Department of Education Nuclear-Powered Submarine Student Pathways

The Australian Government is investing \$128.5 million to support 4,001 commencing Commonwealth supported places (CSPs) over 2024 to 2027.

Growing a qualified and experienced STEM workforce to support Australia's nuclearpowered submarine enterprise is a national priority. The scale of work required to support the enterprise will be unlike any previous shipbuilding program in Australian history and will deliver career and job opportunities for generations.

These additional places will develop a pipeline of highly skilled STEM graduates who will strengthen Australia's sovereign capabilities.

**Note:** The University of Melbourne very recently introduced its *Science (Nuclear-Powered Submarine Student Pathways)* course through VTAC. The Bachelor of Science (Nuclear-Powered Submarine Student Pathways) provides the opportunity for students to undertake studies that meet the future Science workforce needs of the Australian Submarine Agency. The *major* studies offered are Chemistry, Mathematics and statistics, and Physics. Students who graduate from the Bachelor of Science (Nuclear-Powered Submarine Student Pathways) may choose to enrol in the Masters of Science in Chemistry, Industrial Chemistry, Mathematics and Statistics, Data Science or Physics.

\*Relevant disciplines for speech pathology include but are not limited to: linguistics, biomedicine, health sciences, nursing, midwifery, neuroscience, public health, psychology, education, allied health, arts with relevant specialisations (e.g., social sciences, psychology, social inclusion and equity, human pathology, communications, journalism, linguistics, brain and behaviour).

## Tuckwell Scholarship for 2026

The Tuckwell Scholarship Program at the ANU is the most transformational undergraduate scholarship program in Australia. A Tuckwell is not just about a students' intellect. It is also about their desire and determination to use their natural abilities to realise their full potential so that they can make a difference in the world. Up to 25 talented and motivated students from across the country are awarded a Tuckwell, giving them with the opportunity to realise their potential by providing them with *financial support, personal enrichment, and development opportunities*. All up one could say, **this is no ordinary scholarship**!

#### All <u>eligible applicants</u> are considered against four criteria:

- 1. Academic potential and achievements;
- 2. Other significant achievements of any type;
- 3. Demonstration of the Tuckwell Attributes; and
- 4. Connection and commitment to Australia.

#### Tuckwell Scholar students receive:

- \$26,000 per annum (2024 rate) (increasing annually) for the length of your undergraduate degree program (studying full-time), to cover on-campus residential costs, books and general living expenses.
- a one-off payment of \$1,500 relocation grant for first year Scholars.
- guaranteed access to ANU-approved student accommodation.
- travel allowances to assist with your move to Canberra and to support two annual return journeys (e.g. airfares) between your home and the University for each year of your degree.
- an allowance to help cover the transport costs for your parents to attend <u>Commencement Weekend</u> at the start of the program, and
- an ANU Sports Centre membership.

Applications will open in <u>early March 2025</u>, and close on <u>14 April 2025</u>. The Good Universities Guide\* states that *Biomedical Engineers apply engineering and scientific methods to find solutions to problems in medicine and the life sciences.* 

Biomedical Engineers fulfil a number of tasks including -

- Designing new medical monitoring, diagnostic and therapeutic equipment
- Setting up and maintaining medical equipment
- Plan data processing services and the development of associated computing programs
- Analyse new medical procedures to forecast likely outcomes
- Participate in medical or scientific procedures where biomedical skills are needed
- Design and deliver technology to assist people with disability
- Analyse and design prosthetic and orthotic devices

\* Biomedical Engineer

To become a Biomedical Engineer, students you usually have to complete an engineering degree at university with a major in biomedical engineering. Several universities in Victoria offer Biomedical Engineering as a specialisation. Students are encouraged to browse <u>VTAC</u> to learn about these courses and their entry requirements.



Any student will need at tax file number if he/she <u>starts work</u> (part-time and full-time) and all students planning on a tertiary education require one when they start.

Importantly, current Year 12 students are reminded that they <u>cannot</u> enrol in a CSP (Commonwealth Support Place) course at university without a Tax File Number, so it is worthwhile getting an application submitted early!

Students must apply for a TFN online and have their identity verified through an interview at a participating Australia Post office.

#### University Clinical Aptitude Test

The *University Clinical Aptitude Test (UCAT)* is an admissions test used by the UCAT ANZ Consortium of universities in Australia and New Zealand for their <u>medical, dental, and</u> <u>clinical science</u> degree programs. Universities requiring the UCAT are listed at this link - <u>Universities requiring the UCAT</u> but also listed below.

Students intending to apply for courses requiring the UCAT at any of these universities are reminded that they will need to **book a test**.

**NOTE:** The UCAT ANZ test is changing in 2025. **The Abstract Reasoning subtest will be withdrawn from the test**. The *new* test format will comprise 3 cognitive subtests: Verbal Reasoning, Decision Making, Quantitative Reasoning, <u>and</u> the Situational Judgement Test. **The** *new* **practice tests relevant to the abovementioned change, will be launched in early March 2025.** 

Students who are preparing for entry into any of these courses are encouraged to familiarise themselves with the **format of the test at <u>UCAT Test Format</u>** and the **practice tests and preparation material** provided at <u>UCAT Preparation</u> when available.

Bookings will open on **4 March 2025** and close **16 May 2025**. The testing dates will be from **1 July 2025 to 5 August 2025**.

We would like to share with you a unique science workshop series designed especially for female secondary school students to further their understanding of science and knowledge of cetaceans (whales and dolphins).


#### Workshop Series Details:

## **Career as an Anthropologist**

According to the Good Universities Career Guide, <u>anthropologists</u> study the origin, development and functioning of human societies and cultures, as they exist now or have existed throughout history. Anthropologists are concerned with the complexities of social and cultural life, including religion, rituals, family and kinship systems, languages, art, music, symbolism, and economic and political systems.

Successful anthropologists -

- Have the capacity for detailed observation and accurate practical work
- Can work independently
- Have enthusiasm for research
- Good oral and written communication skills
- Sensitive to other people and cultures.

To become an anthropologist, students usually have to complete a degree in *science, arts, social science* or *international studies* at university with a major in anthropology (preferably at honours level), followed by a postgraduate qualification in anthropology. Accounting is offered at many universities in Victoria. It is often offered as a major or minor in a business or commerce degree, but many universities also offer dedicated accounting degrees. 
