses including travel, accommodation, coaching, and entering competitions (as well as taxes).
